Title:	Proposed Changes to the Culture, Community and Recreation Grants 2015/16

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1. Executive Summary

1.1. This report sets out some changes to the revenue grants that fall within the remit of the Executive Member for Culture, Recreation and Countryside in order to make the necessary budget reduction by 2015/16.

2. Background

2.1. For many years the County Council has operated a grants scheme for cultural, community and recreational organisations across Hampshire. During 2011/12 there was a major review of grants to cultural, recreational and community organisations and the Executive Member for Culture and Recreation approved the final details on 14 May 2012. The new scheme set up five grant streams which are:

1) Culture and Recreation Investment Fund

This provides investment in the major strategic cultural and recreational organisations in Hampshire. Decisions are only made once a year for applications to this grant stream.

2) Community Investment Fund

This provides support for not-for-profit community based organisations. Decisions are also only made once a year for applications to this grant stream.

3) Culture and Community Activity Fund

This provides general support to groups and organisations which encourage and provide opportunities for individuals and communities to participate in community focused cultural and recreational activities.

Decisions are made at three Decision Days a year for applications to this grant stream.

4) Organisational Change Fund

This fund supports specific, time limited projects for organisations to achieve efficiencies and reduce on going dependency on grant funding. Decisions can be made at every Decision Day for applications to this grant stream.

5) Community Buildings Capital Fund

This grant stream supports the small scale refurbishment and improvement of local community buildings that are managed and operated by the voluntary sector. Decisions can be made at every Decision Day for applications to this grant stream.

2.2. This report considers the four revenue grants only.

3. Revenue Grants 2014/15

3.1. There is £1,267,000 in the budget for this year's revenue grants, of which £1,120,281 has been allocated as follows:

*These figures include the grants being recommended for approval at the Executive Member for Culture, Recreation and Countryside Decision Day on 16 September 2014.

4. Revenue Grants 2015/16

4.1. The budget for next year's revenue grants will be £1,140,000, a reduction of 10%, on top of the 2% reduction made in 2014/15. In order to accommodate this reduction, it is recommended that:

- the maximum grant awarded from the Organisational Change Fund is reduced from £10,000 to £5,000

- the maximum grant awarded from the Activity Grant is reduced from £5,000 to £3,000
- the grants from the two Investment Funds are reduced by 3% to every organisation

4.2. Along with other reductions to the Culture and Recreation Investment Fund, as previously agreed by the Executive Member for Culture, Recreation and Countryside, this would mean that the County Council would still have enough money to grant aid 45 - 50 small organisations in 2015/16, as it has done in 2014/15.

5. Revenue Grants after 2015/16

- 5.1. It is now known that the County Council needs to reduce its budget by a further £98m by April 2017. This is likely to mean a further reduction in the grants budget of £159,600, 14%, by April 2017, with the likelihood of a further budget reduction by 2020.
- 5.2. It is felt that the best way to plan for these reductions is to undertake an in-depth review of the grants again, starting in 2015. A further report will come to the Select Committee in 2015, setting out the details of the review and asking for Members to sit on a small Task and Finish Group to work with Officers on the review.

6. Recommendations

- 6.1. That the Select Committee recommend to the Executive Member for Culture, Recreation and Countryside that for the 2015/16 grants, he agrees to:
- i. reduce the maximum grant awarded from the Organisational Change Fund from £10,000 to £5,000
 - ii. reduce the maximum grant awarded from the Activity Grant from £5,000 to £3,000
 - iii. reduce the Investment Fund grants by 3% to every organisation.
