About EMTAS

Removing barriers and inequalities in engagement, progress and attainment is a priority for all schools. EMTAS Summary Information

According to the Spring 2023 School Census, 13.2% of Hampshire's Black, Minority Ethnic and Traveller children were in Rushmoor schools (taken from the 'Ethnicity District' tab). This equates to 4114 children, compared with 3677, 12.9%, in 2023. Additionally, 22.3% of Hampshire's EAL (English as an Additional Language) learners were in Rushmoor which is equivalent to 2664 children (2263 16.8% the previous year, 2022).

In the academic year 2022-23 a total of 1117 children were referred to Hampshire's Ethnic Minority and Traveller Achievement Service. Of these, 255 children were referred by schools in the Rushmoor district, 45 more than in 2021-22.

Academic results for BME and Traveller groups are collected, analysed and reported on by Hampshire EMTAS annually. A summary analysis comparing the attainment and progress of BME and 'Hampshire All' is carried out in addition to more detailed analysis of attainment within individual groups. These data and analyses are made available by district in a separate progress and attainment data booklet. It also captures a range of other information such as attendance, the percentage of children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) as well as the changing profile of the district in terms of languages and ethnic groups.

Within EMTAS, we recognise that different districts of Hampshire will have different needs according to their particular demographic.

All data that have been used are correct at the time of writing but may later be subject to minor changes as new data are published. Dates and sources are acknowledged. In some cases, numbers within ethnic groups are very small. To maintain confidentiality, values of 5 or less represented as <6.

Note that where numbers are small, although they may give an indication of a particular pattern it is very difficult to draw any firm conclusions and the data should therefore be used with caution.

**Language - Hampshire Summary - Pupils for whom English is an Additional Language (EAL)
Summary by District and Academic Year**

Rushmoor has the second highest number and percentage of pupils with EAL in Hampshire, a 3 year trend for this district. The number of pupils speaking EAL in Rushmoor has risen steadily over the last three years, mirroring the pattern seen across most of the rest of the county. This is illustrated by the graph on the next tab (EAL Graph).

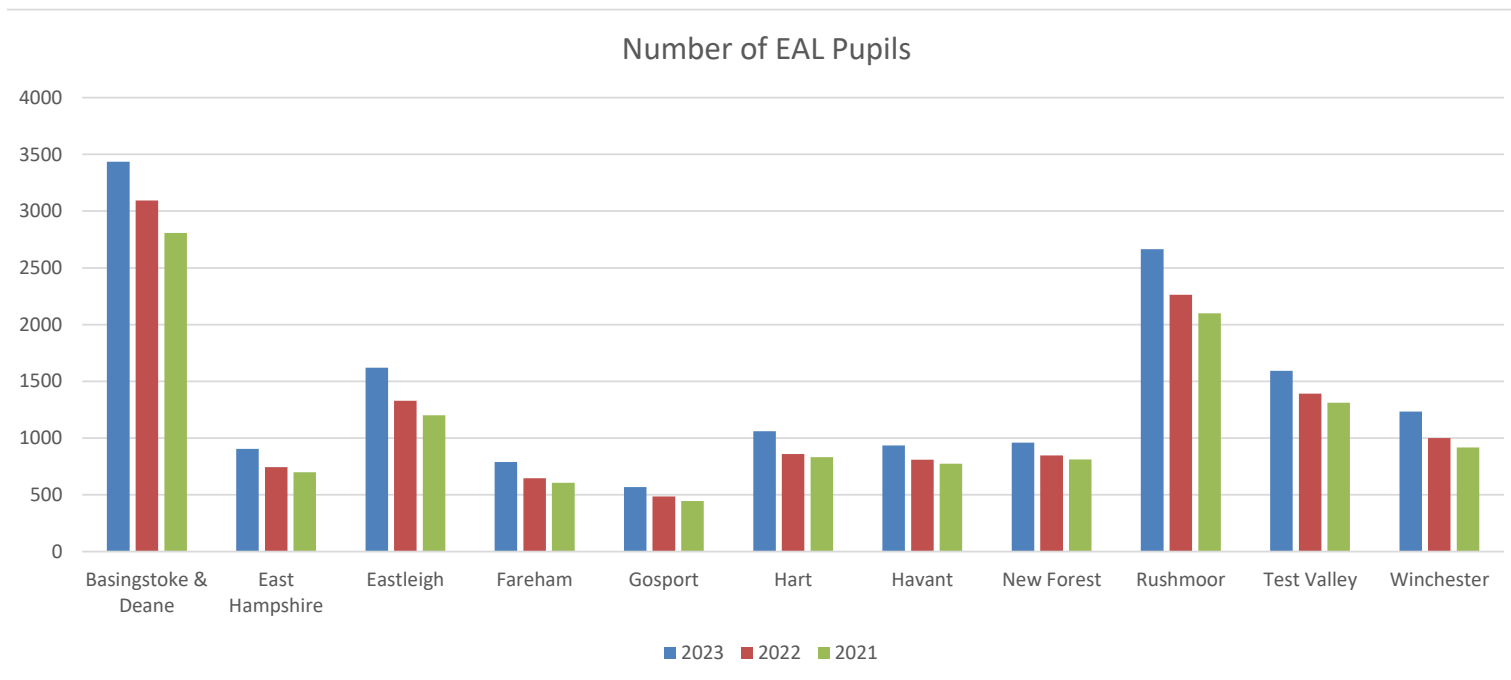

Top 15

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Census languages have been fairly consistent since 2021. Nepali has been the top language in Rushmoor since 2021 largely because of the Gurkha connection although in recent years increasing numbers of Nepali-heritage children in Rushmoor are UK-born. Polish has consistently being the second largest group over the last three years. Note the increase in the numbers of speakers of Romanian, now third in terms of numbers in Rushmoor and across Hampshire.

Language data are collected termly; ethnicity data are collected in the Spring Term only. Accurate recording of pupils' home/first languages enables better targeting of additional resources. EMTAS have produced a leaflet giving further information about home/first language which is available on our website -

**Ethnicity - Rushmoor and Hampshire Summary - Pupils for whom English is an Additional Language (EAL)
Summary by Ethnicity and Academic Year**

The largest ethnic minority group in Rushmoor district is Asian Other (AOTH) which reflects the population of families originating from Nepal who have either settled in the district or who are there in connection with the army. White Other (WOTH) is the second largest group in Rushmoor and includes children who speak Polish and Romanian amongst other, mostly Eastern-European languages. In Hampshire as a whole, WOTH is the largest group and MOTH ('Mixed Other') coming in second. Hence Rushmoor's demographic differs from the overall picture of the county.

The percentage of BME, below, is different from that shown within the 'Ethnicity District' tab as this percentage is generated from all the Pupils in this district, not all of Hampshire

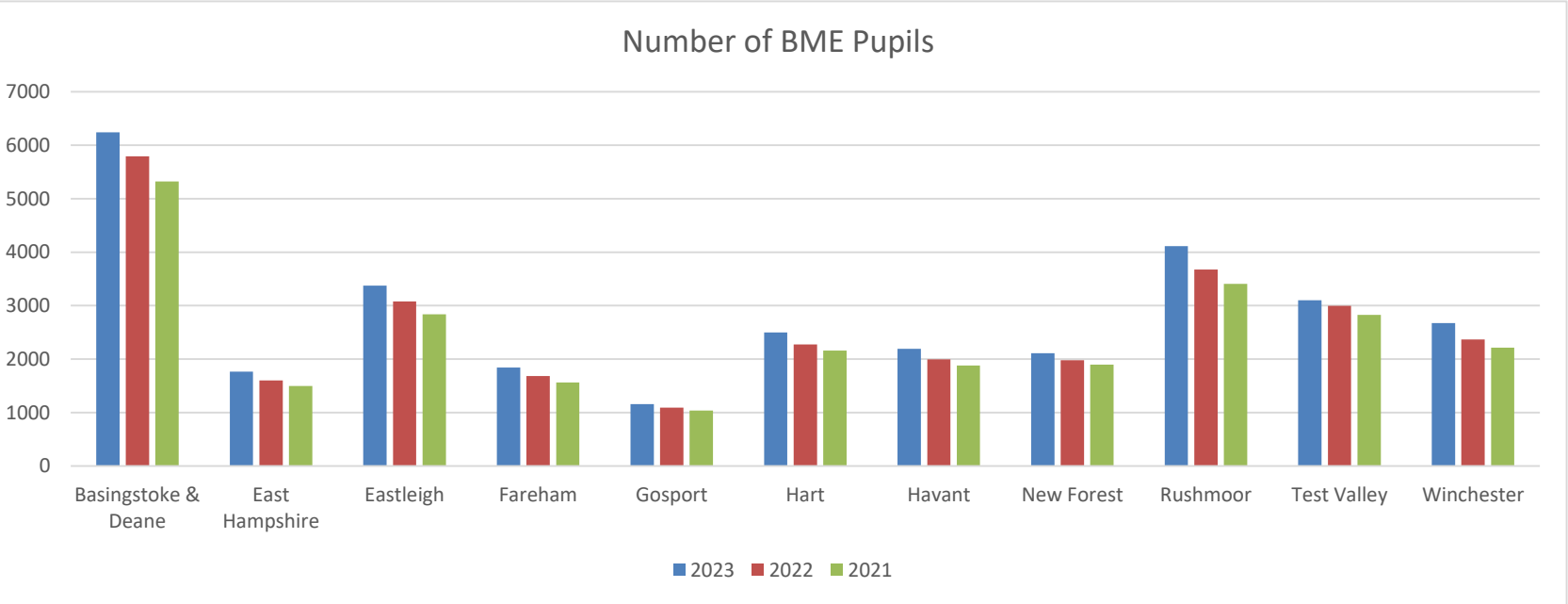

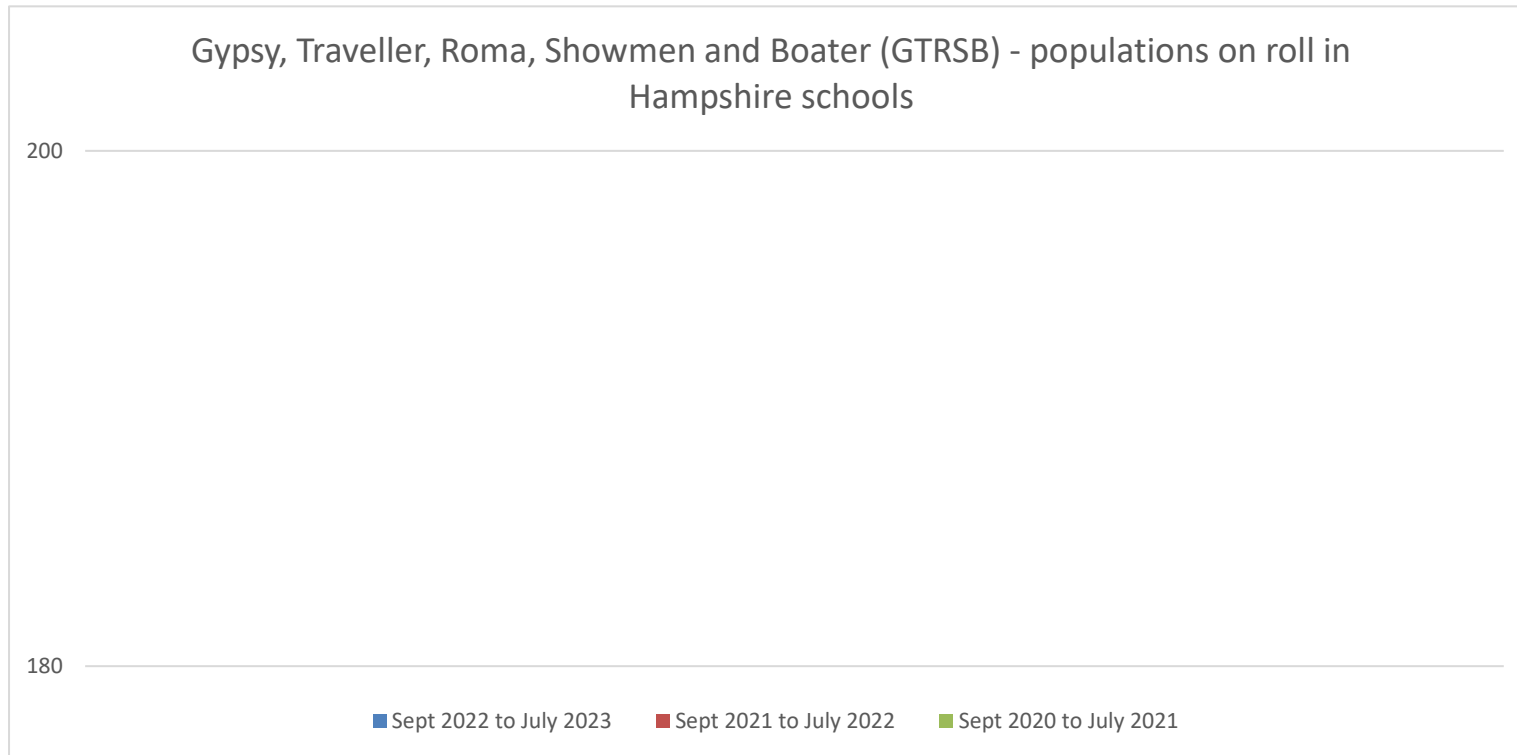
