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1. Summary

- 1.1. The purpose of this paper is to provide an update on the development of the Health & Wellbeing Board following the workshop session on 27 September 2016.

2. Health and Wellbeing Board Priorities

- 2.1 Following the last Board meeting on 27 September 2016, a workshop session was held which was attended by 18 Board members. The workshop was led by Simon Bryant, Consultant in Public Health at Hampshire County Council, and table discussions were supported by public health officers.
- 2.2 A note of the workshop can be found in Appendix 1. Key outcomes and messages from the session were:
- 2.3 Board Members identified a priority cross cutting theme/ 'wicked issue' that the Board could add value to, under each of the strands of the Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy:
- Starting Well: Resilience for young people
 - Living Well: Obesity and physical activity
 - Ageing Well: Social isolation
 - Healthy Communities: Education/motivation to chose a healthy lifestyle
- 2.4 It is proposed that a further workshop take place in order to identify how the Board wishes to take forward these topics.

3. Support Arrangements for the Board

- 3.1. Since the meeting in September, the interim Health and Wellbeing Board Manager has started providing support to the Board. The Board Manager has

developed an interim Action Plan for the Board, and proposals regarding sub groups and other activities to support the Board. These proposals will be presented as part of the workshop session for discussion.

4. Recommendations

- 4.1. That the Health and Wellbeing Board note Appendix 1 as the outputs and outcome of the Health and Wellbeing Board workshop on 27 September 2016.
- 4.2. That the Health and Wellbeing Board support the proposal for a further workshop immediately following the meeting on 6 December 2016, to agree arrangements to support the work of the Board, and to agree how the 4 priority topics will be taken forward.
