Executive Summary

Involving the local community (consultees and interested parties) in the planning process is seen as a priority by the Government, who want local planning authorities like Hampshire County Council (HCC) to make it easier for everyone to be involved in planning in their local area.

The Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) is a statement of policy for involving local communities, consultees and interested parties in matters relating to minerals, waste and County Council developments within their local area. HCC is committed to encouraging and improving participation from all sections of the community.

This SCI describes how HCC will involve the local community:

- in **preparing, altering and reviewing minerals and waste planning policy** documents; and
- in **determining planning applications** for minerals, waste and County Council developments.

Local communities were asked for their views on the content of the Hampshire SCI through a consultation which ran from 13 January 2014 to 24 February 2014. The outcomes of the consultation were taken into account through the finalisation of the SCI, as appropriate.

This SCI includes improved procedures, reflecting the introduction of new procedures for consultation on planning applications (minerals and waste and County Council developments) and the methods used and experiences learnt from the preparation of the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan in relation to minerals and waste plan-making.

The SCI was adopted by HCC on [Date and month to be added once adopted 2014]. It replaces the SCI adopted by HCC in 2006⁽¹⁾ and its associated Addendum (2010)⁽²⁾.

How to get involved in planning in Hampshire

If it's important to you how Hampshire develops in the future, you can contribute to decisions shaping its development. Everyone in Hampshire uses minerals and discards waste. Everyone in Hampshire is therefore an interested party in these industries. This means that local communities (interested parties and consultees) will be affected by the planning policy decisions taken in Hampshire (in relation to minerals and waste).

Hampshire County Council (HCC) is also responsible for the provision of important community facilities such as schools and libraries which are important to all of Hampshire's residents in one way or another. This means that local communities will be affected by proposals for minerals or waste sites as well as County Council developments in Hampshire.

These are many ways in which you can get involved in planning in Hampshire. This may include:

- reading this Statement of Community Involvement (SCI);
- commenting on Minerals and Waste Development Plan Documents as they are published for consultation;
- checking HCC's website⁽³⁾ for details of minerals, waste or County Council proposals and let HCC have your views;
- reading site notices and newspaper announcements to find out more about local proposals;
- visiting HCC or your local district or borough council offices to look at planning application documentation for local minerals, waste or County Council development proposals;
- responding with your comments on proposals if you get a direct neighbour notification letter about minerals, waste or County Council proposals in or close to your area (of if you have any other interest), let HCC know what you feel about it;
- looking out for planning policy newsletters (for minerals and waste planning policy only);
- reading your parish newsletter or noticeboard for information about proposals in your area;
- attending public meetings and exhibitions about minerals, waste and County Council development proposals for your area, and ask questions about what is involved.

IT facilities are available for use, for free, in all local libraries, including some evenings and weekends if you don't have access to a computer.

If you need help to view or understand documents or plans produced by HCC, the council can make information available in alternative formats or languages (see back cover of this document).

These are just a few ways to get involved. All of these issues are considered in more detail in this SCI.

I. Introduction to the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement

- 1.0.1** Involving the local community (consultees and interested parties) in the planning process is seen as a priority by the Government, who want Local Planning Authorities (LPA) like Hampshire County Council (HCC) to make it easier for everyone to be involved in planning decisions in their local area.
- 1.0.2** This Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) is a statutory planning document which HCC is required to prepare by planning legislation⁽⁴⁾. It is a statement of policy for involving local communities in matters relating to development within the local area. In relation to HCC's planning role, the SCI relates to minerals, waste and County Council developments.
- 1.0.3** HCC as Local Planning Authority has the following responsibilities in relation to planning in Hampshire:

- minerals and waste **planning policy**;
- **determine planning applications** for mineral and waste management developments and County Council proposals such as schools and libraries; and
- **monitor** (and enforce when required) mineral and waste management sites to ensure compliance with planning permissions granted;
- **enforce planning control** on unauthorised development minerals and waste developments.

- 1.0.4** The SCI describes how HCC will involve the local community:

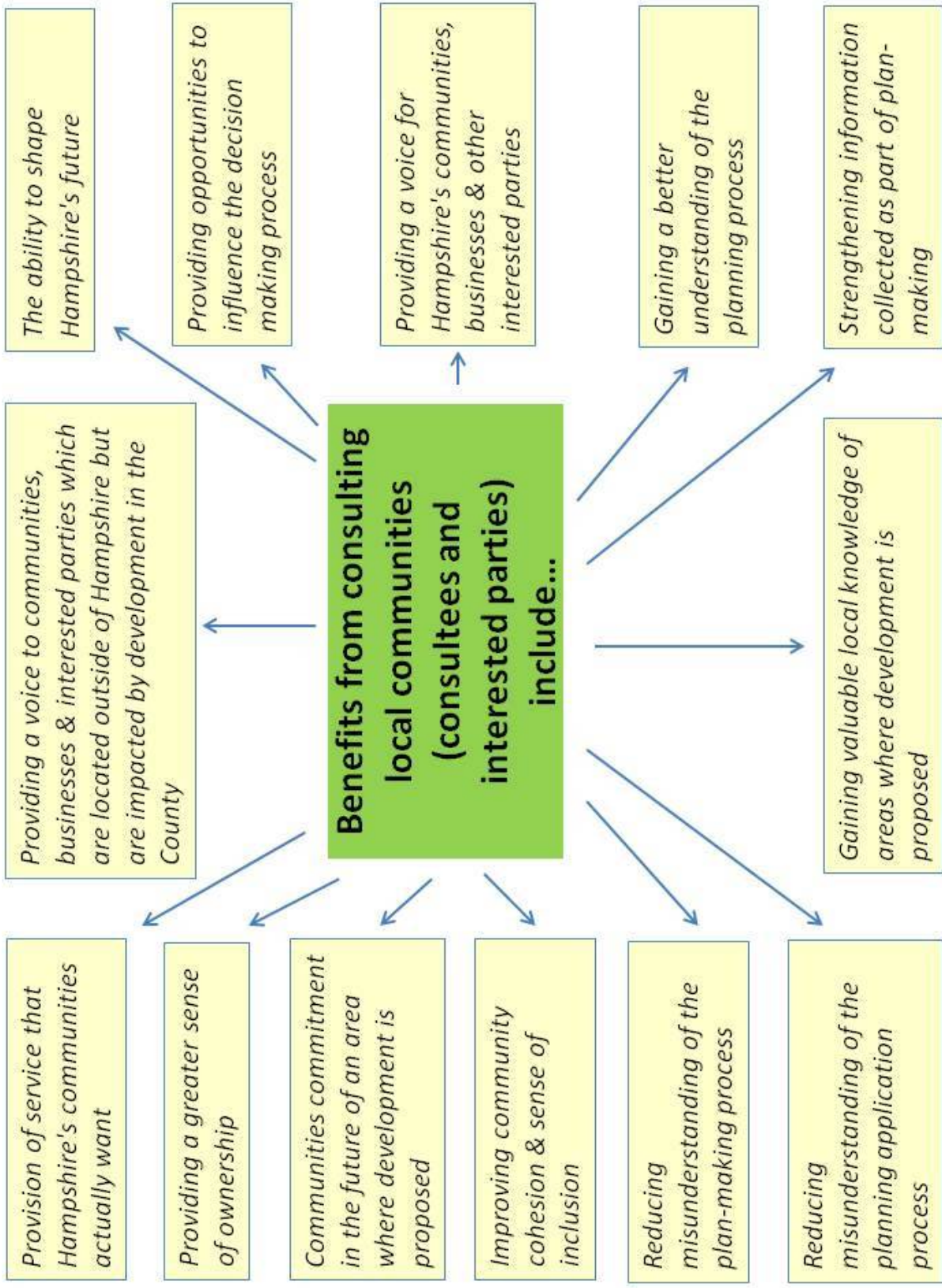
- in **preparing, altering and reviewing minerals and waste planning documents** (such as the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan (HMWP) and any subsequent plans / documents produced as part of the monitoring and implementation of the Plan); and
- in **determining planning applications** for minerals and waste developments, and developments relating to HCC's statutory duties (County Council developments).

- 1.0.5** This SCI includes improved procedures for involving Hampshire's local communities plan-making and in the determination of planning applications determined by HCC. It reflects the introduction of new procedures on consultation on minerals, waste and County Council development planning applications and the methods used and experiences learnt from the preparation of the HMWP.
- 1.0.6** HCC is committed to encouraging and improving participation from all sections of the community in planning.

I.1 Why prepare a Statement of Community Involvement?

- 1.1.1** It is important that local communities are involved in shaping plans for their areas. There are many benefits to be gained from consulting with the local communities. These include benefits highlighted in the following diagram.

Figure 1 - Benefits associated with consultation with local communities on planning issues



- 1.1.2** The introduction of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 was intended to make the planning system more efficient and relevant to local people. The Act ⁽⁵⁾ sets out the requirement for a Local Planning Authority to:

'prepare a statement of community involvement as a statement of the authority's policy to the involvement in the exercise of the authority's functions of persons who appear to the authority to have an interest in matters relating to development in their area'.

- 1.1.3** Section 18 of the Act defines a local planning authority's SCI as:

'a statement of their policy for involving interested parties in matters relating to development in their area'.

- 1.1.4** The SCI is a Local Development Document which is produced to describe the strategy. It is not a Development Plan Document (i.e. it is not a spatial plan and has not been subject to a Public Examination by an independent Planning Inspector).

- 1.1.5** HCC has have a duty to comply with its SCI once it has been adopted⁽⁶⁾.

1.2 Why has Hampshire revised it's Statement of Community Involvement?

- 1.2.1** Various changes in legislation have occurred since the previous Hampshire SCI was adopted in 2006. In 2008, the requirements to include the SCI in the Local Development Scheme (LDS) and for it to be independently examined were removed⁽⁷⁾. In addition, the LDS and the SCI no longer need to be submitted to the Secretary of State. The addendum to the SCI prepared in 2010 reflected some of these changes.

- 1.2.2** In 2011, the Localism Act⁽⁸⁾ set out a series of measures which sought to achieve a substantial and lasting shift in power away from central government and towards local people. The Act has resulted in a streamlining of plan preparation as well as a number of other relevant changes. Although the Localism Act did not propose any changes to the requirements for the SCI, it did introduce the 'duty to co-operate' and set out the requirements for consultation with key bodies and organisations on matters of strategic cross-boundary significance. HCC has a duty to co-operate⁽⁹⁾ with:

- Hampshire's **district and borough councils**;
- **surrounding minerals and waste planning authorities** (such as the other minerals and waste planning authorities⁽¹⁰⁾, Dorset, Wiltshire, West Sussex, Isle of Wight, West Berkshire and Surrey);

- **other minerals and waste planning authorities** with an interest in minerals and waste activities in Hampshire; and
- those that have a **related mineral or waste interest**.

1.2.3 Consequently, in preparing minerals and waste plans and in circumstances where development in Hampshire may impact other areas, it is important to involve neighbouring LPA's and other consultees and interested parties. As a result, the duty to co-operate is also an important consideration which needs to be reflected in a revised SCI.

1.2.4 In recognition of these reforms, the Government published revised Local Planning Regulations in 2012⁽¹¹⁾. These introduced changes which are relevant to the SCI. In particular:

- a simplified plan preparation process with fewer formal stages; and
- more streamlined consultation and engagement requirements which reflect the simplified system; and
- taking account of increased use and availability of electronic communications such as email and the web.

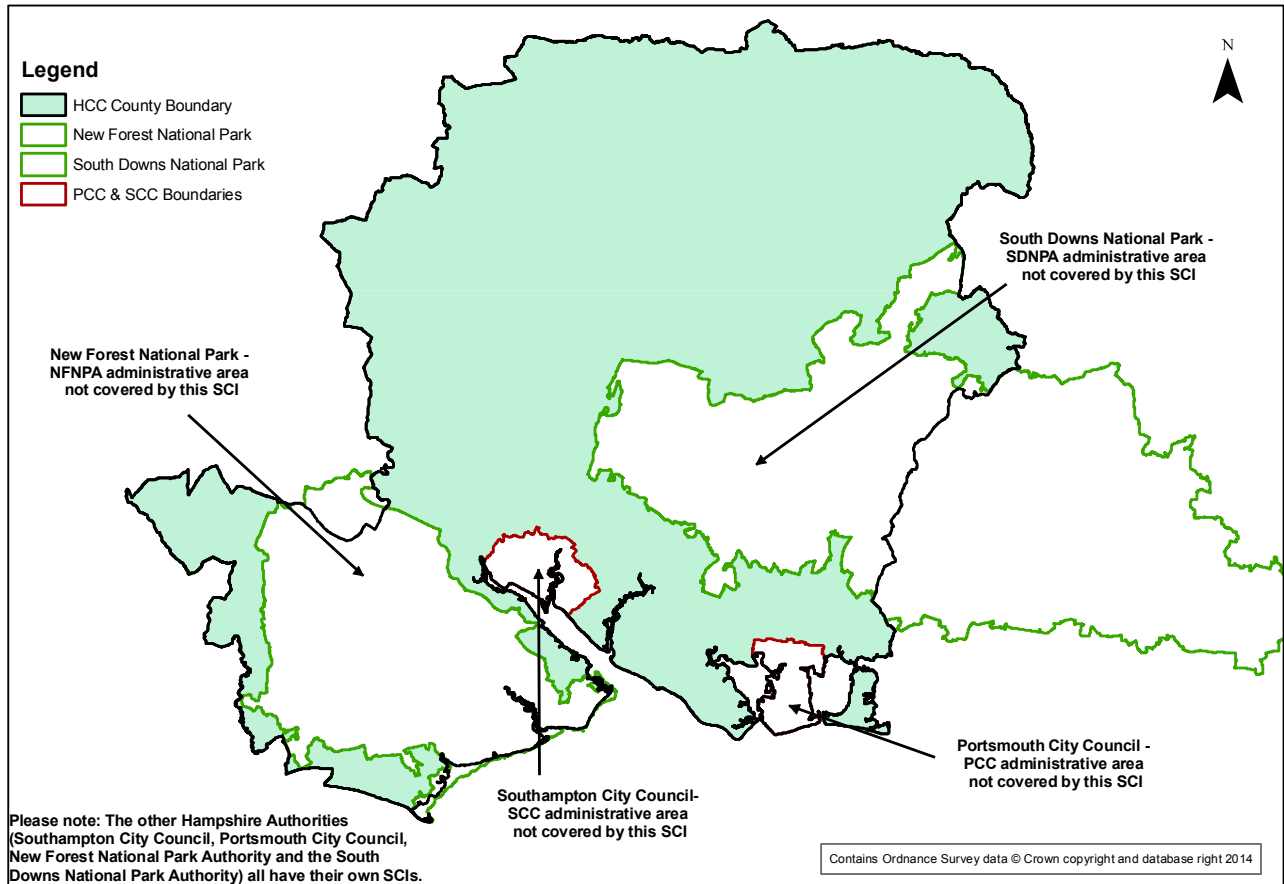
1.3 What does the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement cover and how will it be used?

1.3.1 This SCI applies to the:

- **preparation and revision of Minerals and Waste Plans and associated documentation;** and the
- **exercise of HCC's functions in relation to development management** (processing and determining planning applications for minerals, waste and County Council developments).

1.3.2 The SCI covers the administrative area of HCC only, as set out in the following map.

Figure 2 - The area this Statement of Community Involvement covers - Hampshire County Council



1.3.3 Involvement in the preparation of Minerals and Waste Plans and in the planning application process (for minerals, waste or County Council developments) is a key area where local communities can be involved in the planning process in Hampshire and there are various ways in which this can be achieved.

1.3.4 This SCI describes how HCC will:

- **meet legal requirements** to ensure community involvement in the planning process, who should get involved, when, and how (see section 2. 'Who needs to be involved in the planning process in Hampshire?').
- **involve** the local communities at each **stage of plan-making for Minerals and Waste Plan's or associated planning documents** (e.g. Supplementary Planning Documents - see section 3. 'Planning Policy - Preparation of a Minerals and Waste Plan or Supplementary Planning Documents');
- **involve** the local communities in **coming to decisions on planning applications for minerals, waste and County Council developments** (see section 4. 'Development management - minerals, waste and County Council development planning applications'); and
- **provide feedback** to local communities.

1.3.5 With regards to plan-making, HCC has worked in partnership with other Minerals and Waste Planning Authorities to produce joint minerals and waste development plans. This has included the:

- Hampshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan (1998) (HMWLP): prepared in partnership with Southampton and Portsmouth City Council's;
- Hampshire Minerals and Waste Core Strategy (2007) (HMWCS): prepared in partnership with Southampton and Portsmouth City Council's and the New Forest National Park Authority; and the
- Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan (2013): prepared in partnership with Southampton City Council and Portsmouth City Council and the New Forest National Park Authority and South Downs National Park Authority.

1.3.6 More information on plan-making and planning applications is set out in sections 3. 'Planning Policy - Preparation of a Minerals and Waste Plan or Supplementary Planning Documents' and 4. 'Development management - minerals, waste and County Council development planning applications'.

1.3.7 Copies of this SCI are available to view at the following locations:

- on the HCC website at www.hants.gov.uk/county-planning; or
- at HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and during normal office hours).

1.3.8 Further information on how to contact the HCC Planning team can be found in section 9. 'Where can I find out more information on planning issues and the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement?'.

1.4 How was the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement prepared?

1.4.1 Local communities were consulted on the content of a draft SCI through a consultation which ran from 13 January 2014 to 24 February 2014. The consultation gave an opportunity to comment on the contents of the revised SCI.

1.4.2 A summary report of the outcomes of the consultation was produced and is available to view on the HCC website⁽¹²⁾.

1.4.3 The outcomes of the consultation were taken into account through the finalisation of the SCI, as appropriate.

1.5 What is not covered by the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement?

1.5.1 Section 1.3 'What does the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement cover and how will it be used?' already clearly shows the administrative areas which is covered by this SCI. In particular, the SCI does not cover the the administrative areas of:

- Southampton City Council (SCC);
- Portsmouth City Council (PCC);

- New Forest National Park Authority (NFNPA); or
- South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA).

1.5.2 SCC, PCC, NFNPA and SDNPA are Minerals and Waste Planning Authorities within their own administrative area.

1.5.3 These LPA's have produced their own SCIs⁽¹³⁾⁽¹⁴⁾⁽¹⁵⁾⁽¹⁶⁾, describing how each Council will seek to get their own local communities involved in the most effective way.

1.5.4 The other partner's SCIs reference the HCC SCI with regards to:

- plan-making for minerals and waste; and the
- involvement of local communities in the implementation and monitoring of the HMWP and any subsequent guidance documents produced as part of the partnership.

1.5.5 SCC, PCC, NFNPA and SDNPA are also the determining authority for other non minerals, waste or County Council developments (e.g. housing, offices, industrial, retail units etc) as well as Hampshire's District, and Borough Councils. This SCI does not relate to other non minerals, waste or County Council developments as HCC is not the determining Local Planning Authority for other such proposals. Like the City Council's and National Park Authorities, Hampshire's District and Borough Councils will also have their own SCIs which describe how each Council will seek to get their own local communities involved in the planning process.

2. Who needs to be involved in the planning process in Hampshire?

2.0.1 Hampshire County Council (HCC) is committed to ensuring local communities (consultees and interested parties) are involved in the planning process so that everyone has an opportunity to be involved in planning decisions that affect them. This section of the Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) considers:

- who needs to be involved in the **minerals and waste plan-making** process and **planning application** process (minerals, waste and County Council developments) in Hampshire; and
- how the **SCI links to the Hampshire Sustainable Community Strategy (HSCS)**.

2.1 Who is the local community?

2.1.1 Since they are affected by planning decisions, consultees (organisations and individuals who are consulted on plan-making and /or planning applications) and interested parties need an opportunity to make their views known before minerals and waste plans are adopted and before any planning decisions are made.

2.1.2 To do this effectively, it is necessary to first identify the relevant consultees and interested parties for minerals and waste and County Council developments.

2.1.3 For minerals and waste planning (plan-making and planning applications) in Hampshire, it is suggested that the local community includes anyone who is:

- **affected or potentially affected by minerals developments;**
- **reliant on the production of minerals;**
- **involved in the production, landing or importation of minerals in Hampshire or with an interest** in those activities;
- **affected or potentially affected by waste developments;**
- **involved in the production, recycling or disposal of waste;** and
- **affected or potentially affected by an existing or proposed minerals or waste proposal.**

2.1.4 Since most people who live or work in Hampshire rely on minerals and produce waste, the local community therefore covers just about all of the people, groups and organisations who live, work or spend time in Hampshire. The local community also includes Hampshire's neighbouring areas (where relevant). Together, they may all be affected by minerals and waste plan-making or impacted by minerals, waste or County Council development planning decisions and therefore all have a 'stake' or an interest in the planning process.

2.1.5 For County Council developments (planning applications) in Hampshire, it is suggested that the 'local community' includes anyone who:

- **is affected or potentially affected by a County Council proposal or development;** and
- **uses or relies on County Council developments** (e.g. Schools and libraries).

2.1.6 Figure 3 divides potential consultees and interested parties into:

- **statutory consultees** (those bodies which are automatically consulted on minerals and waste plan-making or all minerals, waste or County Council planning applications);
- **other consultees and interested parties;** and
- **marginalised communities and groups.**

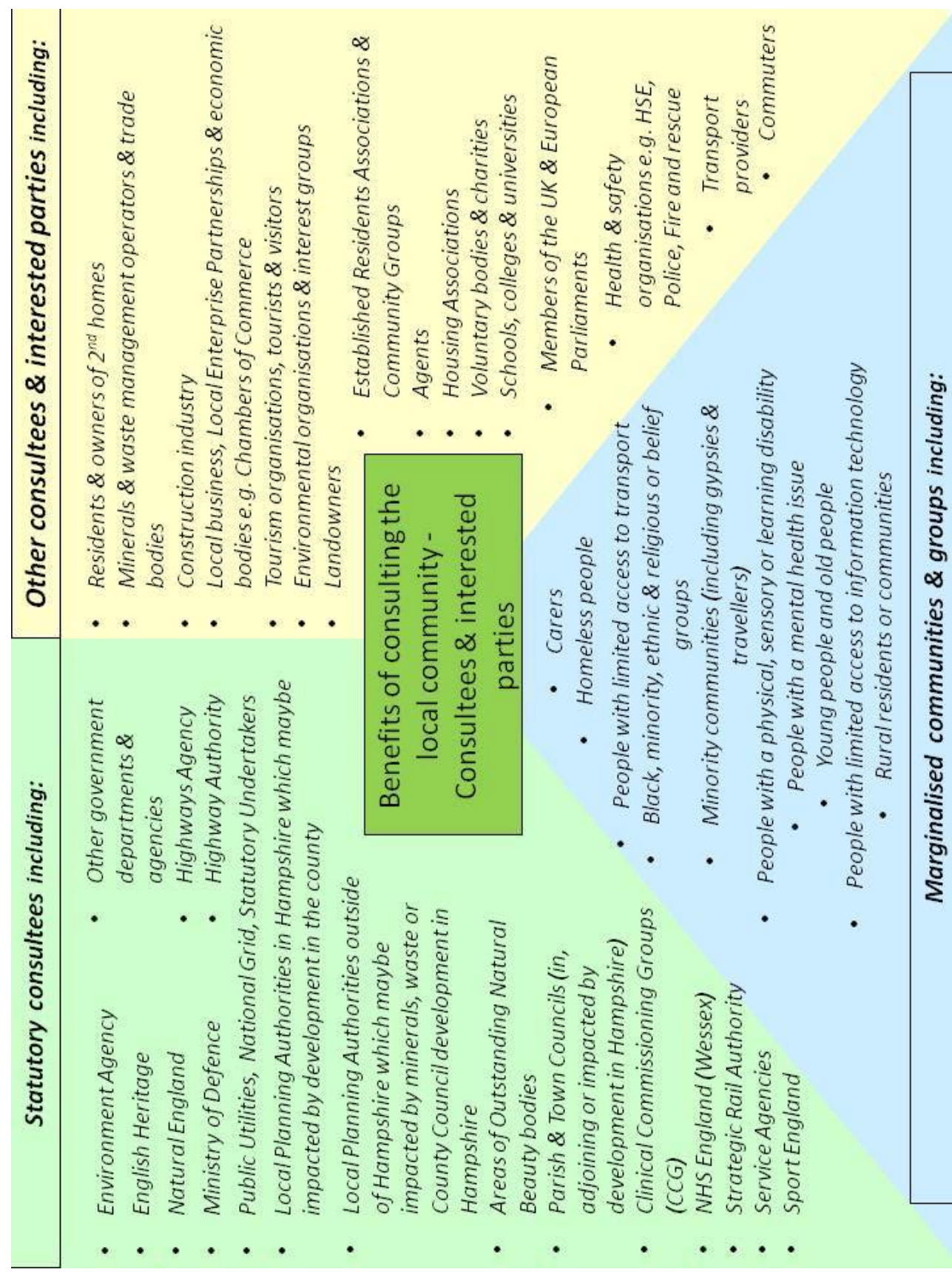
2.1.7 The diagram gives examples of the range of groups which should and could be involved. It sets out those interested parties and consultees who may need to be involved in plan-making or in the planning application process as they have a known interest and/or who have expressed an interest in getting involved.

2.1.8 It is important to note that this SCI **does not set out an exhaustive list of consultees or interested parties**. However, HCC will comply with Regulation 2 of the Town and Country Planning (Local Development) (England) Regulations 2004⁽¹⁷⁾⁽¹⁸⁾ in identifying consultees.

2.1.9 HCC will only consult with bodies where the subject matter of the Plan or planning application affects them or where a specific request has been made to be consulted. Relevant 'other consultees and interested parties' and 'marginalised communities and groups' groups will be identified and contacted as appropriate, depending on the nature of the issue. More detailed information on consultees and interested parties is provided in 'Appendix 1: Consultees and interested parties'. Table 2 in 'Appendix 3: Options for community involvement - plan-making' includes more information on approaches that may be used in contacting consultees.

2.2 How does the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement link to the Hampshire Sustainable Community Strategy?

- 2.2.1** The Government has indicated that it would like to see greater integration between community strategies and planning documents. In 2000, the Local Government Act⁽¹⁹⁾ gave local authorities increased responsibility for promoting the economic, social and environmental well-being of their area.
- 2.2.2** The community priorities, at the time, were captured in the *Sustainable Community Strategy (SCS)*. The first *Hampshire Community Strategy (HCS) - Shaping our future together - a Community Strategy for Hampshire 2004 - 2007*⁽²⁰⁾ was published in 2004 and developed by the Hampshire Strategic Partnership. This was subsequently endorsed by the Hampshire Senate to reflect the priorities for Hampshire's communities and provide a framework for collaborative working in the County.
- 2.2.3** A new community strategy was published in 2008. This is known as *Hampshire Sustainable Community Strategy (HSCS)*⁽²¹⁾ which covers 2008-2018. The HSCS builds on the HCS (2004).
- 2.2.4** The HSCS sets out quality of life issues and key trends that impact on Hampshire and identifies 11 long term ambitions to achieve the vision that:

'Hampshire continues to prosper, providing greater opportunity for all without risking the environment'.

- 2.2.5** The long term ambitions of the HSCS are as follows:

1. Hampshire is a globally competitive environment for business growth and investment, where everyone has the opportunity to develop their skills and play a full part in the county's success;
2. Hampshire provides excellent opportunities for children and young people;
3. Infrastructure and services are developed to support economic and housing growth whilst protecting the environment and quality of life;
4. Social and affordable housing needs are met, including provision to support rural communities;
5. Hampshire's communities are cohesive and inclusive, and vulnerable people are safeguarded;
6. Hampshire and its partners work to reduce inequalities in outcomes for residents according to individual needs and through a focus on specific areas of multiple disadvantage;
7. Hampshire's communities feel safe and can expect not to suffer violence or anti-social behaviour;
8. Hampshire's residents can make choices to improve their health and wellbeing;

9. Hampshire's environment and cultural heritage are enjoyed and celebrated;
10. Hampshire is acclaimed for conserving and using natural resources more efficiently, and for reducing and adapting to the effects of climate change; and
11. Hampshire's residents receive excellent public services and value for money.

2.2.6 The HSCS looks at the sort of place people want Hampshire to be, drawing on community plans from across the county and from a range of consultations. It describes the quality of life in Hampshire in 2008, then considers the challenges to that quality of life over the years covered by the HSCS.

2.2.7 The HSCS takes account of community planning at district and more local level and reflects priorities that have been developed in regional⁽²²⁾ and county strategies. It is based on what is known from a wide range of surveys conducted by HCC and partners. It includes a quality of life analysis which is based on data that enables measurement and comparisons of circumstances in different parts of the county. By stating a longer-term vision and ambitions, the HSCS provides a framework for partners in their individual and collaborative work. Partner's plans and strategies are increasingly based on rigorous assessments to establish clear outcomes and priorities. Examples of needs assessments carried out included surveys on:

- children and young people;
- older people and other vulnerable groups;
- public health and inequalities;
- housing;
- the Regional Spatial Strategy;
- the regional economic strategy; and
- community safety.

2.2.8 The HSCS document aims to support planning processes by considering how major challenges might affect the outcomes that partners are aiming for. It promotes debate on how these challenges might be addressed collectively and in a way that cuts across different topics.

2.2.9 The duty to produce the HSCS is planned to be repealed as part of the Deregulation Bill which is currently going through Parliament. A general power of competence has been introduced, following the preparation of the HSCS, through the Localism Act 2011⁽²³⁾.

2.2.10 Minerals and waste plan-making and the determination of minerals, waste or County Council planning applications in Hampshire both have a role to play in supporting the HSCS and the delivery of its objectives.

3. Planning Policy - Preparation of a Minerals and Waste Plan or Supplementary Planning Documents

3.0.1 This section of the Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) considers how the Hampshire County Council (HCC) will:

- **publicise and consult on the Plans produced for minerals and waste** in Hampshire;
- **publicise and consult on any supplementary minerals and waste plan work** in Hampshire, produced to support the implementation of the adopted Minerals and Waste Plan;
- **deal with responses received** as part of consultation on plan-making; and
- **show how the local community, consultees and interested parties will be involved in the development of Minerals and Waste Plans and associated documentation** in Hampshire.

3.0.2 The Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan (HMWP) (2013) was prepared by HCC in partnership with Portsmouth and Southampton City Councils and the New Forest and South Downs National Park Authorities (the 'Hampshire Authorities'). It was adopted by the Hampshire Authorities on 15 October 2013 and supersedes the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Core Strategy (2007) (HMWCS) and the saved policies of the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan (1998) (HMWLP).

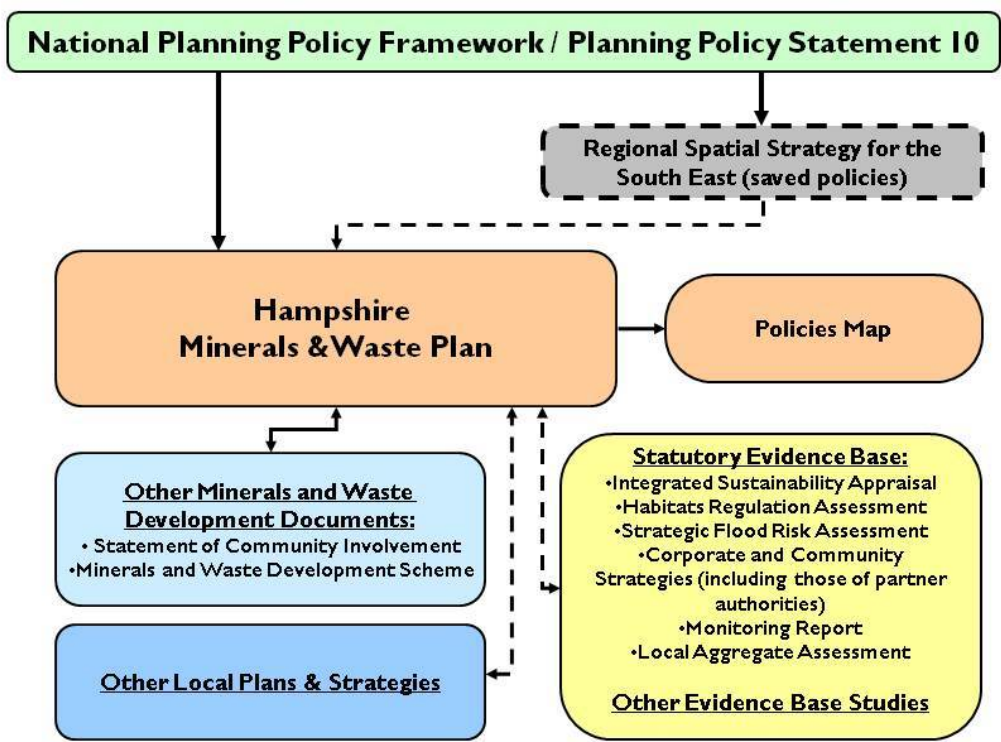
3.0.3 The HMWP was developed, taking into account national and local minerals and waste policy and issues. It will guide HCC in determining county-related minerals and waste planning applications. This issue is considered in more detail in section 4. 'Development management - minerals, waste and County Council development planning applications'. It will also be used by the other Hampshire Authorities to guide minerals and waste development within their own administrative boundaries.

3.0.4 The Hampshire Minerals and Waste Development Scheme (HMWDS) is the project timetable which gives information and detail about the preparation and review of all the various minerals and waste development documents in Hampshire. The HMWDS is particularly useful for anyone involved in plan-making for the HMWP and associated work, as it sets out when each minerals and waste development document was available for formal consultation.

3.0.5 The HMWDS is produced by HCC. The HMWDS does not cover the Portsmouth City Council, Southampton City Council, New Forest National Park or South Downs National Park Authority administrative areas who are minerals and waste planning authorities within their own areas. The other Hampshire Authorities are responsible for preparing their own separate Local Development Schemes (LDS). However, the other Hampshire Authorities LDSs will signpost the HMWDS in relation to preparation of minerals and waste plans and associated work.

3.0.6 As described in the HMWDS, the SCI sits alongside the adopted HMWP and other planning documents. This is highlighted in Figure 4.

Figure 4 - How planning policy documents in Hampshire sit with the Statement of Community Involvement and national policy and other documentation



3.0.7 The current HMWDS is available online on the HCC website⁽²⁴⁾. Further information can also be obtained from HCC via the contact details outlined in section 9. 'Where can I find out more information on planning issues and the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement?'.

3.0.8 Other strategies such as the Hampshire Sustainable Communities Strategy (HSCS) sit alongside the evidence base for the HMWP (see section 2.2 'How does the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement link to the Hampshire Sustainable Community Strategy?').

3.0.9 The HMWDS will be monitored and updated if new Minerals and Waste Plans or associated planning documents need to be produced, or changes to the published timetable are required. Any updates to the HMWDS will also be made available on the HCC website⁽²⁵⁾.

3.1 Plan-making

- 3.1.1** It is important that community involvement begins at the start of plan preparation so that the opportunities exist to flag up relevant issues, considerations or concerns which local communities (consultees and interested parties) wish the plan to take on board, and to ensure any options are considered early on. HCC considers it vital to keep local communities informed about the progress of plans and the outcome of consultations.
- 3.1.2** The stages that each planning document has to go through during its preparation, together with the community involvement and consultation is required at each stage is set out in the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012⁽²⁶⁾.
- 3.1.3** This SCI explains how HCC's commitment to consultation in the published SCI will apply to these stages. It is important to note that the Regulations introduced a number of changes to the process of preparing the development plans from that which was included in the previous Hampshire SCI (2006).
- 3.1.4** The following table sets out the key stages of plan-making. 'Appendix 2: Stages of plan-making and the delivery of the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan (2013)' sets out more information on how each stage was delivered through the HMWP.

- 3.1.5** Further information on each of the stages in the preparation of DPDs is available from the Planning Advisory Service⁽³⁴⁾.
- 3.1.6** Where required and appropriate, HCC will appoint consultants to supplement the work for minerals and waste plan-making and associated work. Appointment of consultants will be carried out, where applicable, in discussion with the other Hampshire Authorities. Appointments will be made in accordance with HCC guidance.

How will Hampshire County Council meet the requirements of the Strategic Environmental Assessment Directive?

- 3.1.7** HCC will prepare an environmental report, as required under the Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) Directive⁽³⁵⁾. HCC combines this with Sustainability Appraisal in a process known as Integrated Sustainability Appraisal (ISA).
- 3.1.8** An ISA Report and associated work was prepared to facilitate the delivery of the HMWP. Following the adoption of the HMWP, any further Minerals and Waste Plans or associated work (e.g. Supplementary Planning Documents) produced will also be subject to ISA, to ensure that the requirements of European and National policy are met. ISA work to be undertaken is noted in Stages 1 to 4 of Table 3.1 ' - Stages of plan-making as set out in the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012'.
- 3.1.9** HCC will ensure that consultees and interested parties will have an opportunity to comment on the ISA throughout its development to allow the findings to inform the development of any Plan and associated documentation being produced.

How will Hampshire County Council meet the requirements of the Habitats Regulations?

- 3.1.10** HCC has a duty to ensure that any Plan (and associated documentation) prepared is in accordance with the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2010 (the Habitats Regulations)⁽³⁶⁾. This assessment examines the impact that a Plan would have on the integrity of the sites designated under the EU Habitats Directive. The HMWP was subject to continuous iterative assessment throughout Plan preparation. In accordance with Regulation 102 of the 2010 Regulations, Natural England was consulted on the Habitats Regulation Assessment (HRA) as part of plan preparation. A final HRA Record⁽³⁷⁾ was produced and was published alongside the Plan upon adoption. This includes concluding comments from Natural England.
- 3.1.11** Any further or future plan preparation work will also be undertaken in accordance with the requirements of the 2010 Regulations as appropriate. Relevant statutory consultees (e.g. Natural England) will be consulted in relation to this issue.

How will Hampshire County Council monitor the implementation of an adopted Minerals and Waste Plan?

- 3.1.12** Following the adoption of a Minerals and Waste Plan (e.g. the HMWP), HCC and its partners will implement and monitor the Plan. If further work is required following the adoption of the HMWP, as part of its implementation and monitoring, the work will be developed in line with the provisions of this SCI.
- 3.1.13** HCC will produce a Monitoring Report (MR) on behalf of the plan-making partnership for the HMWP. The MR will review how effective the implementation of the adopted planning policies has been as well as providing statistical information on minerals and waste planning permissions granted annually. This implements the commitment to monitor the Plan. The results of the monitoring will identify if a review of the adopted Plan is required or if further work is required as part of the implementation of the Plan.
- 3.1.14** The latest version of the MR is available to view on the HCC website⁽³⁸⁾.
- 3.1.15** A review of the HMWP is anticipated within 5 years of the adoption of the Plan unless monitoring of the Plan indicates that a full or partial review of the Plan is required at an earlier date. Any further minerals and waste plans prepared will need to comply with this SCI.

3.1.1 Consultation on plan-making

- 3.1.1.1** Planning legislation⁽³⁹⁾ sets out specific consultation groups that HCC must contact for plan-making including:
- statutory agencies;
 - organisations; and
 - government departments.
- 3.1.1.2** It also identifies General Consultation Bodies who may be contacted. 'Appendix 1: Consultees and interested parties' has more information on the members or potential members of these 'consultation bodies'.
- 3.1.1.3** An extensive database of consultees and interested parties thought likely to have an interest in mineral and waste planning policy in Hampshire is maintained and updated as required. This database has been built up by those who have previously contributed to consultations on Hampshire's planning policy work over the years and have requested to be kept informed about plan-making. Everyone on this database has been contacted to confirm their continuing interest in minerals and waste issues, and in community involvement as part of the preparation of the HMWP and this SCI.
- 3.1.1.4** Any organisation or individual can be added to this list at any time by emailing, writing to or telephoning the Planning Policy team at HCC with their details (see section 9. 'Where can I find out more information on planning issues and the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement?').

- 3.1.1.5** The involvement of organisations and individuals on the list of consultees may be tailored by officers to particular interests or circumstances for plan-making. For example, some consultees and interested parties:
- may be concerned only with mineral planning issues whereas others may wish to be consulted on waste matters; and
 - may only be concerned with development in certain geographical locations.
- 3.1.1.6** As already indicated, the Localism Act 2011⁽⁴⁰⁾ introduced a 'duty to cooperate' on planning issues that cross administrative boundaries⁽⁴¹⁾. This co-operation must be done 'constructively, actively and on an on-going basis'. This may in some cases involve consulting with authorities who are not geographically adjacent. For the purposes of the HMWP or subsequent plans, the duty is taken to apply to the authorities and bodies who are impacted by the minerals and waste provision or requirements for Hampshire.
- 3.1.1.7** Various stages of plan-making can include consultation periods (see Table 3.1 in section 3.1 'Plan-making'). In the event of a consultation, consultees and interested parties will be invited to make comments on:
- **consultation documents** produced as part of plan preparation;
 - **evidence base documents** that are produced to sit alongside the various stages of plan-making (as appropriate);
 - **draft Plan**; and
 - **proposed modifications** to the submission Plan (as required).
- 3.1.1.8** Consultation will take place for a minimum of six weeks (or period set by the other plan-making partner SCIs above six weeks).
- 3.1.1.9** A variety of approaches will be used by HCC to involve the local community in preparing any further or future minerals and waste plans and associated documentation. 'Appendix 3: Options for community involvement - plan-making' links the techniques outlined in this section of the SCI as well as other techniques to the specific stages of preparing the HMWP and any subsequent minerals or waste plans or associated documentation which may be prepared.
- 3.1.1.10** The following table sets out the types of consultation methods which HCC will use to consult on minerals and waste plan-making in Hampshire.

3.1.2 Commenting on plan-making

- 3.1.2.1** Anyone can comment during the preparation of a Minerals and Waste Plan by submitting comments to HCC for consideration. The plan-making process offers stages in which local communities (consultees and interested parties) will be asked for their views (see Table 3.1 ' - Stages of plan-making as set out in the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012' which sets out the stages of plan-making).
- 3.1.2.2** The HCC website provides the opportunity to comment on the plan-making process in the following ways:
- via the HCC website: www.hants.gov.uk/county-planning;
 - by email: planning@hants.gov.uk; or
 - in writing: see address in section 9. 'Where can I find out more information on planning issues and the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement?'.
- 3.1.2.3** Guidance on how to respond to consultations on plan-making will be issued at the time of the consultation.
- 3.1.2.4** All comments received will be available to view at HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and within normal office hours).
- 3.1.2.5** All written representations will be entered on the HCC consultation database prepared for each specific consultation.
- 3.1.2.6** A redacted copy (i.e with all personal information removed) of all comments received will be made available following the end of the consultation period on the HCC website⁽⁵⁴⁾.
- 3.1.2.7** Responses received will be summarised and documented in the officers report, as required (see section 3.1.3 'Reporting back on the outcomes of plan-making consultations').
- 3.1.2.8** The responses to any consultation on plan-making will be considered and taken into account as part of plan preparation.

3.1.3 Reporting back on the outcomes of plan-making consultations

3.1.3.1 The following table considers how HCC will report back on the results of consultations on plan-making.

Summarising responses received as part of minerals and waste plan preparation is a statutory requirement, to be observed when a document goes to the next stage of consultation or before it is submitted to the Government. In the case of comments received on evidence base documents, the same approach will be followed by which the representations received will be analysed and a summary of the comments will be made publicly available on the HCC website⁽⁵⁶⁾ and at the HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and during normal office hours).

3.1.4 Notification of adoption of a Minerals and Waste Plan

- 3.1.4.1** Once a public examination of a Minerals and Waste Plan has been completed, HCC will receive an Inspector's Report from the Planning Inspectorate. This will detail the findings of the public examination and will set out whether the Plan is suitable for adoption (if the plan is sound).
- 3.1.4.2** All consultees and interested parties will be advised of the publication of the Inspector's Report when it is published by HCC, including information on where this can be viewed.
- 3.1.4.3** Anyone who has asked to be notified of the adoption of the Plan will be notified (by email or letter) that adoption has taken place and will be sent a copy of the Adoption Statement.
- 3.1.4.4** The Inspector's Report and adoption documentation will be available to view on the HCC County Planning website⁽⁵⁸⁾ and at the HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and during normal office hours).

3.2 Supplementary Planning Documents

- 3.2.1** There may be a need to prepare Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs). SPDs can be developed to provide guidance on local planning matters or to explain how adopted policies in Local Plans are to be delivered. HCC may prepare SPDs to provide greater details on the policies of its development plan documents if these are considered to be required.
- 3.2.2** There is no requirement for SPDs to be listed in a LPA's Local Development Scheme (e.g. In the case of HCC, the HMWDS), so they can be brought forward as circumstances change. However, where HCC and its plan-making partners intend to deliver supplementary documentation and this is known, this will be presented in any updates to the HMWDS.
- 3.2.3** SPDs are not required to have a specific link or be related to a DPD policy. SPDs must be consistent with national planning policy but must not include further policies over and above what is already included in adopted Minerals and Waste Plans e.g. the HMWP. Therefore, where a DPD has already been adopted, this consistency will be achieved by ensuring that the SPD is not in conflict with them.

How will Hampshire County Council meet the requirements of the Strategic Environmental Assessment Directive?

- 3.2.4** HCC will carry out an ISA during the preparation of a SPD and publish the findings for comment at relevant stages of the SPD preparation.

How will Hampshire County Council meet the requirements of the Habitats Regulations?

- 3.2.5** HCC will carry out HRA work during the preparation of a SPD and publish the findings, as appropriate.

3.2.1 Consultation on Supplementary Planning Document preparation

- 3.2.1.1** Unlike DPDs, SPDs are not examined by a Planning Inspector. However, the preparation of a SPD is still subject to a process of consultation and engagement with relevant consultees and interested parties. The preparation of any SPD will adhere to the following minimum level of public participation, in accordance with the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012⁽⁵⁹⁾.
- 3.2.1.2** Consultees and interested parties will be invited to make comments on the draft SPD for a minimum of six weeks (or period set by the other plan-making partner SCIs above six weeks). This is over and above the minimum requirements for consultation on SPDs as set out in the Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 of 4 weeks.
- 3.2.1.3** The following table sets out the consultation methods for SPD preparation.

- 3.2.2.6** A redacted copy of all comments received in relation to a SPD will be made available following the end of the consultation the HCC website⁽⁷¹⁾.
- 3.2.2.7** The responses to any consultation on SPD preparation will be considered and taken into account as part of it's preparation. 3.2.4 Notification of adoption of a Supplementary Planning Document

3.2.4.1 HCC will be responsible for adopting any SPD it prepares.

3.2.4.2 An Adoption Statement, together with the adopted SPD and associated documentation, will be placed on HCC's website⁽⁷⁴⁾ and will be available to view in the HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and during normal office hours) as well as the offices of the other Hampshire Authorities involved in document preparation.

3.2.4.3 HCC will prepare and publish a consultation statement at the time of adoption. This will set out the following:

- who was consulted during the preparation of the SPD;
- what the main issues raised; and
- how these issues have been taken into account in the adopted SPD.

3.2.4.4 HCC will publish a Statement of Conformity with the SCI when the SPD is adopted. This will be available to view on HCC website⁽⁷⁵⁾.

3.2.4.5 Anyone who has asked to be notified of the adoption of the SPD will be notified (by email or letter) that adoption has taken place and will be sent a copy of the Adoption Statement.

4. Development management - minerals, waste and County Council development planning applications

4.0.1 This section of the Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) considers how Hampshire County Council (HCC) will:

- **publicise and consult** on the **minerals, waste and County Council development planning applications** it deals with; and
- show how the **local community (consultees and interested parties) will be involved in the consideration of these planning applications.**

4.0.2 The planning applications which HCC deal with are 'County Matters' and 'County Council' developments. Hampshire's District, Borough, City Councils and National Park Authorities are the Local Planning Authorities (LPA) which deal with other planning applications. This includes proposals for housing, offices, industrial, retail etc.

4.0.3 There are three types of '**County Matters**'. These are planning applications for:

- mineral working;
- treating, storing, processing, recovery of energy and the disposal of waste; and
- ancillary and minor developments associated with minerals and waste sites.

4.0.4 '**County Council**' developments are those related to HCC's own development proposals including:

- schools;
- libraries;
- social services facilities; and
- highways.

4.0.5 Minerals and waste planning applications within the administrative areas of Portsmouth and Southampton City Councils and the New Forest and South Downs National Park Authorities will be dealt with by those Authorities and HCC is not the Local Planning Authority within those areas.

4.0.6 At the time of the adoption of this SCI (2014), HCC is processing minerals, waste and County Council development planning applications on behalf of the South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA) under a legal agreement. This agreement works to the standards and requirements set out in a Service Level Agreement. The final decision on whether a planning application should be granted or refused will be taken by the SDNPA.

4.0.7 Any County Council developments which may fall within the National Park administrative boundaries will also be considered by the relevant National Park Authority and not HCC.

4.0.8 The planning process is summarised on the HCC website⁽⁷⁶⁾.

4.0.9 A Development Control Charter is available on the HCC website⁽⁷⁷⁾ which sets out the standards of service the HCC aims to provide.

4.1 Pre-application discussions

4.1.1 The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF)⁽⁷⁸⁾ encourages pre-application discussions and states that:

'early engagement has significant potential to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the planning application system for all parties'⁽⁷⁹⁾.

4.1.2 It also indicates that:

'good quality pre-application discussion enables better coordination between public and private resources and improved outcomes for the community'⁽⁸⁰⁾.

4.1.3 HCC as local Minerals and Waste Planning Authority (MWPA) has a key role to play in encouraging other parties to take maximum advantage of the pre-application stage. HCC encourages developers to enter into pre-application discussions with the Council to:

- **establish the information that will be required** at the planning application stage;
- **identify key issues** associated with any potential planning application; and
- **identify key planning policies** associated with any potential planning application.

4.1.4 Pre-application discussions mainly take place between the developer and the relevant MWPA as they are largely technical exercises. However, they can in some instances provide an opportunity for local communities to be engaged in the planning application process.

4.1.5 HCC also encourages developers to talk to local communities about proposals, at the earliest stage, to inform them of their plans and to ensure that a link with the local community is established at an early stage in the planning application process. This may take place through the relevant Parish or Town Council or could involve the developer setting up an independent event for the local community to attend.

4.1.6 HCC charges a fee for pre-planning application advice for proposed minerals and waste development. More information on pre-application advice and the process for this being delivered can be found on the HCC website⁽⁸¹⁾.

4.1.7 HCC cannot require a developer to engage with the authority before submitting a planning application. HCC can only encourage the take-up of any pre-application services which are offered.

4.2 Current publicity on planning applications

4.2.1 Once a planning application (minerals, waste or County Council developments) has been submitted, validated, and entered onto the Public Planning Register⁽⁸²⁾, the statutory consultation will begin. At that point, representations will be invited in accordance with the timescales set out in the legislation. Publicity will take place in accordance with the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedures) (England) Order 2010⁽⁸³⁾.

4.2.2 HCC already exceeds the minimum requirements in publicising planning applications, in particular by carrying out neighbour notification in the vicinity of the application site over and above the minimum requirements. The following table outlines what publicity is undertaken when a valid planning application is received by HCC.

4.3 Commenting on planning applications

4.3.1 Anyone can comment on a minerals, waste or County Council development planning application submitted to HCC for determination.

4.3.2 The HCC website provides the opportunity to comment on any applications directly to HCC:

- via the HCC website: www.hants.gov.uk/county-planning⁽¹⁰⁵⁾;
- by email: planning@hants.gov.uk; or
- in writing: see address in section 9. 'Where can I find out more information on planning issues and the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement?'

4.3.3 HCC is required to consult on planning applications for a minimum of 21 days as set out in Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2012⁽¹⁰⁶⁾. HCC applies this minimum requirement but extends it to a minimum of 28 days.

4.3.4 Responses received outside of the consultation period will only be taken into account if prior agreement for late submissions has been made. If the proposal has been subject to Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA), consultation will be extended to six weeks⁽¹⁰⁷⁾.

4.3.5 HCC is required to determine planning applications within specific timescales. These timescales are considered in more detail in section 4.4 'Determining planning applications'. The timescales set include the requirements for consultation on each planning application.

4.3.6 Comments can be made to support, to object or to make a general observation about the proposal. Responses should focus on 'material considerations' when responding to a proposal. Examples of what is and is not considered to be a 'material consideration' are highlighted in the following table. More information on 'material considerations' can be found on the Planning Portal website⁽¹⁰⁸⁾.

- 4.3.7** A name and postal address must be provided for the comments to be accepted on planning applications which are being considered by HCC. Anonymous representations cannot be accepted.
- 4.3.8** All comments will be kept with the relevant planning application and will therefore be available for viewing by the applicant and the public at HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and during normal office hours).
- 4.3.9** All written representations will be entered on the HCC planning application database.
- 4.3.10** A redacted copy of all comments received (i.e. version where names and other personal information has been removed before public display) in relation to a planning application will be made available within 5 working days of receipt and will be available to view on the HCC webpage for the specific planning application on the HCC website⁽¹⁰⁹⁾.
- 4.3.11** Responses received will be summarised and documented in the officers report, as required. The responses to any consultation on planning applications will be considered and taken into account in decisions made by, and on behalf of, HCC.

4.4 Determining planning applications

4.4.1 HCC is required to determine planning applications within a specific timescale, as set out in the Town and Country Planning (Development Management Procedure) (England) Order 2012⁽¹¹⁰⁾ and the EIA Regulations⁽¹¹¹⁾. This means HCC needs to determine planning applications for the following types of developments within the following timescales:

- **'Major' minerals, waste and County Council developments** - within 13 weeks;
- **'Minor' County Council developments** - within 8 weeks; and
- **EIA applications** - within 16 weeks.

Planning applications (Delegated)

4.4.2 Delegated planning applications are those which do not give rise to substantive or irreconcilable planning objections. These types of planning applications will be determined by the Director of Economy, Transport and Environment under the HCC delegation arrangements⁽¹¹²⁾. Further information on the scheme of delegation is available at the HCC website⁽¹¹³⁾.

4.4.3 A delegated report will be written that will address the planning issues and material considerations. It will include the decision (i.e. whether the proposal has been granted or refused planning permission).

4.4.4 The following persons / groups will be informed of any decision made under delegation:

- the **applicant**;
- the **landowner or tenant of an agricultural holding** in which a proposal is located in response to the issue of a Statutory Notice;
- **statutory consultees**; and
- any **other consultee or interested party**.

4.4.5 Notification of the determination of the planning application will be carried out through use of e-mail where appropriate.

4.4.6 All delegated reports and decisions notices will be available for public inspection:

- on the HCC website⁽¹¹⁴⁾; and at
- HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and during normal office hours).

4.4.7 All decisions notices will be placed on the Planning Public Register⁽¹¹⁵⁾ and will also be available to view on the HCC website⁽¹¹⁶⁾.

All other planning applications (not Delegated)

4.4.8 Planning applications submitted to HCC cannot be determined by delegation where:

- a **County Councillor** (elected member of HCC) requests that the decision be made by the Regulatory Committee;
- the **Director of Economy, Transport and Environment** (at HCC) considers that the planning application be considered by the Regulatory Committee;
- the proposal **involves HCC** (either as land owner or applicant) and the scheme is not of a minor and/or temporary nature;
- the **applicant is an officer** of the County Council;
- the **decision may result in a financial compensation claim** being made against any Local Authority; and
- a representation is received requesting to make a '**deputation**'.

4.4.9 When a planning application is referred to the Regulatory Committee, people who have made representation on a planning application will be informed⁽¹¹⁷⁾ and will also be informed of the County Council's deputation procedure⁽¹¹⁸⁾.

4.4.10 Regulatory Committee meetings are public meetings. Applicants and the members of the public have the right to make a deputation directly to the Regulatory Committee. A request to make a deputation at committee must be received at least three clear working days before the date of the meeting if the individual wants to address committee. These timescales are a corporate requirement and not set by the planning officers.

4.4.11 District or Borough Councils⁽¹¹⁹⁾ are consulted on planning applications which impact their administrative areas in line with the provision set out in Table 4.1 in section 4.2 'Current publicity on planning applications'. Responses received will be documented in the Committee Report. District or Borough Councils elected members are allowed to make a deputation at Regulatory Committee but it is important to note that District or Borough Council officers cannot.

4.4.12 All committee reports which are due to be considered by the Regulatory Committee will be available to view 7 days prior to committee⁽¹²⁰⁾. The reports will also be available to view on the HCC website⁽¹²¹⁾ under the pages relevant to each planning application.

4.4.13 When a decision has been made by the Regulatory Committee, the following persons / groups will be informed of any decision made:

- the **applicant**;
- the **landowner or tenant of an agricultural holding** in which a proposal is located in response to the issue of a Statutory Notice;
- **statutory consultees**; and
- any **other consultee or interested party**.

4.4.14 Notification of the determination of the planning application will be carried out through use of e-mail where appropriate.

4.4.15 All committee reports and decisions notices will be available for public inspection:

- on the HCC website⁽¹²²⁾; and at
- HCC offices in Winchester (by appointment and during normal office hours).

4.4.16 All decisions notices will be placed on the Planning Public Register⁽¹²³⁾ and will also be available to view on the HCC website⁽¹²⁴⁾.

4.5 Planning appeals

4.5.1 If an applicant is granted planning permission conditionally, or refused planning permission, the planning system allows the applicant the opportunity to appeal against the decision.

4.5.2 A planning appeal is handled by the Planning Inspectorate on behalf of the Secretary of State and can be dealt with by:

- a Public Inquiry;
- a hearing; or
- written representations.

4.5.3 The following table sets out the publicity which will be undertaken for planning appeals.

4.5.4 Once the appeal has been heard by the Planning Inspectorate, and a decision has been made, the HCC website⁽¹²⁷⁾ will be updated with the details of the decision, the date in which the decision notice was issued as well as all associated documentation (e.g. the decision notice).

4.5.5 HCC will notify the relevant District or Borough Council⁽¹²⁸⁾ once a decision notice has been issued so the Public Register can be updated accordingly.

4.5.6 All decisions notices will be placed on the Planning Public Register⁽¹²⁹⁾ and will also be available to view on the HCC website⁽¹³⁰⁾.

4.6 Liaison Panels

4.6.1 HCC encourages the formation of local Liaison Panels for major or controversial minerals or waste sites. These provide a forum for discussing operational issues between the operator, HCC (as Planning Authority), representatives of the local community and other interested parties.

4.6.2 Hampshire already has a number of active Liaison Panels which are associated with existing minerals or waste sites. A list of the current Liaison Panels is available on the HCC website⁽¹³¹⁾.

4.6.3 The specific makeup of Liaison Panels varies according to the local situation, but potential members of a Panel might include:

4.6.4 HCC expects that operators of major minerals and waste developments will run and manage Liaison Panels at their sites. This is supported by the provisions of the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan and supports local County Councillor's acting to independently chair the panel.

5. E-Government

5.0.1 HCC has a dedicated website for its planning section⁽¹³⁴⁾. This provides the opportunity for consultees and other interested parties to view:

- **relevant HCC policies** (e.g. the adopted Minerals & Waste Plan);
- **planning applications** (minerals, waste or County Council development planning applications) and their associated documentation:
 - consultation responses;
 - representations received by HCC on proposals being consideration by the authority;
 - supporting documentation;
 - associated delegated or committee reports and associated recommendations;
 - decision Notices (for minerals, waste and county council development planning applications); and
 - associated Article 30 (Discharge of planning condition) reports.

5.0.2 It is possible for applicants to download planning application forms and to submit planning applications online through the HCC website⁽¹³⁵⁾.

5.0.3 The website also allows the opportunity for consultees and interested parties to make representations on planning applications (minerals, waste or County Council development planning applications).

5.0.4 Copies of the adopted Minerals & Waste Plan as well as any subsequent planning policy work and associated public consultations are and will also be hosted on the website.

5.0.5 A copy of the Monitoring Report is also available on the HCC website⁽¹³⁶⁾.

6. Plain English

6.0.1 Hampshire County Council (HCC) will ensure that all written communications associated with the discharges of its statutory planning duties are written in Plain English.

6.0.2 Where appropriate, written communications will be subject to a Plain English audit.

6.0.3 Non-technical summaries of evidence base documents produced as part of minerals and waste plan-making will be produced, as appropriate. These will be prepared and made available alongside the main evidence base documents.

7. Equalities

- 7.0.1** In order to show due regard to the Equality Act 2010⁽¹³⁷⁾ and the Equality Standard for Local Government⁽¹³⁸⁾, the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan (HMWP) was subject to an Equalities Impact Assessment (EQIA) as part of plan preparation, in order to identify and eliminate any discrimination.
- 7.0.2** EQIA seeks to identify and eliminated any discrimination as part of plan preparation.
- 7.0.3** Any further planning policy work following the adoption of the HMWP will also be subject to further EQIA work, as appropriate.
- 7.0.4** As a minimum standard, all documents and information produced will be available, on request, in all languages and in other formats such as Braille, large print and audio media versions. Relevant voluntary and community groups will be involved where appropriate.
- 7.0.5** For planning applications taken to the Regulatory Committee, issues such as safety and security, well-being and quality of places are addressed in relation to equalities in the Committee Report.

8. Monitoring of the implementation of the Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement

- 8.0.1** The Hampshire Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) will be reviewed, where necessary, to ensure it is up-to-date with current legislation and sets out an appropriate benchmark for meeting consultation requirements.
- 8.0.2** In addition, the effectiveness of the SCI will be reviewed and monitored through the publication of Monitoring Reports (MR). These reports will be prepared annually as part of the statutory requirements to monitor adopted plans and will report on the preparation and implementation of minerals and waste development documents, including the SCI. The MR will indicate, among other things, the extent to which the policies and proposals in the adopted minerals and waste development documents, including the SCI, are being achieved.
- 8.0.3** As already set out in section 3. 'Planning Policy - Preparation of a Minerals and Waste Plan or Supplementary Planning Documents', the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Development Scheme (HMWDS) sets out the programme for planning document preparation. The MR will indicate if and where the programme for the preparation of planning documents in the HMWDS is under pressure or likely to slip. The HMWDS will be regularly reviewed and will consider any need to review the SCI, as appropriate.

8.0.4 Monitoring the SCI will include:

- assessing how effective its approach is in helping the community, consultees and interested parties to be involved in minerals and waste planning in Hampshire;
- how appropriate the SCIs proposed techniques are and how easy they are to use; and
- whether new Government guidance which will result in the requirement to revise the adopted SCI.

8.0.5 The MR will help to facilitate this process.

Glossary and acronyms

Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB): Areas of countryside considered to have significant landscape value, and protected to preserve that value. Originally identified and designated by the Countryside Commission under Sections 87 and 88 of the National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act 1949. Natural England is now responsible for designating AONBs and advising Government and other organisations on their management and upkeep.

Campaign for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE)

Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCG)

Confederation of British Industry (CBI)

Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG): The Government department with responsibility for planning and local government.

Department of food and rural affairs (Defra): The UK Government department responsible for environmental protection, food production and standards, agriculture, fisheries and rural communities.

Departure (from development plan): Where a proposal does not meet the provisions of a policy in the adopted development plan.

Deputations: Members of the public and anyone who has submitted a planning application can ask to speak (make a deputation) at the meeting at which the planning application will be discussed.

Development Plan: This includes adopted Local Plans, neighbourhood plans and the London Plan, and is defined in section 38 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004.

Development Plan Document (DPD): Spatial planning documents that are subject to public examination. There will be a right for those making representations seeking change to be heard at a public examination.

Discharge of conditions: Where a planning permission includes conditions which require further work or further details to be submitted, which need to be agreed and signed off by the relevant planning authority.

Engagement: Entering into a deliberative process of dialogue with others, actively seeking and listening to their views and exchanging ideas, information and opinions. Unlike 'mediation' or 'negotiation' engagement can occur without there being a dispute to resolve.

English Heritage (EH): This is a non-departmental public body which acts to preserve and protect England's historic environment.

Enquiry by Design: This process helps reach agreement between groups that would normally hold differing aspirations by bringing them together and focusing on the sustainability and quality of the urban environment itself. All concerns - technical, political, environmental and social – are tested and challenged by the design itself, so that design leads rather than follows the process.

Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA): A procedure to be followed for certain types of project to ensure that decisions are made in full knowledge of any likely significant effects on the environment.

Equalities Impact Assessment (EQIA): An assessment, as part of plan preparation, which seeks to identify and eliminate any discrimination.

Habitats Regulation Assessment (HRA): Statutory requirement for Planning Authorities to assess the potential effects of land-use plans on designated European Sites in Great Britain. The Habitats Regulations Assessment is intended to assess the potential effects of a development plan on one or more European Sites (collectively termed 'Natura 2000' sites). The Natura 2000 sites comprise Special Protection Areas (SPAs) and Special Areas of Conservation (SACs). SPAs are classified under the European Council Directive on the conservation of wild birds (79/409/EEC; Birds Directive) for the protection of wild birds and their habitats (including particularly rare and vulnerable species listed in Annex 1 of the Birds Directive, and migratory species).

Hampshire Community Strategy (HCS): The first Community Strategy was developed by the Hampshire Strategic Partnership in 2004 to reflect the priorities for Hampshire's communities and provide a framework for collaborative working.

Hampshire County Council (HCC): The County Council that governs the county of Hampshire in England. The authority is one of the partners in the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan.

Hampshire and Isle of Wight Association (HIOWA)

Hampshire Minerals and Waste Core Strategy (HMWCS): The Hampshire Minerals and Waste Core Strategy was an 'over-arching' strategic approach to development and was adopted in 2007. It was prepared by Hampshire County Council in partnership with Southampton City Council, Portsmouth City Council and the New Forest National Park Authority. The Core Strategy was subject to a successful legal challenge by Associated British Ports in 2008 which resulted in policies relating to safeguarding and wharves and rail depots (as well as all associated references) being quashed (deleted) from the Strategy. The Core Strategy covered the period 2005-2020. The Core Strategy was superseded by the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan (HMWP) in 2013.

Hampshire Minerals and Waste Development Scheme (HMWDS): A project timetable which gives information and details about the preparation and review of all the various minerals and waste plan and associated documentation by Hampshire.

Hampshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan (HMWLP): Minerals and Waste Local Plan produced by Hampshire County Council, Portsmouth City Council and Southampton City Council. The Plan was adopted in 1998. The Local Plan was superseded by the HMWCS with the exception of 4 saved policies which related to minerals and waste sites. These saved policies were superseded by the Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan.

Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan (HMWP): The Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan is the adopted development plan for minerals and waste in Hampshire. The Plan was prepared in partnership between Hampshire County Council, Portsmouth City Council, Southampton City Council, the New Forest National Park Authority and the South Downs National Park Authority. The Plan will guide all minerals and waste development up to 2030. It supersedes the HMWCS (2007) and the saved policies of the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Local Plan (1998) and was adopted in October 2013.

Hampshire Sustainable Community Strategy (HSCS): The purpose of the HSCS is to agree a vision and specific ambitions for the next 10 years and beyond to meet the future needs of Hampshire. The Hampshire Sustainable Community Strategy covers a period of 2008-2018 and was published in 2008. The HSCS sets out quality of life issues, key trends that impact on Hampshire and 11 long term ambitions to achieve the vision that "*Hampshire continues to prosper, providing greater opportunity for all without risking the environment*". The HSCS 2008–18 builds on the Community Strategy for Hampshire, prepared by the Hampshire Strategic Partnership and published in 2004. The Local Government Act 2000 requires Hampshire County Council to prepare such a strategy in consultation with our partners. The County Council has worked with the Hampshire Strategic Partnership to undertake this review. The HSCS looks at the sort of place people want Hampshire to be, drawing on community plans from across the county and from a range of consultations. It describes the quality of life in Hampshire today, then considers the challenges to that quality of life over the coming years.

Inspector's Report: This is produced by the Planning Inspector following his/her public examination of the development plan documents and is binding on the County Council.

Integrated Sustainability Appraisal (ISA): See 'Strategic Environmental Assessment/Sustainability Appraisal'.

Interested party: Any party expected to have a concern or interest in the proceedings of a particular minerals and waste development.

Local Development Document (LDD): Local development documents are a set of documents specified in United Kingdom planning law which a local planning authority creates to describe their strategy for development and use of land in their area of authority.

Local Planning Authority (LPA): The public authority whose duty it is to carry out specific planning functions for a particular area. All references to local planning authority apply to the district or borough council, London borough council, county council, Broads Authority, National Park Authority and the Greater London Authority, to the extent appropriate to their responsibilities.

Mediation: Intervention into a dispute by an acceptable impartial neutral person whose role it is to assist the parties in dispute to reach their own mutually acceptable settlement. It is essentially a voluntary procedure, and proceedings are confidential to the participants; any settlement however can be made public with the agreement of all parties.

Minerals Consultation Area (MCA): An area identified to ensure consultation between the relevant district or borough planning authority, the minerals industry and the Minerals and Waste Planning Authorities before certain non-mineral planning applications made within the area are determined. The Hampshire MCA includes the mineral resource areas defined in the Mineral Safeguarding Area and existing strategic minerals and waste infrastructure.

Minerals and Waste Development Scheme (MWDS): Sets out the programme for the preparation of Development Plan Documents.

Minerals and Waste Planning Authorities (MWPA): The local planning authorities (County and Unitary Councils) responsible for minerals and waste planning. In Hampshire, Hampshire County Council, Portsmouth and Southampton City Councils, the New Forest National Park Authority and South Downs National Park Authority are minerals and waste planning authorities.

Monitoring Report (MR): Produced by the Hampshire Authorities annually, this Report will review and assess the implementation of the Minerals and Waste Development Scheme, and how effectively the policies in the adopted Hampshire Minerals & Waste Plan are being achieved.

National Health Service (NHS)

National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF): Published in March 2012, the NPPF sets out the Government's planning policies for England and how these are expected to be applied.

Natural England: Public body tasked with the conservation and improvement of the natural environment. Natural England designates Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and National Parks, manages National Nature Reserves and notifies Sites of Special Scientific Interest.

National Trust: Charity which protects historic houses, gardens, mills, coastline, forests, woods, fens, beaches, farmland, moorland, islands, archaeological remains, nature reserves, villages and pubs and provides public access to these features.

Negotiation: Process of reaching consensus by exchanging information, bargaining and compromise that goes on between two or more parties with some shared interests and conflicting interests. Negotiation is likely to be part of the process of mediation, but can also happen outside of any formal mediation and without the assistance of a neutral person.

Planning Aid: Voluntary provision by planners of free and independent professional advice on planning to individuals or groups unable to afford to pay for the full costs of such advice. Planning Aid includes the provision of training so that its clients can be empowered through better understanding of how the planning system works and the development of skills that enable them to present their own case more effectively.

Planning application: Operators proposing a new minerals or waste development need to apply for permission from the relevant planning authority in order to be allowed to carry out their operations.

Planning condition: A condition imposed on a grant of planning permission (in accordance with the Town and Country Planning Act 1990) or a condition included in a Local Development Order or Neighbourhood Development Order.

Planning obligation: A legally enforceable obligation entered into under section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 to mitigate the impacts of a development proposal.

Planning permission: Once planning applications have been reviewed by the relevant planning authority, permission may be granted - i.e. consent for the proposed development is given. Permissions may have certain conditions or legal agreements attached which allow development as long as the operator adheres to these.

Pre-application discussions: Hampshire County Council encourages engagement with applicants and their agents prior to any application being submitted. The County Council charges for pre-planning application advice for proposed minerals and waste development.

Public consultation: A process through which the public is informed about development proposals and invited to submit comments on them.

Public examination: A public examination of a development plan starts upon submission to the Secretary of State. An Independent Planning Inspector is appointed to examine the soundness of the Plan (see 'Soundness'). The Inspector will check that the authority has prepared the document legally and tests whether it is 'sound'.

Public utilities: Businesses that provide the public with necessities, such as water, electricity, natural gas, and telephone and telegraph communication.

Redacted: To redact is to edit, or prepare for publishing. Frequently, a redacted document, such as a memo or e-mail message, has simply had personal (or possibly actionable) information deleted or blacked out. As a consequence, redacted is often used to describe documents from which sensitive information has been expunged.

Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB): The RSPB speaks out for birds and wildlife, tackling the problems that threaten the environment. The RSPB is the largest wildlife conservation organisation in Europe with over one million members. Wildlife and the environment face many threats. Their work is focused on the species and habitats that are in the greatest danger.

Secretary of State (SoS): The head of a major government department such as the Department of Communities and Local Government.

Site-specific allocations and policies: Allocations of sites for specific or mixed uses of development. Policies will identify any specific requirements for individual proposals.

Soundness: Soundness is an issue which is considered as part of the public examination of a development plan document. A sound Plan should be:

- positively prepared i.e. based on a strategy which seeks to meet objectively assessed requirements;
- justified;
- effective; and
- consistent with national policy.

A Plan can only be adopted if it has been 'found sound' by a Planning Inspector.

Statutory consultees: These are organisations and public bodies who are required to be consulted concerning specific issues relating to planning applications and help inform any decision made by the planning authority.

Statement of Community Involvement (SCI): Statutory planning document which sets out how and when the community can get involved in the preparation of planning documents.

Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) / Sustainability Appraisal (SA): Sustainability appraisal is a systematic and repeated appraisal process, incorporating the requirements of the Strategic Environmental Assessment Directive (European Union 'SEA Directive' 2001/42/EC). The purpose of sustainability appraisal is to appraise the social, environmental and economic effects of the strategies and policies in any minerals and waste development document from the outset of the preparation process. This will ensure that decisions are made that accord with sustainable development. All references to sustainability appraisal must be taken to include the requirements of the Strategic Environmental Assessment Directive as the work on the Hampshire Minerals and Waste Plan merges these together into a process called Integrated Sustainability Appraisal (ISA) (see *Integrated Sustainability Appraisal*). The ISA documents are supporting documents prepared as part of plan preparation.

Supplementary Planning Documents (SPD): Policy guidance to supplement the policies and proposals in development plan documents. They can be used to provide further guidance for development on specific sites, or on particular issues, such as design. Supplementary planning documents are capable of being a material consideration in planning decisions but are not part of the development plan. They will not form part of the development plan or be subject to public examination.

Sustainable Community Strategy (SCS) See *Hampshire Sustainable Community Strategy*
