### All quiet on the Western Front by Erich Maria Remarque



Audiobook: 6 compact discs (7 hr., 15 min.)

This story is told by a young soldier in the trenches of Flanders during the First World War. Through his eyes we see the realities of war. Incidents are vividly described, but there is no sense of adventure, only the feeling of youth betrayed.

### Catastrophe: Europe goes to war 1914 by Max Hastings

Audiobook: 24 compact discs (1590 min.)

In 'Catastrophe', Max Hastings answers how World War I could ever have begun. Ranging across Europe, from Paris to St. Petersburg, from kings to corporals, he traces how tensions across the continent kindled into a blaze of battles; not the stalemates of later trench-warfare but battles of movement and dash where Napoleonic tactics met with weapons from a newly industrialised age.



### Fighting on the Home Front: the legacy of women in World War One by Kate Adie

Bestselling author and award-winning former BBC Chief News Correspondent Kate Adie reveals the ways in which women's lives changed during World War One and what the impact has been for women in its centenary year.



The stories presented here are first-hand accounts of bravery and adventure from the individuals who embraced the exciting - and dangerous - new world of flying at the start of the First World War.



### The war behind the wire: the life, death and glory of British prisoners of war, 1914-18 by John Lewis-Stempel

Audiobook: 14 compact discs (14 hr., 30 min.)

On capture, British officers and men were routinely told by the Germans 'for you the war is over', but this couldn't be further from the truth. The British soldiers taken prisoner in 1914-18 - about 12% of the entire army - merely exchanged one barbed-wire battlefield for another. And it was in the Kaiser's camps, far from the blasted trenches of the 'official' war, that the fighting spirit of the British Tommy was exemplified.

### Coming home by Roy E. Stolworthy
