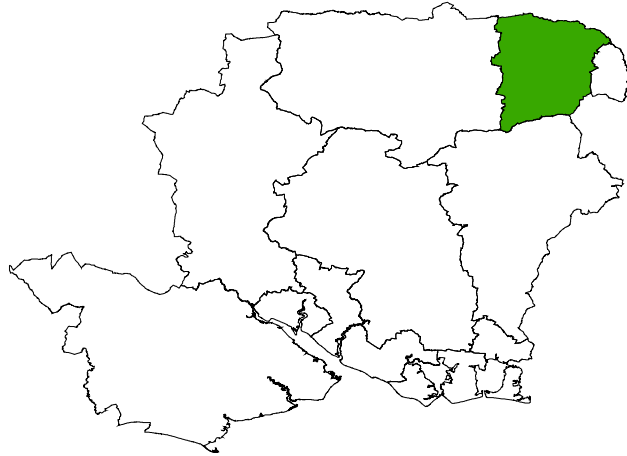
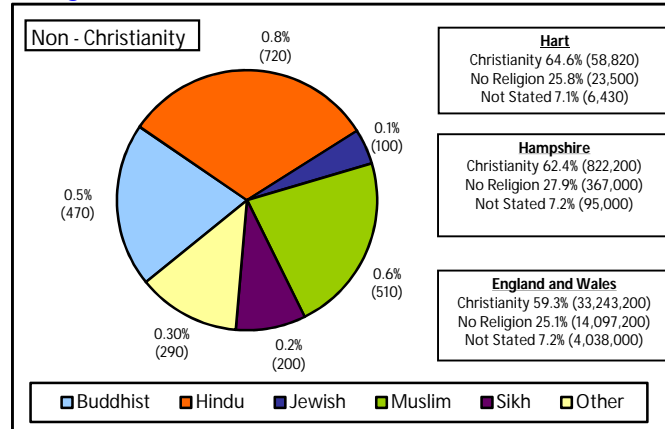


2011 Census Equality and Diversity Profile Hart

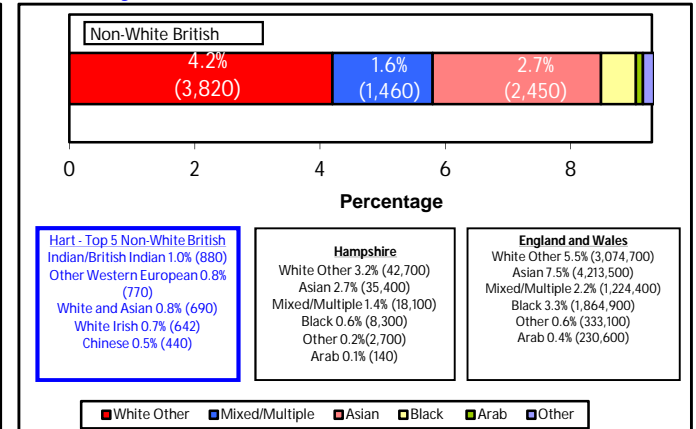


Religion



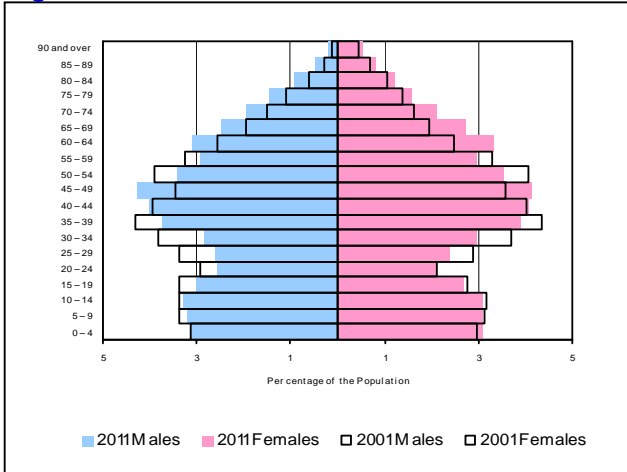
Christianity remains the largest religion in Hart at 64.6%. Hinduism is the next biggest religion at 0.8% followed closely by Muslim (0.6%) and Buddhist (0.5%). A large percentage said that they had no religion (25.8%), whilst 7.1% did not state any religion at all.

Ethnicity



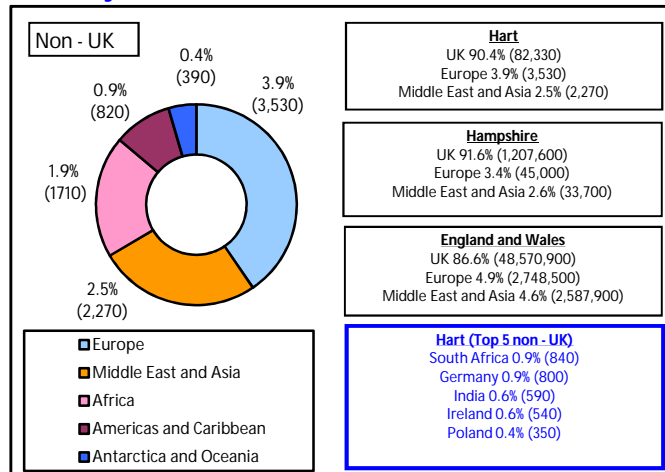
90.7% of Hart's resident population are 'White British'. Those in other ethnic groups account for 9.3%. The ethnic group 'White Other' accounts for 4.2% including both White Irish and Polish individuals, amongst others. The Asian ethnic group accounts for 2.7% encompassing Indian ethnicity, with others.

Age Structure



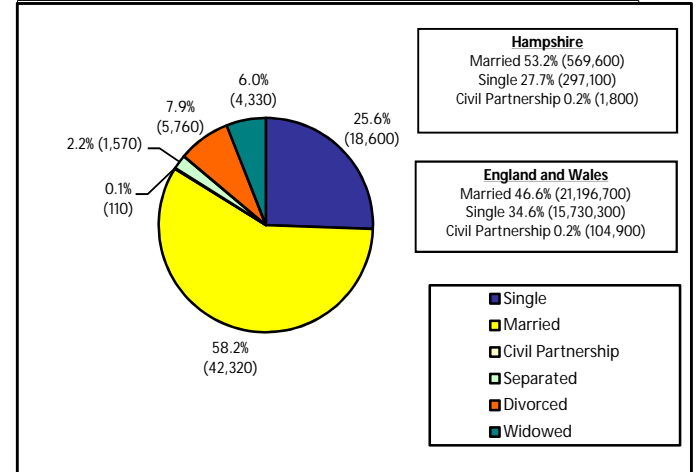
Between 2001 and 2011 there has been an decline in the percentage of the working age population from 66.8% to 63.3%. There has been a particularly large decline amongst young adults aged 25-39 (from 22.4% to 18.5%).

Country of Birth



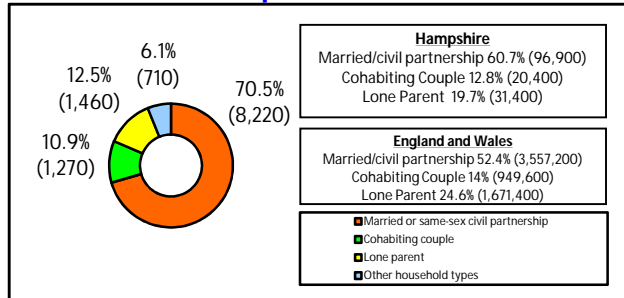
90.4% of Hart's population were born in the UK. At 3.9% Europe is the next largest, including Germany, Poland and Ireland in the top 5 above. The Middle East and Asia follows at 2.5% with India (0.6%) most prominent. Africa accounts for 1.9%, with South Africa at 0.9%.

Marital Status



58.2% of the population are married whilst 25.6% are single. Following the Civil Partnership Act of 2004, civil partnerships are now included. For Hart, they are 0.1% - below both Hampshire and England and Wales. The proportion of widowed individuals stands at 6.0%.

Households with Dependent Children

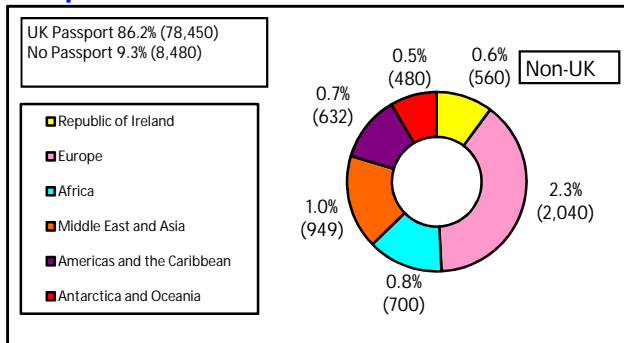


In Hart, 11,660 households have dependent children. Of these, 70.5% are married/civil partnership households, 10.9% are cohabiting couples whilst 12.5% are lone parent.

Of these lone parent households with dependent children, 89.5% (1,460) are female headed households. Many of these female lone parents are in part-time employment (41.1% 534).

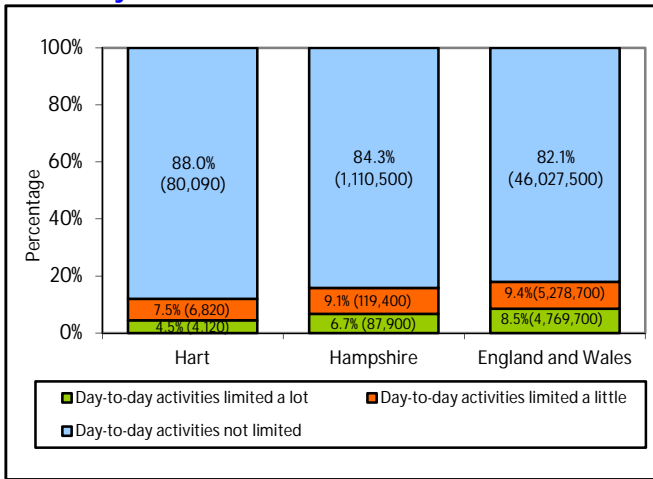
In Hart, 1.5% (530) of households with dependent children have no adults in employment whilst 3.7% (1,300) have one person with a long term health problem or disability.

Passports Held



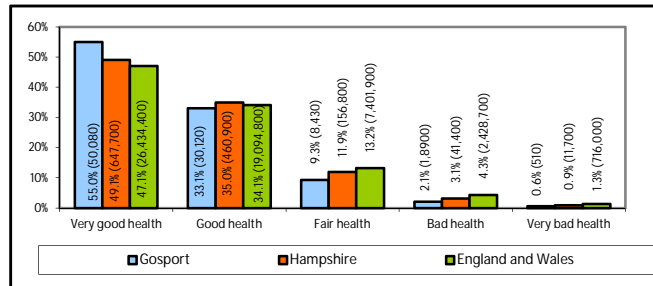
86.2% of people in Hart have a British passport whilst 9.3% state they have no passport. Individuals with European passports stand at 2.3% followed closely by those with passports from the Middle East and Asian countries (1.0%).

Disability



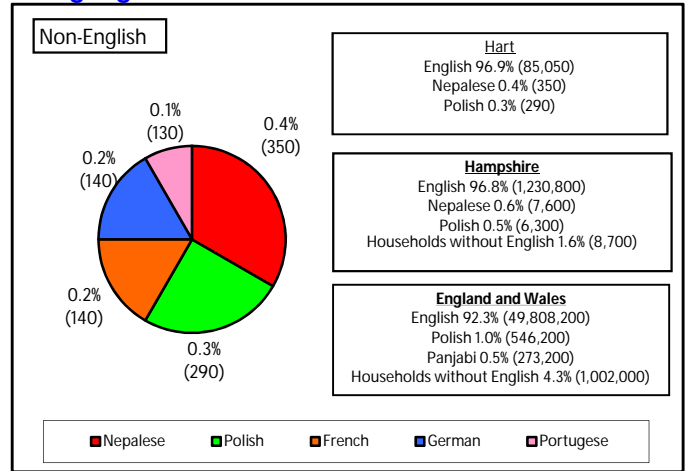
In Hart, 88.0% of the population state that their daily activities are 'not limited' by a long term illness whilst 7.5% are 'limited a little' and 4.5% are 'limited a lot' by their illness.³ The proportion of Hart's population who are limited a lot' is well below both Hampshire and England and Wales.

General Health



Self defined general health in the district is also high with 55.0% of the population choosing to describe themselves as being in very good health with less than 1% seeing themselves as having very bad health.⁴ With regards to economic inactivity as a result of long term sickness and disability, Hart experiences a low rate of 1.3% compared to Hampshire (2.6%) and England and Wales (4.2%).

Language



In Hart 96.9% of people (aged 3+) state English as their main language'. Other than English, Nepalese (0.4%) and Polish (0.3%) are the next most common main languages. In Hart, 1.4% of all households are shown to contain no individuals with English as a main language.⁵

Notes: 1 - White British includes those describing their ethnicity as English, Welsh,

Scottish, Northern Irish or British.

2 - Marital and Civil Partnership status refers to the population aged 16 and over.

3 - A long term health problem or disability is one that limits a person's day-to-day activities and has lasted, or is expected to last at least 12 months, including problems related to old age.

4 - General health is a self-assessment of a person's general state of health. People were asked whether their health was very good, good, fair, bad or very bad. This is not based on a person's health over any specified period of time.

5 - Language data refers to the population aged over 3 years.

Data for some Protected Characteristics - gender reassignment, sexual orientation, pregnancy and maternity are not included in the 2011 Census.
