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About EMTAS

EMTAS Summary Information

According to the Spring 2023 School Census, 7.0% of Hampshire's Black, Minority Ethnic and Traveller children were in New Forest schools (taken from the 'Ethnicity District' tab). This compares with 6.9% in 2022 and equates to 2112 children, compared with 1981 in 2021. Additionally, 4.5% of Hampshire's learners with EAL (English as an Additional Language) were in New Forest which is equivalent to 961 children (848, 6.3% in 2022).

In the academic year 2022-23 a total of 1117 children were referred to Hampshire's Ethnic Minority and Traveller Achievement Service, a similar figure to the total in 2021-22. Of these, 57 children were referred by schools in the New Forest district, the same number as 2021-22. The vast majority of these referrals were children new to English, with the largest group being Malayalam speaking children, followed by Ukrainian and Russian speaking refugees. For other languages, the numbers were lower as was the case in previous years. There continue to be relatively high numbers of Traveller children in schools in the New Forest compared with other districts, with only Winchester having more children ascribed as Travellers.

Academic results for BME and Traveller groups are collected, analysed and reported on by Hampshire EMTAS annually. A summary analysis comparing the attainment and progress of BME and 'Hampshire All' is carried out in addition to more detailed analysis of attainment within individual groups. These data and analyses are made available by district in a separate progress and attainment data booklet. It also captures a range of other information such as attendance, the percentage of children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) as well as the changing profile of the district in terms of languages and ethnic groups.

Within EMTAS, we recognise that different districts of Hampshire will have different needs according to their particular demographic

**Language - Hampshire Summary - Pupils for whom English is an Additional Language (EAL)
Summary by District and Academic Year**

The New Forest ranks just below the middle of the other districts in terms of numbers of pupils with EAL in Hampshire, with six districts having higher numbers and four others having lower. The number of pupils speaking EAL in the New Forest has increased by more than 100 pupils since 2022. However, the New Forest has the lowest percentage EAL of all the districts in Hampshire with just 4.5%. This is a reduction of -1.8% from the previous year. Percentage changes in other districts for the same period range from - 8.9 to 5.5.

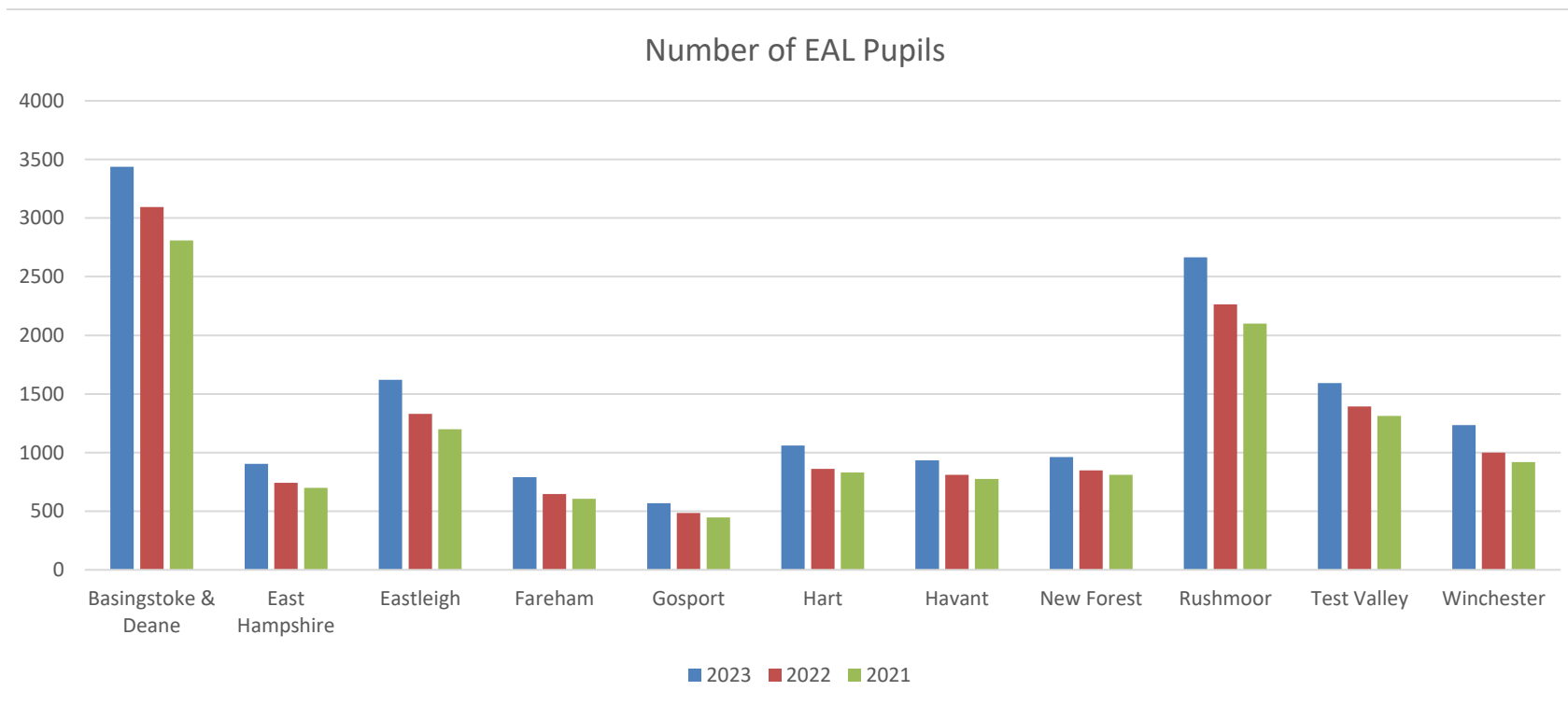

Top 15

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Census languages spoken by pupils in the New Forest have been fairly consistent since 2022 with the exception of Ukrainian and Russian which have experienced large increases due to the arrival of refugees from Ukraine. Polish remains the top language in the New Forest by a considerable margin. This has been the case for a number of years. Ukrainian is now the second largest language group with Romanian following in third place. The numbers of Malayalam, Chinese, Spanish, Turkish, Bengali, Portuguese, French, Tagalog and Lithuanian have all risen between 2022 and 2023. The number of Bulgarian and Fijian speakers have fallen during the same period with Fijian no longer featuring in the top 15 languages spoken in the New Forest. Note that languages recorded in the Census may differ from the languages spoken by children referred as new arrivals to EMTAS.

Language data are collected termly; ethnicity data are collected in the Spring Term only. Accurate recording of pupils' home/first languages enables better targeting of additional resources. EMTAS have produced a leaflet giving further information about home/first language which is available on our website -

Ethnicity - New Forest and Hampshire Summary - Pupils for whom English is an Additional Language (EAL) Summary by Ethnicity and Academic Year

The largest ethnic minority group in the New Forest district and Hampshire is Any Other White Background (WOTH) which reflects the population of families originating from a range of European countries who have come to the district/Hampshire as economic migrants, although many of the pupils are UK born, and also the arrival of refugees from Ukraine. The second and third largest ethnic groups within the New Forest are Any Other Mixed Background (MOTH) and White and Asian (MWAS) which have broadly similar numbers of pupils represented. Any Other Mixed Background (MOTH) is also the second largest ethnic group within Hampshire whereas the third largest group within Hampshire differs from the New Forest as it is Any Other Asian (AOTH). This reflects the large numbers of children of Nepali heritage that are located within other areas of Hampshire but are only present in very small numbers in the New Forest. The top three ethnic groups in terms of pupil numbers in the New Forest and Hampshire have remained the same since 2022. The numbers of pupils within the Any Other White (WOTH) group in the New Forest have risen considerably from 2022 to 2023 largely due to the arrival of refugees from Ukraine, whereas numbers in the Any Other Mixed (MOTH) Background and White and Asian (MWAS) have risen more modestly during the same period. Hampshire figures show a more significant rise in each of these groups over the same time period. The percentage of BME, below, is different from that shown within the 'Ethnicity District' tab as this percentage is generated from all the Pupils in this district, not all of Hampshire.

The New Forest has the eighth lowest number and percentage of pupils from BME backgrounds of all the districts of Hampshire in 2023. The number of BME pupils in the New Forest has risen slightly since 2022. The percentage change of pupils from BME groups within the district from 2022 to 2023 also shows a small increase.

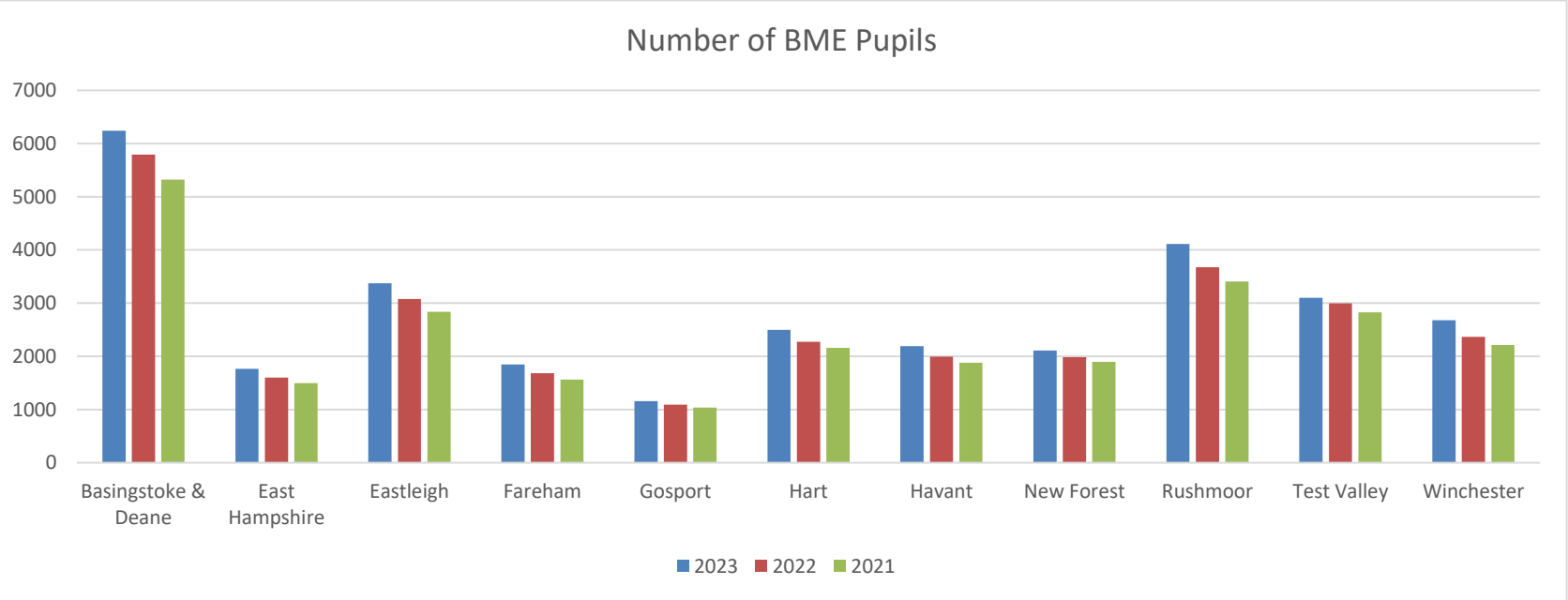

Summary by Ethnicity and Academic Year

These data refer to take up of free school meals and may not necessarily reflect eligibility and need. Therefore the data may not be an entirely true representation of the BME population as not all families may apply for FSM due to a number of reasons. The data below shows that the total numbers of pupils from BME backgrounds who have taken up free school meals has risen each year since 2021 within the New Forest and Hampshire. In the New Forest the groups with the highest take up of free school meals in 2023 are Any Other White Background, Gypsy/Roma and Any Other Mixed. This contrasts with the rest of Hampshire where the groups with the highest take up are Any Other White Background, Any Other Mixed and White and Black Caribbean.

These data refer to take up of free school meals and may not necessarily reflect eligibility and need. Therefore the data may not be an entirely true representation of the BME population as not all families may apply for FSM due to a number of reasons. The New Forest had the fourth highest take up of free schools meals of all of the districts in Hampshire in 2023 with 469 children from BME backgrounds taking them up (9.5% of the Hampshire total). The numbers taking up free school meals in the district has risen each year since 2021. The percentage of the Hampshire total dropped from 2021 to 2022 but has been stable at 9.5% since then.

The most common language spoken by new arrivals in the New Forest is now coming into the county from India, many to work in the healthcare sector. 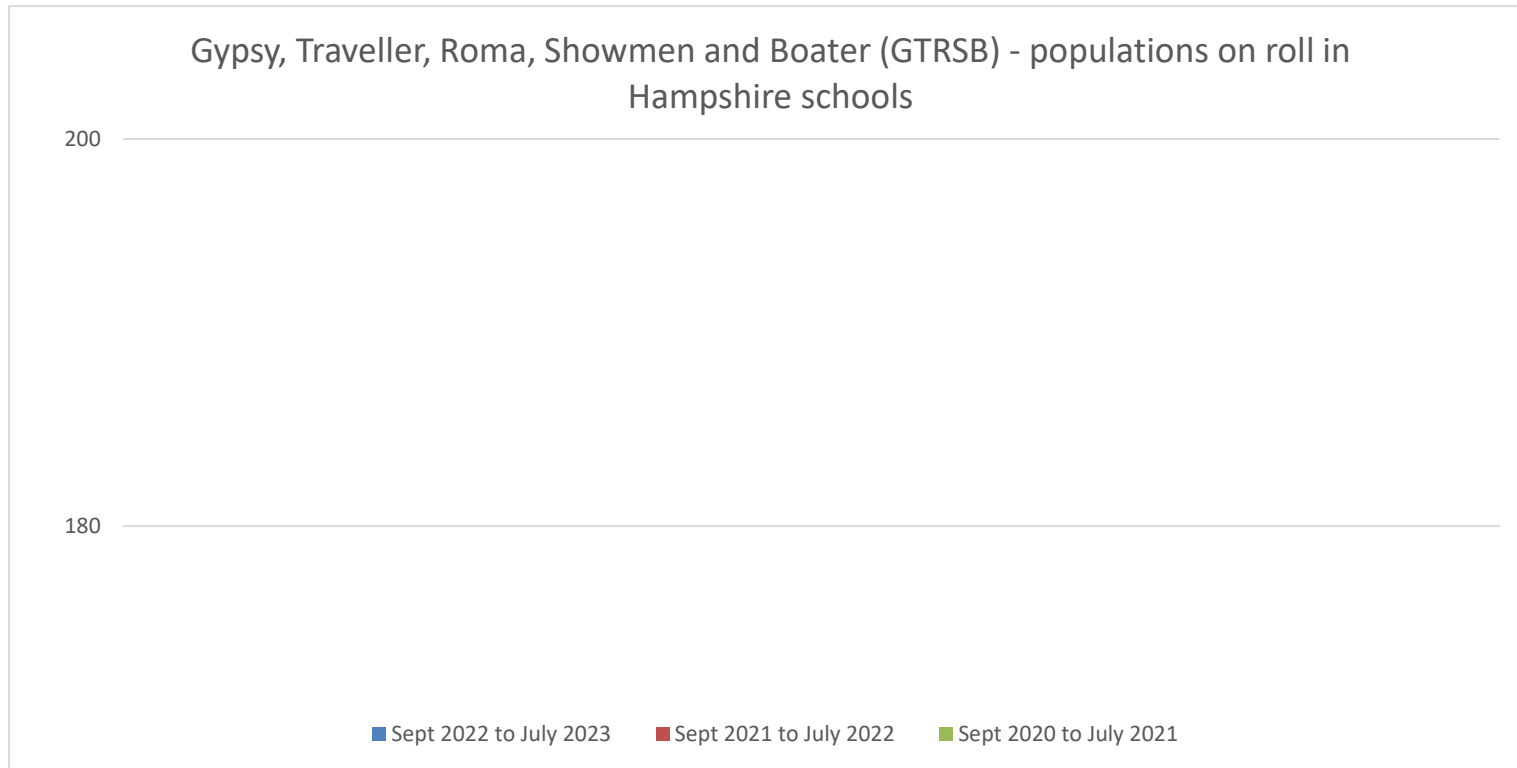
