1. The decision:

- 1.1. That unconditional approval be given to the following proposal; the publication of a public notice under Section 19 (1) of the Education and Inspections Act 2006:

To make a prescribed alteration to TROSNANT INFANT SCHOOL AND TROSNANT JUNIOR SCHOOL, Stockheath Lane, Havant, PO9 3BD (category of schools – Community) by enlarging the premises of the schools, with effect from 1 September 2018.

2. Reason(s) for the decision:

- 2.1. Following local consultation, the County Council received six written comments regarding the proposal to enlarge the schools. In considering the responses received the County Council felt that the provision of additional school places was necessary and that comments received did not represent sufficient concern to prevent proceeding with the enlargement. The proposal to enlarge Trosnant Infant School from 180 to 270 places, and Trosnant Junior School from 240 to 360 places, with effect from September 2018, should proceed to the next stage of the process.

3. Consultation

- 3.1. Formal consultation took place between 8 February and 18 March 2016. A letter was sent to consultees as detailed below and a drop-in session was held at the Scout Hut and Community Centre, Stockheath Lane, Havant, PO9 3BD on 10 February 2016. The proposal was also included on the County Council's consultation website. A copy of the consultation letter is attached.

3.2. Letters were sent to;

- Parents of children attending Trostant Infant School and Trostant Junior School
- Headteacher, school staff and Governing Body of Trostant Infant School and Trostant Junior School
- Headteachers and Chairs of Governors of neighbouring schools
- Havant Borough Council – Chief Executive
- Trade union representatives
- Local Dioceses
- MP – Right Honourable Alan Mak
- HCC Elected Members – Councillor Liz Fairhurst and Councillor Ray Finch
- Tracey Sanders – Manager, Services for Young Children
- Residents within 50 metres of the school boundary (206 letters sent)

4. Consultation responses received

4.1. A total of six written comments were received. The key issues raised by consultees can be summarised as follows;

- Consultees expressed concerns regarding parking on roads, particularly Chilcombe Close, Blendworth Crescent, Stockheath Lane and Holybourne Road, by parents around the schools at the beginning and end of the school day. What improvements to accessing the schools are planned to help alleviate this problem?
- Traffic speeding along Stockheath Lane which is a main road that passes the entrance to the school presents a significant road safety risk. Are there any plans to make improvements to road safety measures in Stockheath Lane?

5. Comments on consultation responses received

5.1. With respect to the comments received around parking, there is a process that will be followed to identify issues and seek solutions. As part of the consultation process, officers from Hampshire County Council attended the consultation drop-in session to explain the process in developing a School Travel Plan (STP) and to seek the community's views and concerns over parking, travel and transport that exist. These concerns have been captured through a feedback response form whereby consultees categorised their position within the community and the comments that they have.

5.2. The School Travel Plan is a long-term document produced by the whole school community and any other interested/affected parties. It looks at how

children, parents, staff and visitors travel to and from school, and sets out measures to;

- Encourage and enable pupils, parents, guardians and staff to walk, scoot and cycle to school. Where this is not possible, consider public transport, car sharing or 'Park and Stride' to school.
- Encourage and provide educational programmes relating to child travel and how this links to the environment, safety and health.
- Improve safety.

- 5.3. Once the consultation forms have been collated and summarised, the school with the support of the School Travel Planning Team, will then survey pupils, parents and staff as to how they travel, the barriers that they may encounter, and suggestions as to improvements. Using the results of this along with responses from the principle to expand consultation the issues will be classified on behalf of the whole school community along with possible solutions.
- 5.4. The school and STP team will subsequently work with the various key stakeholders to develop an action plan to target the issues that are preventing pupils, parents and staff from using alternatives to the car. The initiatives identified will be a combination of physical measures such as scooter storage or crossing points, and 'soft' measures relating to education, promotion and enforcement. For those who have no alternative but to use the car, other options will be considered such as 'Park and Stride' sites.
- 5.5. The travel plan will link to a Transport Statement, undertaken by consultants, using additional data acquired from traffic surveys, accident data and parking beat surveys. The outcomes of the Transport Statement will clearly define between measures that are essential to mitigate against the travel impact of the increase in numbers, and desirable measures that will provide a general improvement to routes to school, long term.
- 5.6. The suggested proposals will be taken back to the school community at the pre planning consultation event for further discussion, and possible adjustment, prior to submission of the planning application.
- 5.7. A review of the staff car parking numbers will be undertaken against current parking regulations and if additional places are identified as being required then they will be provided as part of the school expansion project.

6. Conclusion

- 6.1. Pupil forecasts for Trosnant Infant and Trosnant Junior Schools show numbers growing as a result of increased demand for school places from within the school's catchment area. In order to meet the County Council's statutory duty to ensure sufficiency of school places, these schools need to be expanded.

6.2. The comments received during the consultation will be considered through the development of the school travel plan, the design process for the new school buildings and as part of the planning application process. In considering the responses received, the County Council felt that the provision of additional school places was necessary and that comments received did not represent sufficient concern to prevent proceeding with the enlargement.

7. Other options considered and rejected:

7.1. Not to approve the proposal would mean that there are insufficient primary school places available in the school to meet the demand from within the catchment area.

Enlargement of Trosnant Infant School and Trosnant Junior School – Consultation

I am writing to invite your views in respect of Hampshire County Council's proposal to permanently enlarge the premises of Trosnant Infant and Junior Schools.

Hampshire County Council are proposing to increase the physical capacity of Trosnant Infant School to allow them to offer 90 places for Year R (age 4+) and Trosnant Junior School 90 places for Year 3 (age 7+). This expansion will allow the schools to cater for 270 and 360 pupils respectively.

The demand for school places is a result of a rise in the number of births in the area and new housing development. It is intended that permanent facilities would be available from September 2018.

Reason for proposal

Hampshire County Council has a statutory duty to provide school places. Owing to an increase in the number of children in the school's catchment area, and in particular demand for Year R places, there is a need for additional school places to be provided.

Where a Local Authority proposes to permanently enlarge a school's capacity by 25% or more it must follow a procedure set out by the Department for Education. This information and some frequently asked questions are available on the following website;

The Consultation

The primary purpose of this consultation is to seek the view of consultees on the principle of enlarging the schools to meet the demand for additional school places in the local area. We understand that you may have some questions regarding how the school buildings will be expanded to accommodate additional pupils and whether there will be an impact on travel to and from the school as a result of accommodating additional pupils. Both of these aspects are important but at this stage these details will not be available as we need to obtain approval to the expansion before detailed work commences. It is important to hear your views at this stage so we can consider them as part of the detailed work to be undertaken should approval to the enlargement be obtained.

This consultation will run from 8 February to 18 March 2016. Officers will then take into consideration all the consultation responses received before deciding whether the proposal should continue to the formal publication stage.

If so, a statutory Public Notice will be published, setting out Hampshire County Council's intent to enlarge the schools. It is anticipated that this will be published in April 2016

After the date of publication there will be a four week period in which any representations can be made to the local authority. After the conclusion of this period the County Council will decide whether or not to proceed with the proposal. It is anticipated that a decision will be made by the end of the summer.


Further Information
