Summary of Themes to the Open Consultation and directly to Hampshire County Council

Key Themes	Summary and context
Importance of Public Libraries	Hampshire libraries are seen as a valuable community focal point or meeting place and that Council run libraries were preferred to community run libraries. There was recognition that libraries make an important contribution to the quality of life for many people, through improving access to digital technology and reducing social isolation.
Vulnerable populations and equality of access	Many comments stated that ending the Mobile Library Service will disproportionately affect the elderly and people with disabilities or those on low income who don't have their own transport. Concerns were about closure of the Mobile Library Service and closure of Tier 3 Libraries saying that people may not be able to access an alternative static Library. Many respondents, regardless of their age, highlighted the importance of the Library Service for preschool and school age children, students and older persons.
Balance between town and rural	The importance of public libraries in rural communities was highlighted along with the limited opening hours that reduced the ability of the community to use their local library. Some respondents felt that capital investment has tended to focus on libraries serving large urban communities.
Role of paid Library staff	Concerns were raised that the quality of library services could reduce if paid skilled professional staff were replaced with trained volunteers. Paid library staff are seen to be very important to retaining high quality and sustainable library services as well as supporting community libraries.
Community involvement and volunteer opportunities	A significant number of communities indicated their willingness to work with the County Council to find a local solution that sustains the library and helps to meet wider community needs. A number of individuals and organisations had suggestions to increase the range of library services to help broaden the use or bring in new income to help meet operating costs.
Growth of communities	Several communities (including Emsworth, Fair Oak) highlighted the future growth recorded in the Local Plan for the area. <i>(This is already included in the Library Needs Assessment.)</i>
Increasing library charges to cover costs	Several responses argued that library charges should be increased to help cover the cost of specialist services such as inter-library loans, reservations and the music service. Some even suggested membership fees and joining fees should be levied.
Concerns about Tiered approach	Comments received about Alton, New Milton and Eastleigh, requesting that these are reclassified to Tier 1 (rather than a Tier 2) Library. Continued support for Tier 4 community

	libraries. Reference to Fleet Library and the proposals for the Harlington Centre.
Concerns about Tier 3 libraries	Some communities challenged the tier of their local library requesting that it should be reclassified as a tier 2 (rather than a tier 3) library. These include Alresford, Bishops Waltham, Blackfield, Emsworth, Fair Oak, Fordingbridge, Horndean, Odiham, West End, Whitchurch and Yateley.
Consultation format	A number of people felt the questionnaire was designed to deliver a prejudged outcome and was too long. This was mitigated by several open ended comment boxes where individuals and organisations could submit their views. In addition, some individuals and organisations decided to write a letter or send an email to share their views. These comments were collated and included in the consultation analysis.
Other Community comments	Several rural and smaller communities expressed concern about reductions in public transport, closing of their post office and local banks. The Grayshott community raised concerns that their static Library was closed in December 2014 and replaced with a mobile library stop and now the Mobile Library Service may close leaving no local provision.
High quality library services	Positive comments were made about the high quality and low cost of the Inter-library Loans Service and the Music Service.

Ideas and suggestions provided by respondents and residents

Ideas and suggestions	Hampshire County Council comments about viability and savings
Increase opening hours to improve static library usage	The County Council is planning to install Open Library technology to manage access to Library buildings outside of current opening hours. This will increase public access without the increasing staffing costs.
Make better use of school libraries ie provide public access	Yateley Tier 3 Library is both a public library and school library operated from the Community School. This operating model works well in Yateley but is complex to set up for existing schools but is being considered for new schools.
Work with local community partners to recruit volunteers to support delivery of services at Tier 3 and 4 libraries	Five Community organisations already work in partnership with Hampshire County Council to deliver Tier 4 Community Libraries. <i>The County Council will follow up with community organisations that have expressed interest in helping to operate their local Tier 3 Library through the recruitment or trained volunteers.</i>
Postal Library Service or similar ideas to collect and return books	The costs for a postal Library Service are too high and have been tried elsewhere in the country using postal services, couriers and grocery delivery organisations. The costs were found to be higher than the operating costs for the Mobile Library Service and were only suitable for delivery of books and not the return of loans to the Library Service.
Provide community transport to help vulnerable residents to access their nearest static library	Multiple suggestions from respondents of the Open Consultation related to using a replacement shuttle-bus/minibus service to take current Mobile Library Service users to their nearest static library. <i>Discussions have started with community transport providers to progress this suggestion.</i>

Ideas and suggestions	Hampshire County Council comments about viability and savings
Income generating ideas eg room hire, joining and membership fees, fund raising etc	Legislation prohibits the County Council from charging customers for a book lending service. The Library Fees, Fines and Charges have been reviewed and will be increased from Spring 2016 in line with inflation and to help recover costs for operating specialist Library Services such as the Music Service and Inter-Library Loans. Income generation is a feature of the Library Strategy to 2020. Fundraising has been developed successfully by other Library Authorities and will be investigated as part of the Strategy to 2020.
Provide free information sessions on how to use eBook and eResources	Free online Library learning sessions for communities that are losing their mobile Library stop are being developed for delivery during 2016/17. The Library Service already provides Library Learning on use of new technology e.g. how to use your iPad and how to access eResources.
