30. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE.

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Vaughan Clarke, Ferris Cowper, Shaun Cully, Keith Evans, Ray Finch, Mark Kemp-Gee, Frank Pearce, Roger Price and Sharyn Wheale.

31. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST.

All Members who believe they have a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in any matter to be considered at the meeting must declare that interest and, having regard to the circumstances described in Part 3, Paragraph 1.5 of the County Council's Code of Conduct, leave the meeting while the matter is discussed, save for exercising any right to speak in accordance with Paragraph 1.6 of the Code. Furthermore, all Members with a Non-Pecuniary Interest in a matter being considered at the meeting should consider whether such interest should be declared, and having regard to Part 5 Paragraph 2 of the Code, consider whether it is appropriate to leave the meeting while the matter is discussed, save for exercising any right to speak in accordance with the Code.

32. MINUTES.

The minutes of both the Special Meeting of the County Council and the Ordinary Meeting of the County Council held on 18 July 2013 were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

In respect of Minute 25 of the Ordinary Meeting – Notice of Motion regarding proposals for the fluoridation of drinking water in Southampton and South West Hampshire – the Chairman invited the Chief Executive to update the Council on the latest position.

The Chief Executive reminded Members that the Council had supported the withdrawal of the Motion at the meeting as a result of the receipt of advice from a QC just prior to the meeting indicating that the status of the previous fluoridation proposals of the South Central Strategic Health Authority was unclear. The QC had advised that in order for there to be fluoridation arrangements in force capable of existing after 1 April 2013, when responsibility for decision making on proposals in respect of fluoridation schemes transferred to upper tier and unitary authorities, there needed to be completed and effective contractual arrangements (including all necessary terms) between South Central Southern Health Authority and Southern Water. At the time of the last Council meeting, the County Council had yet to receive evidence that this was the case. In consequence of this, the advice from the Monitoring Officer was that the County Council should avoid the possibility of a pre-determined position in relation to the matter.

Following the last Council meeting the Monitoring officer had written to Public Health England, the Secretary of State, Southampton City Council and Southern Water appraising them of the position as the

County Council sees it. The Monitoring Officer had asked Public Health England to indicate the position in light of the QC's advice received by the County Council. Public Health England had responded that they wish to take their own advice in light of the QC's advice and at the time of this meeting, a substantive response was still awaited. Furthermore, nothing had been received to undermine the position as the County Council sees it.

The Chief Executive concluded by confirming that a further update would be brought once the position crystallises and reminded Members of the importance of the County Council avoiding any action in the meantime that might lead to the possibility of a pre-determined position in relation to the matter.

33. **DEPUTATIONS.**

There were no deputations on this occasion.

34. **CHAIRMAN'S COMMUNICATIONS.**

The Chairman presented his report (Item 5 in the Minute Book) and expanded on the wide range of duties undertaken to represent and promote the County Council and its strong community leadership role. In particular the Chairman reported that arrangements had been put in place to invite young carers aged from 11 to 18 to spend a weekend at Calshot Activities Centre in October.

The Chairman's full announcements are attached to these Minutes as Appendix 1.

35. **LEADER'S REPORT.**

The Leader presented his report (Item 6 in the Minute Book) and reported on visits he had made during the course of the summer including a number of residential homes, youth initiatives and community libraries, and the M33 HMS Minerva in Portsmouth Dockyard.

The Leader reported on a visit by the Local Government Minister Brandon Lewis which presented an opportunity to outline how the County Council is addressing continuing budgetary pressures resulting from the further loss of central government support together with on-going inflation and demographic pressures.

The Leader extended his thanks to Gavin Wright, Head of Human Resources, who had left the County Council to take up another post, and indeed to all staff for helping to maintain the County Council's excellent service record in difficult times.

The Leader's full report is attached to these Minutes as Appendix 2.

36. **QUESTIONS UNDER STANDING ORDER 16.1.1.**

The list of Questions submitted under Standing Order 16.1.1 (Item 7 in the Minute Book) is attached to these minutes as Appendix 3. Executive Members responded accordingly.

37. **PROPORTIONALITY AND APPOINTMENTS.**

The Council considered a report from the Chief Executive (Item 8 in the Minute Book) together with an Addendum, as presented by the Leader, reviewing the Proportionality Table following a change to the Council's political composition. The report and addendum also detailed a number of changes to the membership of County Council Committees and Panels and to other forums and outside bodies that the County Council is represented on.

RESOLVED:

- a) That the revised Proportionality Table at Appendix 4 to these Minutes, be approved.
- b) That the appointments detailed in paragraph 4 of the main report and in paragraph 3 of the addendum be approved.

38. **HAMPSHIRE MINERALS AND WASTE PLAN.**

The Council considered a report from the Cabinet (Item 9 in the Minute Book) recommending adoption of the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Plan (HMWP) which enables the delivery of sustainable minerals and waste development through a comprehensive framework for future minerals and waste decision making in Hampshire to 2030. The Leader briefly introduced the report and handed over to the Executive Member for Economy, Transport and Environment to provide a detailed summary.

The Executive Member reported that the County Council, as Minerals and Waste Planning Authority, has a statutory duty to plan for minerals and waste development. This had been achieved through the preparation of the HMWP, which had been developed on robust technical evidence and significant site appraisal work. Plan preparation had taken place over a number of years, had gone through several stages of public consultation and had involved working in partnership with Southampton and Portsmouth City Councils and the New Forest and South Downs National Park Authorities.

The Executive Member reported on the chain of events following approval by the County Council in October 2011 which included an independent Public Examination into the soundness of the HMWP. The Planning Inspector issued his report in late May 2013 which concluded that with the incorporation of the main modifications identified in his report, the HMWP met the criteria for soundness and

could therefore be adopted. The partner authorities can only adopt a sound Plan and each authority would need to gain approval to adopt the Plan. If the County Council and its partner authorities were minded to adopt the Plan, a joint notice of adoption would be prepared. The adoption of the Plan would then be subject to a six week challenge period once the resolution to adopt had been made by all partner authorities and the adoption notice had been issued. Once adopted the HMWP would supersede the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Core Strategy (2007) and the saved policies of the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan (1998).

During the ensuing debate Members expressed a range of views in support of, and against the adoption of the HMWP, regarding specific sites identified in the Plan and sustainability issues together with environmental issues such as fracking. The UKIP Deputy Group Leader requested that the view of the majority of the UKIP Group be recorded in the Minutes that not enough information was available, and that there had not been adequate time to digest the information that had been supplied. The Executive Member reported that it was incumbent upon all Members who were newly appointed to the County Council in May to seek the information they required and highlighted that officers in the Economy, Transport and Environment department had been readily available to assist Members to help them come up to speed. The Executive Member thanked Members for their views and comments which he would consider in detail.

In summing up, the Leader highlighted that the HMWP had been through a thorough and exhaustive process to reach this stage, including independent inspection. This had been a difficult exercise for the County Council and drew attention to the concern expressed during the debate that if the Council did not adopt the HMWP, a number of sites would be left in a vulnerable position.

The substantive recommendations were put to the vote. Pursuant to Standing Order 22.2 Councillor Jane Frankum requested a recorded vote which was supported by 10 Members of the Council. The outcome of the recorded vote was as follows:

NB: Subsequent to the meeting, clarification was requested in regard to how Councillor Criss Connor cast his vote. It was verified that he voted against the adoption of the HMWP and the outcome of the vote, as detailed above and at Appendix 5, reflects this position.

RESOLVED:

- (a) that the recommendations of Cabinet as detailed in paragraph 7 of the supporting report be approved.
- (b) that the Director of Economy, Transport and Environment, in consultation with the Executive Member for Economy, Transport and Environment be authorised to make such changes to the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Plan that may be necessary to complete its finalisation, provided that these do not materially change the direction, shape and emphasis of the document, and do not raise new issues.

39. **NOTICE OF MOTION.**

The Council considered the Motion (Item 10 in the Minute Book) submitted in accordance with Standing Order 18.1, proposed by Councillor Rupert Kyrle and seconded by Councillor Mark Cooper, as follows:

“1. Noting the start of the badger cull in Somerset and Gloucestershire and the possibility that DEFRA may roll out the badger cull across the rest of the UK, Hampshire County Council agrees not to allow the badger cull to take place on any of its county owned or leased land and, given that the science is not proven nor conclusive that a cull of badgers is the answer to eradicating Bovine TB from the countryside.

2. HCC agrees that more research should be undertaken by Government and the scientific community to find more effective and cheaper vaccinations for badgers and cattle to help eradicate this terrible and costly disease from the countryside: the Government’s policy is based on results from the randomised badger culling trial (RBCT) and agreed by a panel of scientists which stated that based on an average of five years’ culling plus a 4 year post cull period over an area of 150km², the incidences of Bovine TB in that area could be expected to reduce by a mere average of 16% and HCC further agrees that this is not a good enough reason to warrant the culling and potential eradication of any species from our countryside, especially as there are other species of animals, including cattle, which are known to spread the disease.”

During the ensuing debate Members expressed a range of views in support of and against the Motion. It was recognised that this was an emotive matter for many. Members had received a booklet circulated by the NFU about tackling TB and the Leader reported that he had also received a joint letter from Julian Gibbons, Chairman of NFU Hampshire and Hallam Mills, Chairman of CLA Hampshire providing contextual information. A number of Members expressed the view that they were not convinced about the current arguments, were concerned

that the scientific evidence currently available was not robust enough and felt that more research needed to be carried out.

The Motion was put to the vote. The majority of the Members present supported the Motion which was accordingly carried.

**Leader's Report
County Council
19 September 2013**

I welcome colleagues and officers back from their summer break and trust you are refreshed and ready to address the challenges facing the council. However you spent your summer I hope you had a good time. As well as some reading and gardening I was able to take the time to make visits across the county to see at first hand many of our services.

Members will know of the consultation about replacing 4 old style residential homes with new state of the art Extra Care homes. I was pleased to visit Cranleigh Paddock, Nightingale Lodge, Bulmer house and Deeside to see the current provision. What struck me most was the commitment and real care shown by staff in those homes. However I was also struck by the limited scope of their buildings. I contrasted that with the brilliant and truly excellent provision in the Extra Care Homes such as Campbell place as well as the provision in the Nursing Home at Forest Edge. They say be kind to your kids they will choose your nursing home and I made sure one of my daughters came to see Forest Edge to see what excellence is really like.

If members have not seen our modern Extra Care Homes I would be happy to see that a visit is arranged.

Cllr Anna McNair-Scott will of course have to take the important decisions at the end of the consultation

I also visited a number of youth initiatives and community libraries where town and parish councils and voluntary groups have been joining the County Council in the shared provision of these services. I have no doubt that is a model that we will need to develop if we are to keep services that are good to have but not necessarily essential.

I very much appreciated my visits to Ringwood and Yateley in particular to see in one case the opening of a Youth Club run by Fruition a Social Enterprise in Yateley with funding by the Town Council but with great support from Hampshire and in Ringwood to learn of the plans the Town Council there have for youth provision. I was particularly impressed by their youth proofing of all policies.

Finances mean the days when the County Council can fund all requests are over but what I am quite clear is that we must help in those areas where the local community through its district, town or parish council is prepared to commit its own funds and efforts.

I also visited the M33 HMS Minerva in Portsmouth Dockyard where the plan is that responsibility will be assumed by the Royal Navy Museum if they secure a Heritage Lottery. The warship was acquired by Hampshire

Museums service back in the 1990's and is one of only two warships from the First World War that still survives. On that occasion we took the two elderly daughters of a seaman, who still live in Southampton, who had served on a sister ship of the M33 also called the Minerva and who had seen service in the Gallipoli. If that lottery bid is successful this 1st World War ship will be maintained in Portsmouth Dockyard alongside HMS Victory and Mary Rose.

As we say farewell to Gavin Wright our Head of Human Resources who moves to a new post at Brighton University I would like to place on record my appreciation to him and indeed to all staff of the County Council who in difficult times maintain our record for excellent service.

With the announcement of the local government spending round it is clear we will lose approximately £38m in central government support- which we estimate is a 12% cut. Together with on-going inflation and demographic pressures - all those extra children and the ageing of the population - the budgetary pressures we face are in the order of £80million. It is not just the £38million cut in grant.

The local government minister Brandon Lewis visited us on Tuesday and I was able to explain to him how we are purposefully addressing these pressures whilst seeking to maintain front line services albeit in different and more targeted ways. We also discussed the work Hampshire is doing to improve Children's Services on the Isle of Wight. I also took the opportunity to point out to him the extract from the Anglo Saxon Chronicle that makes the first mention of Ham Tun Scire in 757AD- before England was a country.

He was keen to see the Great Hall and I think tweeted his photograph of the Round Table. I suggested to him that if the Scottish Referendum ends up with a No Vote on Scottish independence but with Devo Max for Scotland then the case for a separate Parliament for England within the UK would become unanswerable and Winchester Great Hall in the City of Alfred the Great who united England would be the obvious place for an English Parliament.

First Questions:

1. From Councillor Martin Tod to the Executive Member for Economy, Transport and Environment:

"I reported a dangerously broken drain cover on the Stockbridge Road outside St Matthew's Church in Weeke, Winchester more than 9 months ago on 7th December 2012. The works were assessed as needing action and passed to the contractor on April 5th, 2013. At the time of writing it has not been fixed. Is this the oldest outstanding repair in Hampshire? If not, what is the oldest one and where is it? And is the portfolio holder happy about this situation?"

2. From Councillor Jackie Porter to the Executive Member for Education:

"Has the County Council considered how it can support young people travelling to education in the academic year in which they reach 17 now that education and/or training is compulsory for this age group?"

3. From Councillor Criss Connor to the Executive Member for Adult Social Care:

"With reference to the proposed changes to Adult Social Care provision through the closure of four care homes and one day centre, and the agreement of the Executive Member to proceed with a full public consultation at her decision day on 26 July 2013, would the Executive Member for Adult Social Care agree to refer the matter to the Safe and Healthy People Select Committee, in order to enable a wider group of Members, many of whom are new to the Council, to engage in the process via a full debate?"

4. From Councillor Ray Finch to the Executive Member for Health & Wellbeing (Public Health):

"There is little doubt that due to immigration and an increasingly elderly population, the Accident & Emergency departments of our Acute Hospitals will face their most challenging winter ever. Community services, including extended GP opening hours, are not available. What plans are being made to ensure our hospitals do not become gridlocked and the people of Hampshire receive a satisfactory and safe service?"

5. From Councillor Chris Lagdon to the Executive Member for Adult Social Care:

"How can the Executive Member for Adult Social Care assure this Council that she can remain neutral and that she has no conflict of interest given her division's proximity to the Deeside Care Home, which is one of the four homes at present under consultation for closure by her department, also given the pressure she is being put under by the campaign group at Deeside concerning her re-election prospects."

6. From Councillor Chris Carter to the Executive Lead Member for Children's Services:

"Can the Executive Lead Member for Children's Services tell us what progress has been made regarding the new partnership with the Isle of Wight Children's Services Department?"

7. From Councillor John Wall to the Executive Lead Member for Children's Services:

"Can the Executive Lead Member for Children's Services update the Council on the number of Foster Carers in the County?"

8. From Councillor Roger Humby to the Executive Member for Education:

Can the Executive Member for Education update the Council on this year's GCSE and A level results in the County?"

9. From Councillor Andrew Gibson to the Executive Member for Education:

"Can the Executive Member for Education provide up-to-date information on the availability of primary school places in the County."
