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## **Census Information Booklet for Eastleigh 2023**

### **About EMTAS**

## EMTAS Summary Information

According to the Spring 2023 School Census, 10.8% of Hampshire's Black, Minority Ethnic and Traveller children were in Eastleigh schools (taken from the 'Ethnicity District' tab). This equates to 3374 children, compared with 3077, 10.8%, in 2022 - an increase in the number of children although the percentage has remained the same. Additionally, 8.2% of Hampshire's EAL (English as an Additional Language) learners were in Eastleigh, which is equivalent to 1620 children (1329, 9.9% the previous year, 2022).

In the academic year 2022-23 a total of 1117 children were referred to Hampshire's Ethnic Minority and Traveller Achievement Service, a high figure for the Service but not dissimilar to 2021-22. Of these 1117, 114 children were referred by schools in the Eastleigh district, 7 more than in 2021-22.

Academic results for BME and Traveller groups are collected, analysed and reported on by Hampshire EMTAS annually. A summary analysis comparing the attainment and progress of BME and 'Hampshire All' is carried out in addition to more detailed analysis of attainment within individual groups. These data and analyses are made available by district in a separate progress and attainment data booklet. It also captures a range of other information such as attendance, the percentage of children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) as well as the changing profile of the district in terms of languages and ethnic groups.

Within EMTAS, we recognise that different districts of Hampshire will have different needs according to their particular demographic.

All data that have been used are correct at the time of writing but may later be subject to minor changes as new data are published. Dates and sources are acknowledged. In some cases, numbers within ethnic groups are very small. To maintain confidentiality, values of 5 or less represented as <6.

Note that where numbers are small, although they may give an indication of a particular pattern it is very difficult to draw any firm conclusions and the data should therefore be used with caution.

## Language - Hampshire Summary - Pupils for whom English is an Additional Language (EAL) Summary by District and Academic Year

Eastleigh has the fourth highest percentage of pupils with EAL in Hampshire in 2023, a 3 year trend for this district.. The number of pupils for whom English is an additional language in Eastleigh has increased over the last three years to 1620 in 2023, although this represents a slightly reduced percentage of all Hampshire's pupils with EAL - 8.2% in Eastleigh in 2023 compared to 9.9% in 2022.

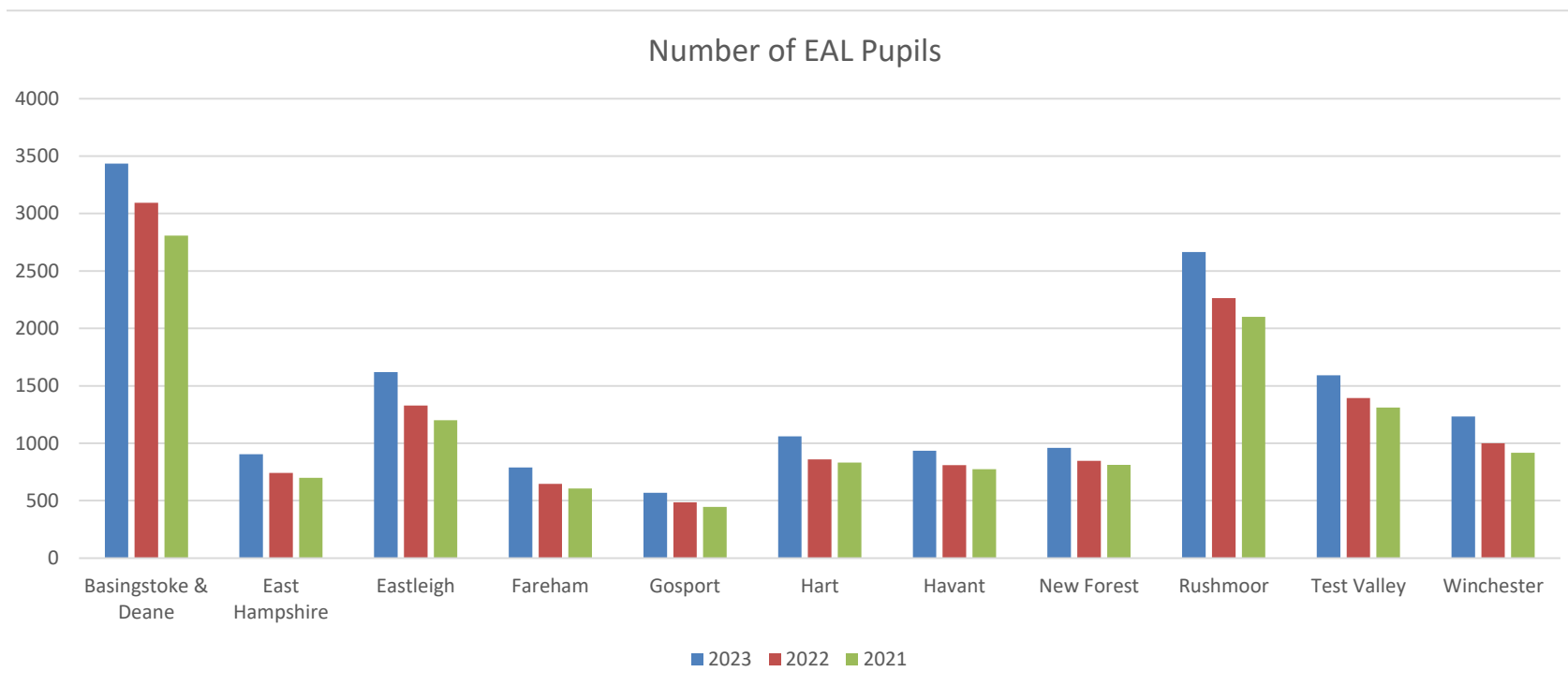

## Language - Eastleigh and Hampshire Summary - Pupils for whom English is an Additional Language (EAL)

### Top 15

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Census languages have been fairly consistent since 2020. Polish has been the top language in Eastleigh for the last three years with Chinese appearing second in 2022. This is due to the number of Cantonese speaking children coming into Eastleigh schools from Hong Kong in 2021-22, linked with the Hong Kong British Nationals Overseas programme.

Language data are collected termly; ethnicity data are collected in the Spring Term only. Accurate recording of pupils' home/first languages enables better targeting of additional resources. EMTAS have produced a leaflet giving further information about home/first language which is available on our website -

## Ethnicity - Eastleigh and Hampshire Summary - Pupils for whom English is an Additional Language (EAL) Summary by Ethnicity and Academic Year

The largest ethnic minority group in Eastleigh district is Any Other White background (WOTH), which mainly reflects the population of families originating from Poland and latterly Romania who have settled in the district. The number of pupils from WOTH backgrounds has gradually increased since 2020. The number of pupils from Asian Indian (AIND) backgrounds has also increased steadily over the last three years; this ethnic minority group remains the second largest in Eastleigh and reflects the number of Asian Indian families who have come to work in the district.

The percentage of BME, below, is different from that shown within the 'Ethnicity District' tab as this percentage is generated from all the Pupils in this district, not all of Hampshire

## Ethnicity - Hampshire Summary - Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) pupils including those of Traveller Heritage Summary by District and Academic Year

Eastleigh has the third highest number and percentage of pupils from BME backgrounds of all the districts of Hampshire, having overtaken Test Valley in 2021; prior to 2021, Eastleigh had the fourth highest number of BME pupils in Hampshire.

The number of BME pupils in Eastleigh has increased since 2020, in line with the upward trend across most other districts of Hampshire.

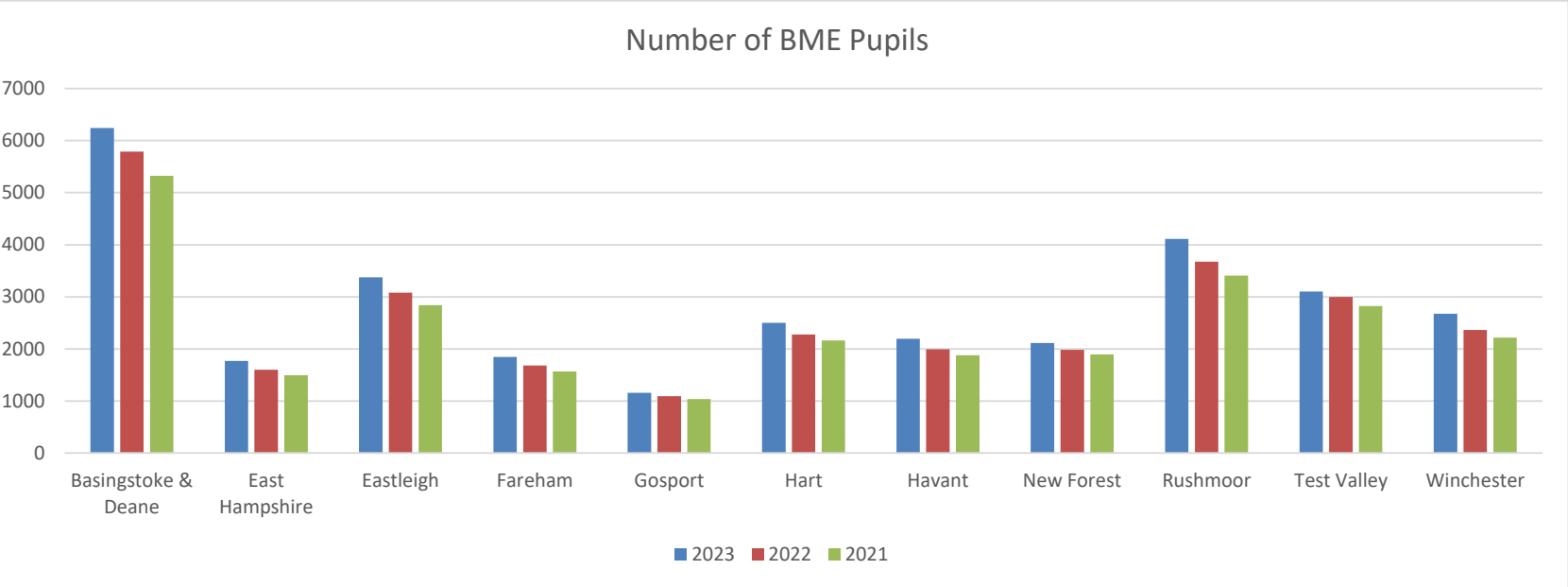

### Summary of EMTAS work supporting children from these communities by District and Academic Year

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The data in the table below show numbers of children of GTRSB heritage who have been supported in school by EMTAS in the academic years shown. The numbers do not reflect the entire GTRSB population in any of the districts. They do, however, include GTRSB children who may ascribe as WROM or WIRT or who are identified as Travellers or Showmen in the Traveller Questionnaire that is sent to schools annually.

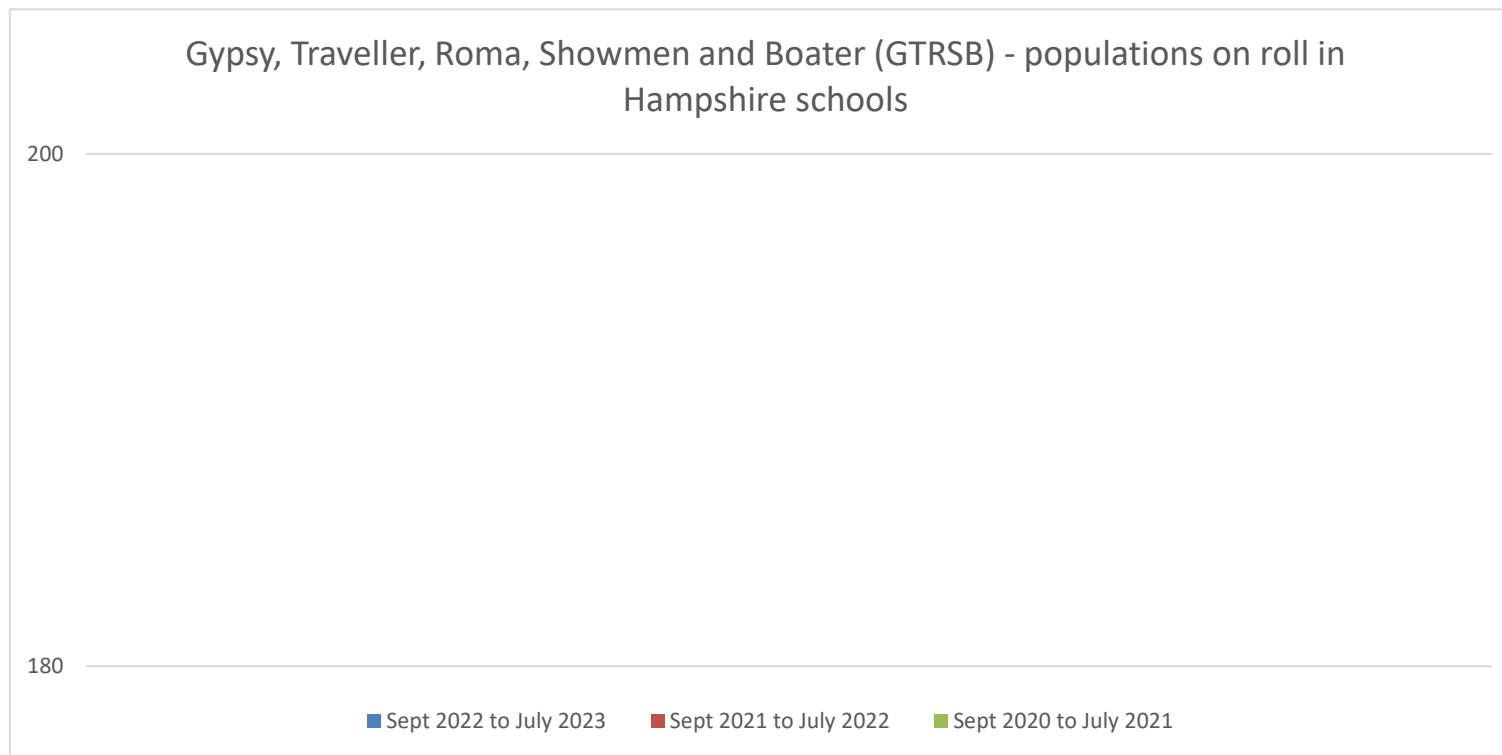
