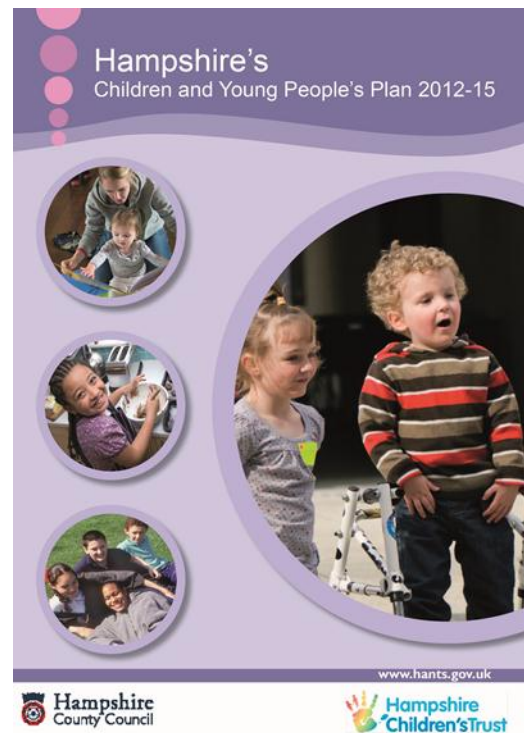

# Hampshire's Children's and Young People's Plan



# Purpose

- Requirement for each local authority to have a Children's Trust Board remains
- Partners retain “duty to cooperate”
- Hampshire's Children's Trust has a shared commitment to improving the lives of children and young people
- CYPP establishes the vision and priorities for Hampshire's Children's Trust for a period of three years

# CYPP – past and present

## CYPP 2009-2012

- Six priorities
- Mapped across to five *Every child matters* outcomes
- Action plan
- Annual reports on progress to Children's Trust Board

## CYPP 2012-2015

- Five priorities
- In addition five 'key wins' detailed
- Annual reports on progress against action plan to Children's Trust Board and Select and (now) Health and Wellbeing Board

# Current CYPP 2012-2015 five priorities

1. Addressing the incidence and reducing the impact of childhood poverty.
2. Securing children and young people's health, promoting healthy lifestyles and reducing inequalities.
3. Providing opportunities to learn, that raise children and young people's aspirations, encourage excellence and enable them to enjoy and achieve beyond their expectations.
4. Helping children and young people to be safe and feel safe.
5. Promoting vocational, leisure and recreational activities that provide opportunities for children and young people to experience success and make a positive contribution.

# The CYPP moving forward.....

- All agencies want a clear plan – but streamlined to suit the time
- Consideration of:
  - the number and nature of priorities
  - our evolving issues for children
  - noting organisational change
- So focus back on the five outcomes

# *Children Act 2004* outcomes

1. Be healthy
2. Stay safe
3. Enjoy and achieve
4. Make a positive contribution
5. Achieve economic wellbeing

Suggested headline priorities for each outcome.....

# Be healthy

1. Reduced levels of obesity and promoting physical activity
2. Promoting health and wellbeing in pregnancy and childhood (neo natal care)
3. Promoting access to health services for vulnerable groups of children and young people including LAC, disabled children and young offenders
4. Continue to work to reduce the rate of teenage conceptions among girls aged 15-17
5. Reducing and tackling substance misuse

# Stay safe

1. Improve awareness of and responsiveness to Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE)
2. Reduce number and improve response to children who go missing
3. Helping children and young people understand how to keep themselves safe (recognising grooming, cyberbullying), thereby reducing the possibility of children entering risky behaviour
4. Reducing incidence of domestic violence and its impact of children
5. Promote emotional wellbeing, mental health and resilience and thus prevent self harm and poor mental health

# Enjoy and achieve

1. Increase the proportion of children attending good or outstanding schools.
2. Continue to improve educational outcomes for disadvantaged children, especially those in care, those eligible for free school meals, those with special educational needs and those who belong to specific black and minority ethnic groups that do not do as well as children in other groups.
3. Supporting parents with children in education

# Make a positive contribution

1. Reducing reoffending by young people
2. Promoting the voice and participation of all children and young people ensuring those that are disadvantaged are heard
3. Promoting Rights, Respect and Responsibilities (UN Convention on the Rights of the Child) to help children become responsible citizens with an understanding of their rights and their responsibility to respect the rights of others.
4. Promoting the range of local activities provided by the voluntary and community sectors including National Citizen Service/Duke of Edinburgh in order to allow children and young people to participate in activities beyond the school day

# Achieve economic wellbeing

1. Increase the number of young people in education, employment and training, including those that are Care Leavers
2. Provide and develop opportunities for young people through apprenticeships and internships
3. Ensure high quality careers education
4. Working with the two Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEP) to ensure that the development of young people's skills for employment have a high priority
5. Supporting Troubled Families Programme to deliver change for children and their families with multiple problems including parents/carers not in work and children not attending school
