

NAME Mapeldurwell  
PARISH Mapeldurwell and Up Nateley  
HUNDRED Basingstoke  
DISTRICT Basingstoke and Deane

GEOLOGY River gravels and Upper Chalk.

**SITE CONTEXT** The church is positioned at the head of a small valley at 90m OD and near a spring from which a stream flows to the N. One area of the settlement is positioned within the valley to the N of the church whilst another centre of settlement lies to the NW on the NE facing valley side at between 90-100m OD

**PLAN TYPE & DESCRIPTION** Polyfocal. Irregular rows.

There are two discrete centres in Mapeldurwell, one near the church and the second some 300m to the NW. The church area of the settlement is mainly arranged along a lane (Tunworth Road) which dog-legs to the SW. At the NE end of the area there is a cross-roads around which there are a few buildings. There is a wide variation in plot size and shape with generally small squarish plots alongside Tunworth Road, a couple of strips on the N side of the lane to the second focus of settlement to the NW and some road-side verge plots lying parallel to the line of the road. The church is located away from the main area of housing near a spring.

The second area of settlement to the NW is also arranged along a lane in an irregular row with properties in irregularly shaped plots. One group of properties have some cohesion: they lie on the NE side of the lane in what is overall a wedge shaped unit divided by two curving boundaries.

An area of common stretched to the N mainly on the W side of the stream.

#### AREAS OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL POTENTIAL

There are two AHAPs which correspond to the main areas of occupation within the two centres of settlement. The church and the settlement along the lane to the SW lie within an AHAP. The church was founded as a chapelry here in the late C12 or early C13 and was probably sited near the principal area of settlement or at least near the manorial site which may be the Manor Farm complex.

The date of development of the second focus of settlement is unknown. Existing buildings show that there was occupation here from at least the C16. Occupation may have centred upon a farm or farms, there were at least two here by the C16.

**CHURCH & CHURCHYARD** St Mary. One Norman chancel window and W doorway. There was no chapel here until late C12 or early C13. The chapel was dependent upon Newnham.

The E boundary of the churchyard is curvilinear with fairly straight N and S boundaries. To the W the graveyard has been extended but there is no evidence for the former boundary which must have been reasonably close to the W end of the church.

#### PRIMARY HISTORIC SOURCES

**Domesday** Hubert of Port from the King. Askwell held it from King Edward; he could go whither he would. Then it answered for 5 hides; now for 2.5 hides. Land for 6 pl. In lordship 2 pl; 12 villagers and 8 smallholders with 5 pl. 6 slaves; 2 mills at 32s 6d. Value before 1066, later and now £10; however it pays £13.

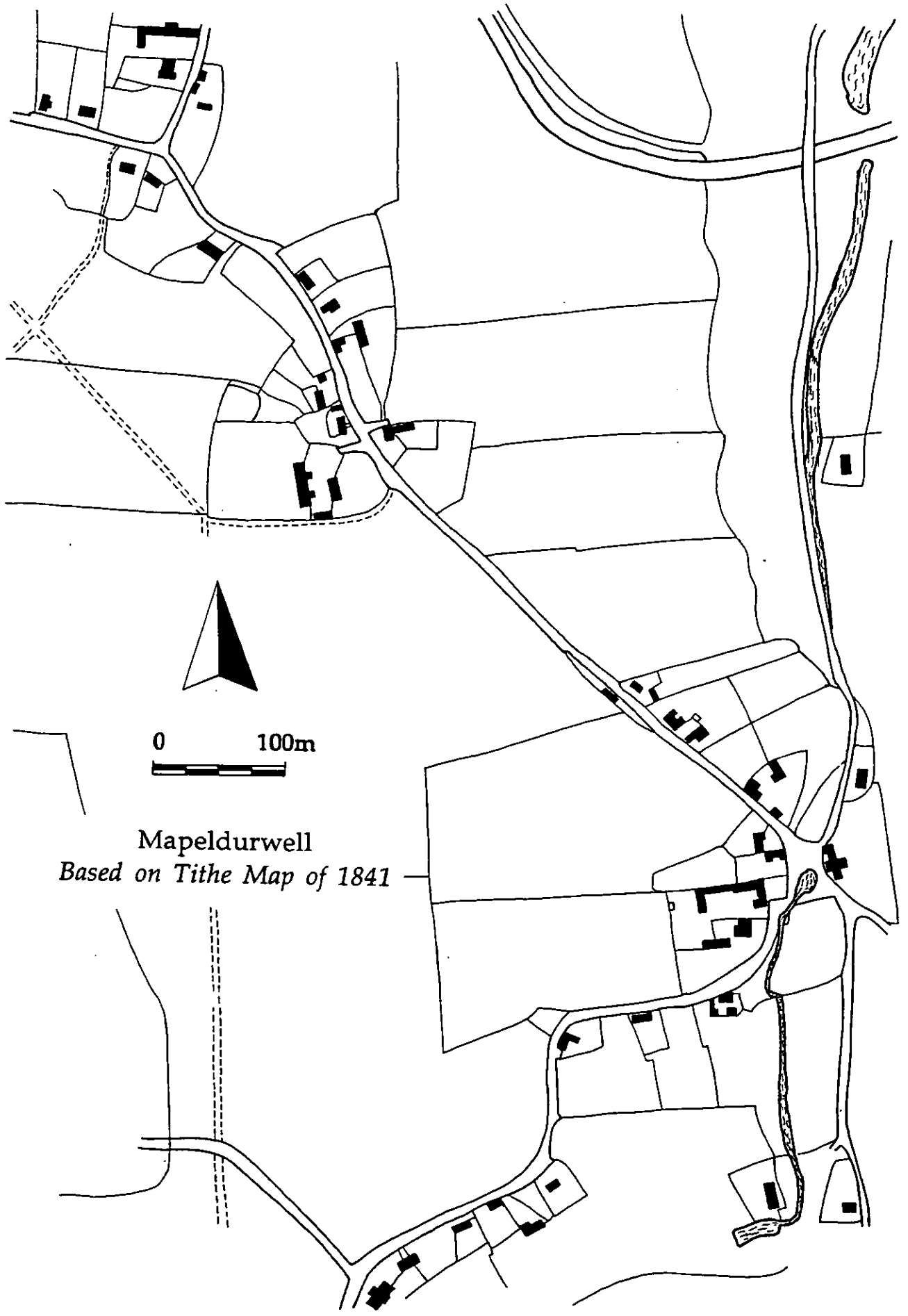

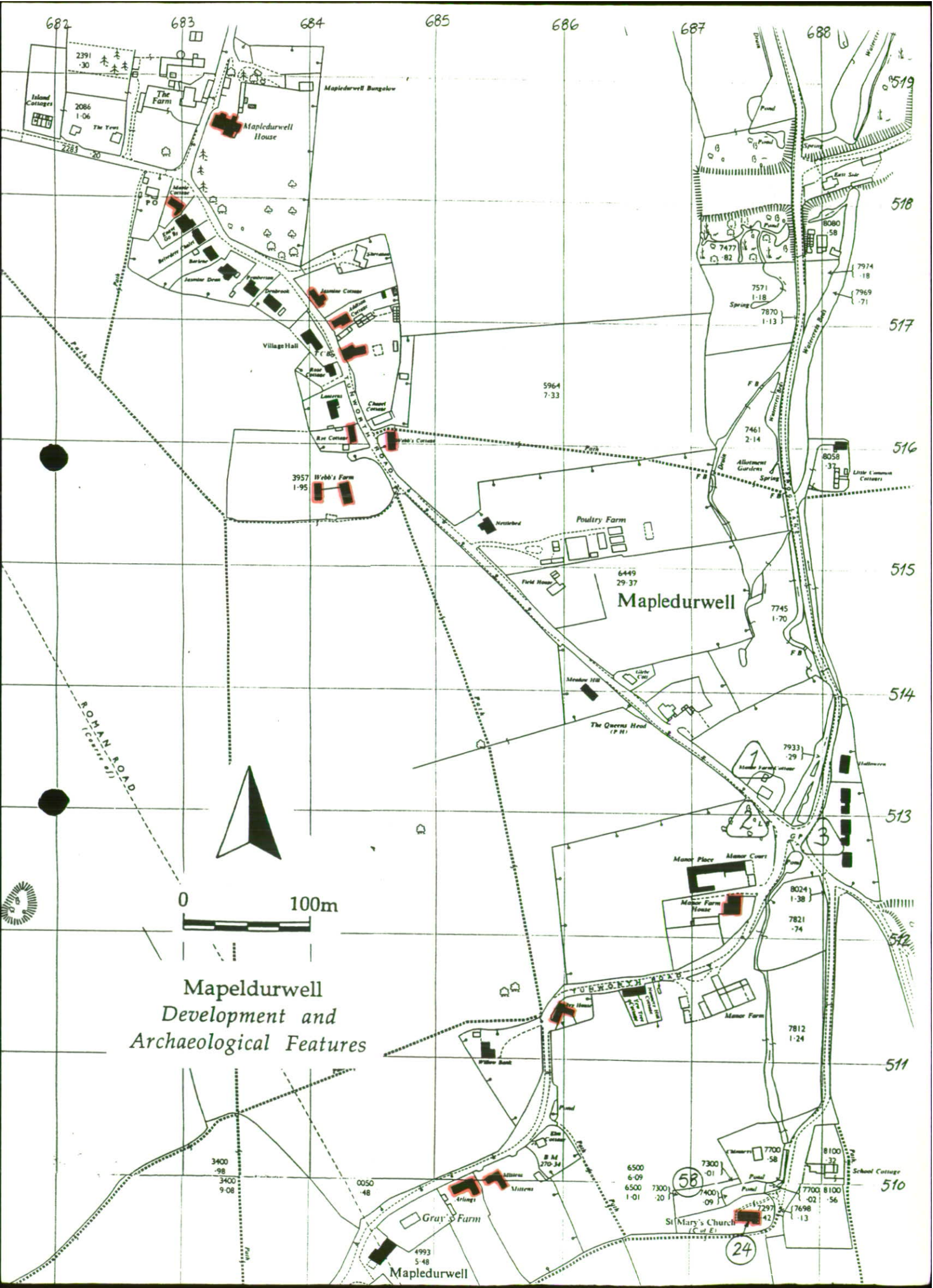

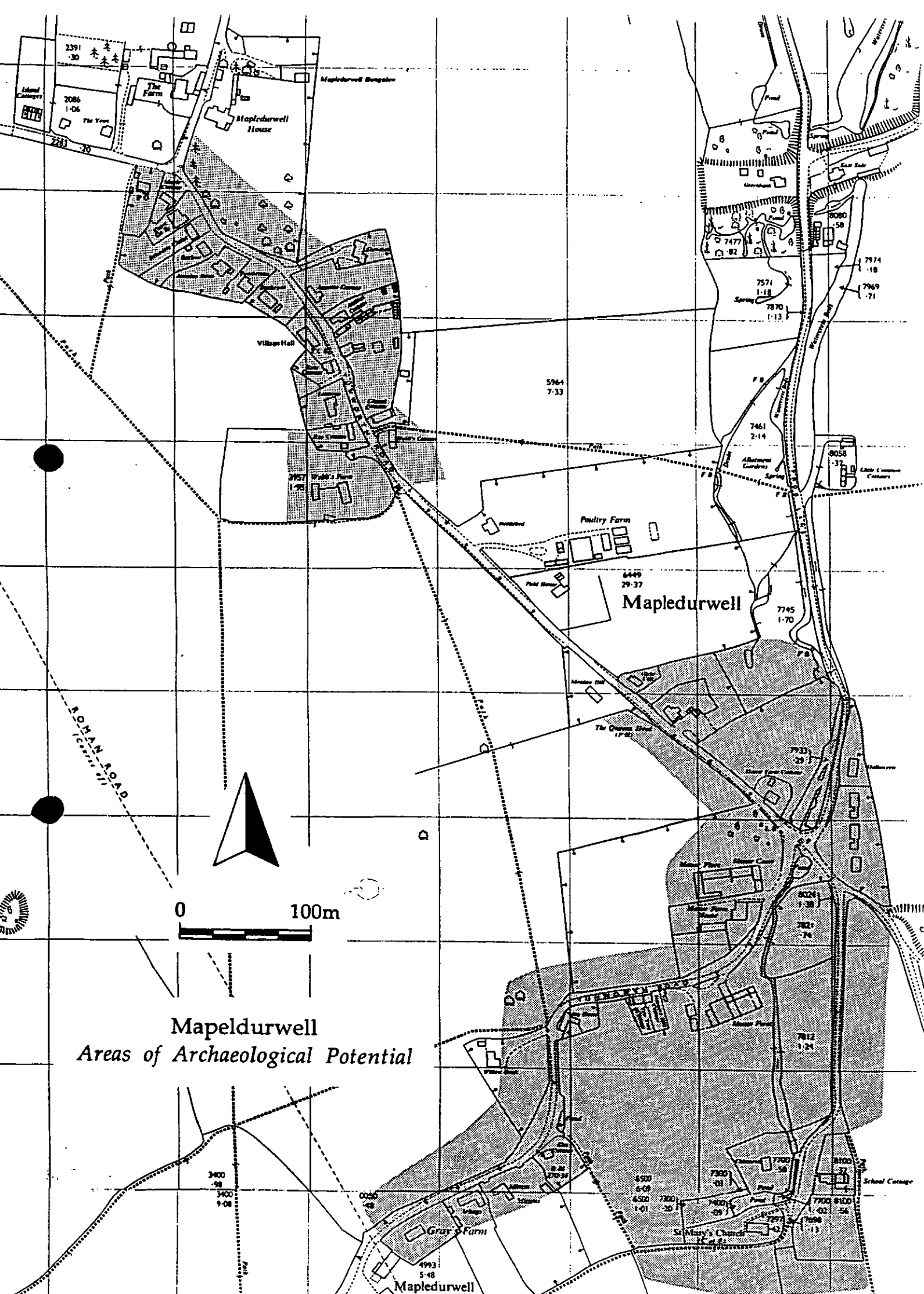
