About EMTAS

EMTAS Summary Information

According to the Spring 2022 School Census, 7.1% of Hampshire's Black, Minority Ethnic and Traveller children were in Havant schools (taken from the 'Ethnicity District' tab). This equates to 2193 children, compared with 1994 in 2022: an increase in the number of BME children in this district. Additionally, 5.9% of Hampshire's EAL (English as an Additional Language) learners were in Havant, which is equivalent to 935 children.

In the academic year 2022-2023, a total of 1117 children were referred to Hampshire's Ethnic Minority and Traveller Achievement Service, a slight decrease from 2021-2022, but still almost double the number of referrals from 2020-2021. Of these, 52 children were referred by schools in the Havant & Waterlooville district, slightly fewer than in 2021-2022. The most dramatic increase across Hampshire has been the number of Ukrainian speakers referred, as well as a rise in Russian speakers as many refugees from Ukraine speak Russian. Havant had 6 new Ukrainian-speaking referrals in 2022-2023 and 13 the previous year.

Academic results for BME and Traveller groups are collected, analysed and reported on by Hampshire EMTAS annually. A summary analysis comparing the attainment and progress of BME and 'Hampshire All' is carried out in addition to more detailed analysis of attainment within individual groups. These data and analyses are made available by district in a separate progress and attainment data booklet. It also captures a range of other information such as attendance, the percentage of children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) as well as the changing profile of the district in terms of languages and ethnic groups.

Within EMTAS, we recognise that different districts of Hampshire will have different needs according to their particular demographic.

All data that have been used are correct at the time of writing but may later be subject to minor changes as new data are published. Dates and sources are acknowledged. In some cases, numbers within ethnic groups are very small. To maintain confidentiality, values of 5 or less are represented as <6.

Note that where numbers are small, although they may give an indication of a particular pattern it is very difficult to draw any firm conclusions and the data should therefore be used with caution.

Havant & Waterlooville has the third lowest number of pupils with EAL in Hampshire, but has seen a steady rise in number since 2021, reaching 935 pupils in the last census.. Despite a fall in percentage, the number of pupils speaking EAL in Havant & Waterlooville has been increasing, which is similar to the overall picture in Hampshire.

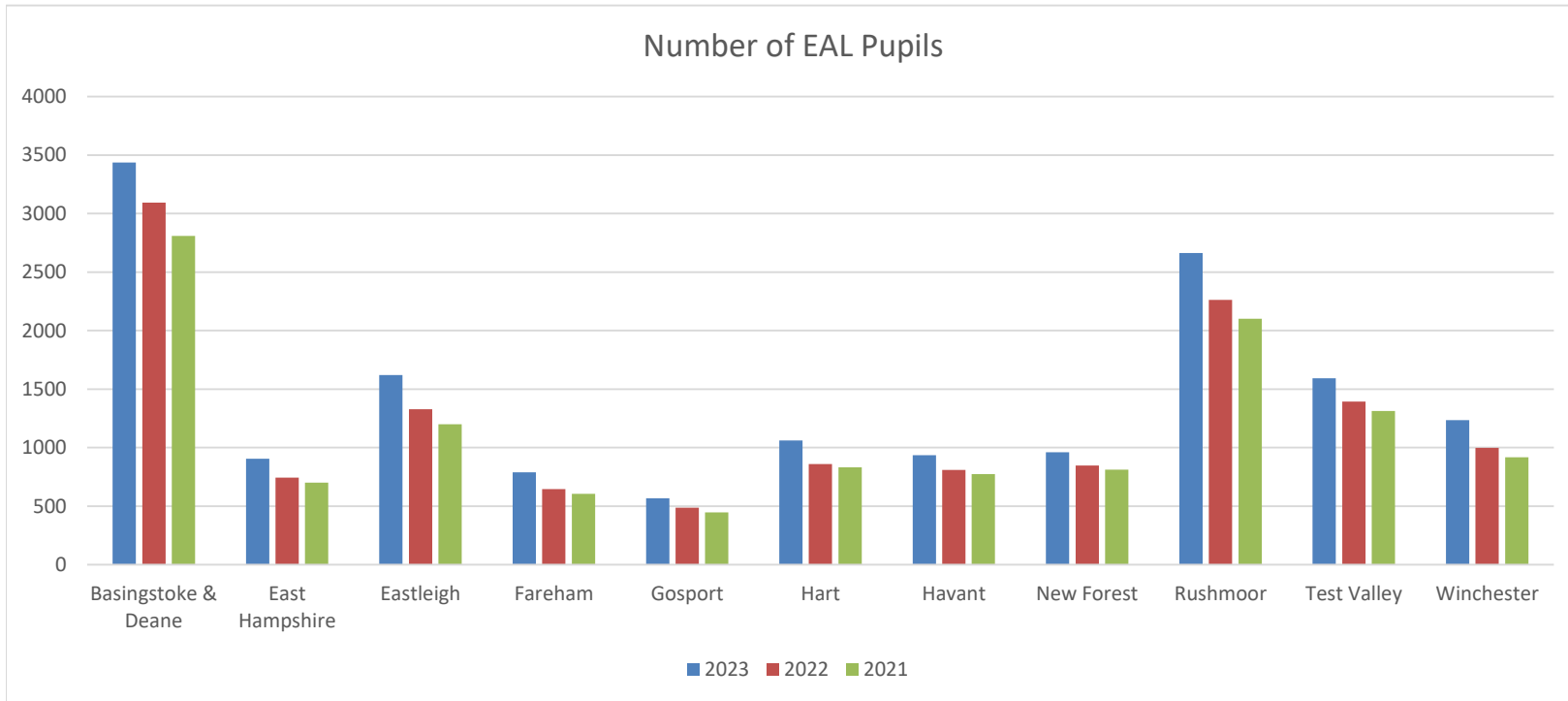

Census languages have been fairly consistent since 2021. Polish is still the top language in Havant & Waterlooville, as it is in the county as a whole, but Malayalam is now second and Romanian third. These languages are fairly prevalent in other parts of Hampshire too. A key difference between the languages spoken in Havant and Waterlooville and the rest of the county is that Hampshire has a large number of Nepali speakers: this is the second largest language group in Hampshire, whereas in Havant and Waterlooville Nepali is not included in the top 15 at all. Malayalam is the second most prevalent language in Havant, whereas across Hampshire it is fifth.

Language data are collected termly; ethnicity data are collected in the Spring Term only. Accurate recording of pupils' home/first languages enables better targeting of additional resources. EMTAS have produced a leaflet giving further information about home/first language which is available on our website -

The largest ethnic minority group in Havant & Waterlooville district is White Other (WOTH), which reflects the population of families originating from Europe and Eastern Europe who have settled in the district, most recently from Romania. This has been the case since 2021 with the number of Pupils from WOTH steadily increasing since then.

The percentage of BME, below, is different from that shown within the 'Ethnicity District' tab as this percentage is generated from all the Pupils in this district, not all of Hampshire

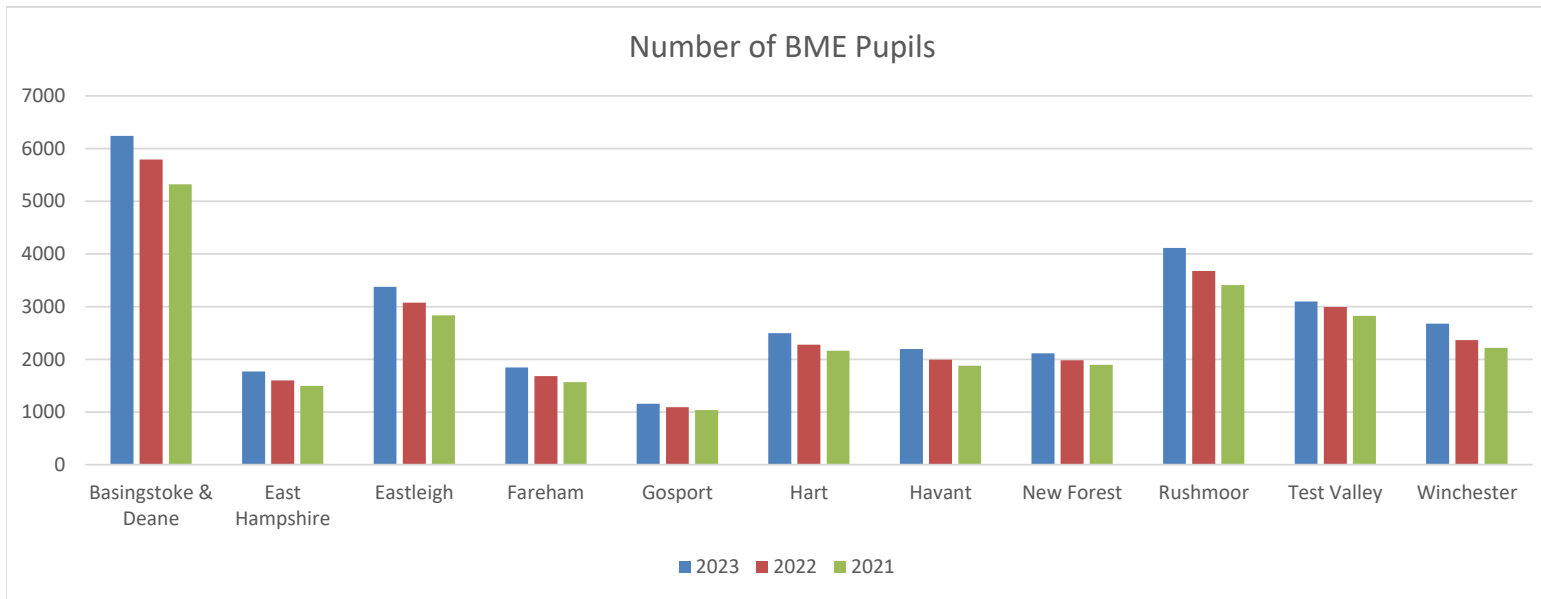

EMTAS new referral data have been included to give an indication of languages spoken by those pupils who have most recently arrived. From 2020-2021, the numbers were evenly distributed across the language groups, with all of them fewer than 6, which reflects the pattern of linguistic isolation within the district. It can be seen that the largest change in 2022-2023 is the increase in Malayalam-speakers; there has been a very slight increase in Romanian-speaking referrals. Havant has also had 7 Ukrainian speakers referred, fewer than the previous year, which reflects the change across Hampshire as a whole, where the number of Ukrainian speakers has also fallen. The number of Russian-speaking referrals has increased across Hampshire as many refugees from Ukraine speak Russian. 3 languages in the top 10 in Havant (Bengali, Bulgarian and Lithuanian) do not appear in the Census top 10 languages.

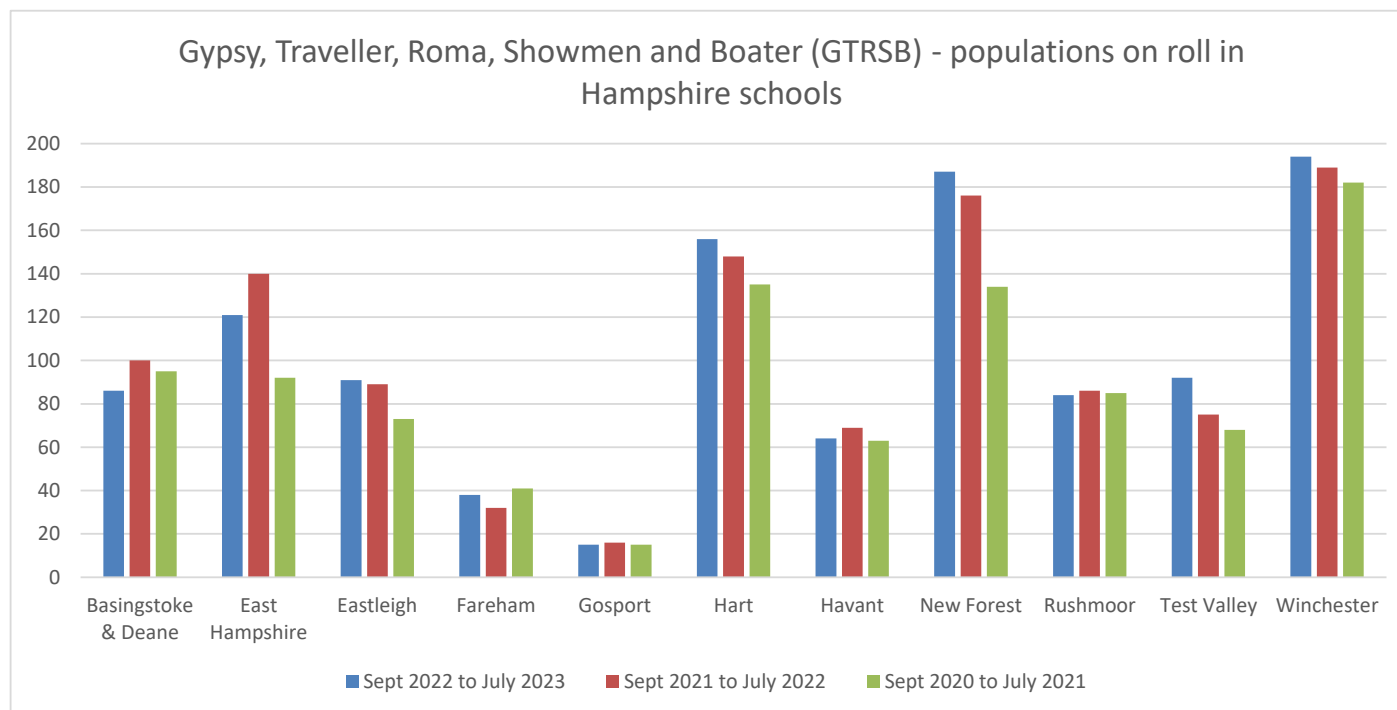
