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1. Summary

- 1.1. This report summarises the incidents and events in the Harbour from 16 January 2015. Any incidents or events which take place after this report is distributed will be the subject of a separate Annex to be circulated at the meeting.

2. Patrols

- 2.1. The harbour has been patrolled by the Duty Harbour Master at various times between 0800 and 1800 daily.

3. Incidents and events

- 3.1 29 Jan. Patrol discovered a vessel with a parted pile line and lying alongside a vessel downstream from its own mooring. Patrol towed the vessel back on to its mooring and replaced the mooring lines. Owner informed.
- 3.2 7 Feb. Patrol assisted a motor vessel with engine problems to get alongside.
- 3.3 14 Feb. Patrol received a report of a whole sail floating in the mouth of the River causing a navigational hazard, but an extensive search proved fruitless.
- 3.4 19 Feb. Patrol called to investigate a small yacht in danger of sinking. Cause identified as a short mooring line and very high tide, the combination of which was holding the bow down.

4. Multi agency exercise

- 4.1 The Harbour Office participated in a multi-agency table top exercise with Hampshire Fire and Rescue and Hampshire Police Marine Unit on the 3 December. The scenario was a vessel on fire adrift in the river. The main

purpose was to seek clarification of roles, command and control, and which organisation would have primacy where an incident takes place mid-stream. All parties agreed that primacy would be with the RHHA if the incident occurred mid-stream but would be with Hampshire Fire and Rescue if the incident occurs alongside where direct access can be achieved from the land. The exercise was a great opportunity to meet with other organisations and agree protocols. This also led to a meeting with the Chief Fire Officer of Hampshire Fire and Rescue who undertook a familiarisation trip up the river to discuss further implications if an incident did occur in the future.
