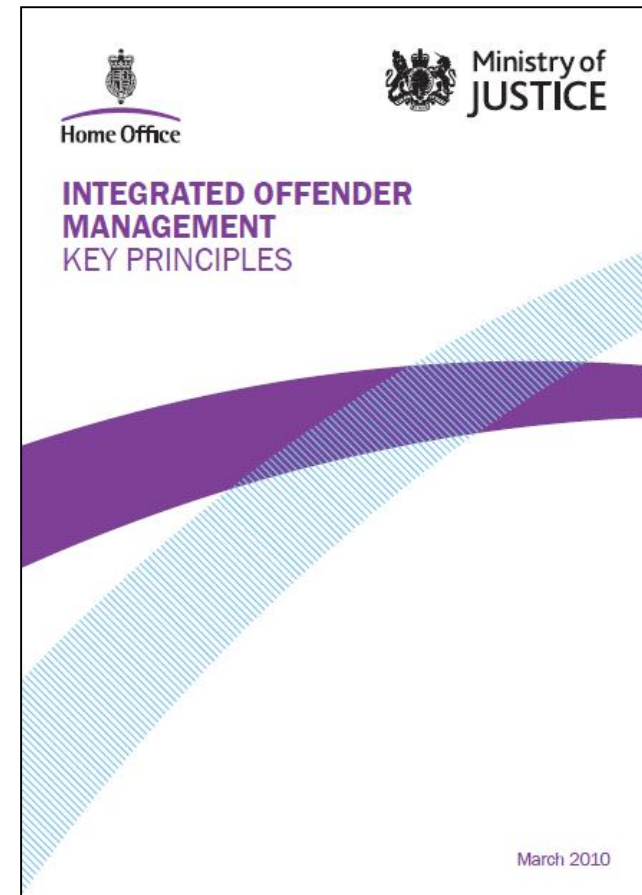

What are we trying to achieve?

The core aims of the Hampshire IOM service are:

- to reduce crime and reduce re-offending
- to provide the right interventions, to the right individuals, at the right time
- to improve information exchange around risks and needs



Current provision

Multi agency teams collocated across three main hub areas:

Criminal Justice Agencies comprising

- Hampshire Probation – 22 staff
 - Resettlement and Rehabilitation
- Hampshire Constabulary – 11 officers
 - Enforcement and Performance
- HMP Winchester – 2 staff
 - Rehabilitation and Assessment

Hampshire County Council responsible for commissioning specialist services

- Society of St James – 24 staff (contract to value of £850,000)
- Premises and IT – hubs & satellite sites (to value of £100,000)

SSJ have particular expertise with relation to issues around housing and substance misuse but also provide support around employment, education and training, debt and finance, family and relationships, behaviour and health.

Effectiveness of current approach?

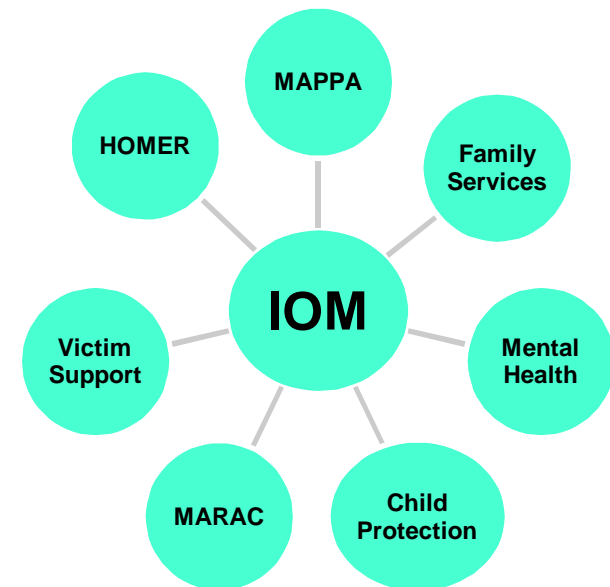
Primary data around:

- Entrants into police custody - 60.5% reduction
- Offences for which arrested - 74.6% reduction
- Number of crimes committed - 66.7% reduction

Estimate of costs avoided to criminal justice system, in region of £1M per annum

Innovation:

- Peer support programmes – About Turn, Rewind
- IOM houses – Southampton, Gosport
- Healthy living – sporting activity, fishing
- Joint working with Hampshire Operating Model for Effective Recovery (HOMER)
- Information exchange



Plans for development

Reducing Reoffending & Transforming Rehabilitation

- Payment by results
- Community based punishments
- Work and training prisons
- Preventing drug abuse in prisons
- Engaging with drug misusing offenders
- Using IOM approach to manage offenders
- Support offenders to resettle in communities
- Restorative justice
