## About the scheme



### The JRSO's role

Schools choose one JRSO from Year Five and one from Year Six. Their job is to spread road safety messages to your school community by giving talks, running competitions, putting up posters and using as many other fun ideas as they can come up with - using tips from the JRSO pack.

### Your role

Your role is to recruit JRSOs and then supervise them through activities and offer support and guidance. You'll need to work through the JRSO pack with them, help develop ideas and give practical support and encouragement for tasks. To get the most out of your JRSOs, meet with them regularly, to set tasks or check they have set realistic deadlines for themselves.

### Recruiting your JRSOs

You can select one from Year Five and one from Year Six. You could ask pupils to complete application forms - an example is included on the next page for photocopying - and make a selection based on their answers. Some schools also conduct interviews.

Alternatively, you could run a road safety competition, or get students to nominate their representatives. Having an informal talk with candidates before deciding who will take on the role will check they understand the job and they really want to do it.

# School Guide

## The JRSO pack

The JRSO pack is designed as an easy-to-use resource to help the JRSOs promote road safety around your school. A full version of the pack follows these introductory pages.

The pack is arranged into four sections:

### Section title

### What's covered

#### My Job

An introduction to being a JRSO, tips for getting messages across through assemblies, competitions, posters and other fun ideas. There is a year planner with topic ideas for each month as well as campaigns which you can run throughout the year.

#### Staying street safe

Useful road safety advice which can be used as the basis for class talks and other activities. Plus a handy list of road safety related websites to visit for further information.

#### Activities

Plenty of fun ideas for helping school mates learn about road safety, including a quiz, word searches and a crossword. These could be used as activities, as the basis for competitions or as resources in each class for any wet play sessions.

#### Activity solutions

Answers to the puzzles in the previous section.

While the ideas and activities in the pack provide a good starting point, the scheme is flexible so your JRSOs can do the tasks that best suit them and your school community. As you work through the pack with the JRSOs, encourage them to use their creativity and enthusiasm to develop their own ideas and offer support to make them work for your school.

## Giving guidance

### Assembly or classroom talks (see JRSO pack page MJ 1)

The pack encourages JRSOs to give talks in both school assemblies and the classroom - perhaps once a month.

Your JRSOs may want help choosing a topic. They can get ideas from the year planner (page MJ 11 and 12), the staying street safe facts in the green section or road safety websites (page SSS 20).


Encourage them to be creative; they could ask questions, get other students to help or make up songs and plays. Offer them a chance to practice with you first.

### Running competitions (see JRSO pack page MJ 2)

Competitions are a great way to get people interested in road safety and they can involve the whole school not just Years Five and Six.

Your JRSOs may need help picking a theme. They can use their year planner (page MJ 11 and 12) road safety websites (page SSS 20) or for extra impact, you could suggest tying it in with an assembly or class talk the JRSOs are giving. You may also need to help them choose a time and decide on a format.

The worksheets in the Activities section could be photocopied for use as competitions. There are a lot of ideas on page MJ 3, or your JRSOs could come up with brand new ones. Remember that the activities and suggestions provided are only a guide and the JRSOs own ideas may be more relevant for your school.

To judge entries, JRSOs should enlist the help of you, their head teacher or another appropriate judge. Email [jrso@hants.gov.uk](mailto:jrso@hants.gov.uk) for an online copy of a winner's certificate or the JRSOs could design their own version.

The JRSOs could use the be bright goodies as prizes or they could ask the head teacher or PTA if they can have a budget to buy their own prizes.

## Putting up Posters (see JRSO pack page MJ 5 and MJ 7)



Why not encourage JRSOs to put posters up around the school reminding everyone to stay safe? There should be posters included with your JRSO packs but, if there aren't any or you need more, you can order them from The Road Safety Team by emailing [jrso@hants.gov.uk](mailto:jrso@hants.gov.uk).

The JRSOs can also make their own road safety posters and hold poster competitions (page MJ 2). Remind them to make sure the posters are bright and clear with a simple message to attract attention.

## More fun ideas (see JRSO pack page MJ 8)

The pack gives examples of other things JRSOs have been doing across Hampshire. You could help your JRSOs try some of these.

For example, if your JRSOs are planning a lunch club, you may need to advise them on the best way to advertise it, and help them decide on the format and how to keep it fun.

There is no end to the ways your JRSOs can promote road safety. So keep encouraging them to be creative and find the best ways for your school.

## My job

In the blue section, you'll find examples of activities you can use to get your school involved. You'll find spot the hazards, a road safety quiz, words to unscramble, word searches, a crossword and more. You could use these as competitions or share them in classes for wet play activities.

In the orange section, you'll get all the answers to the activities. If you use the activities as competitions, you can mark entries with your school guide and choose a winner.



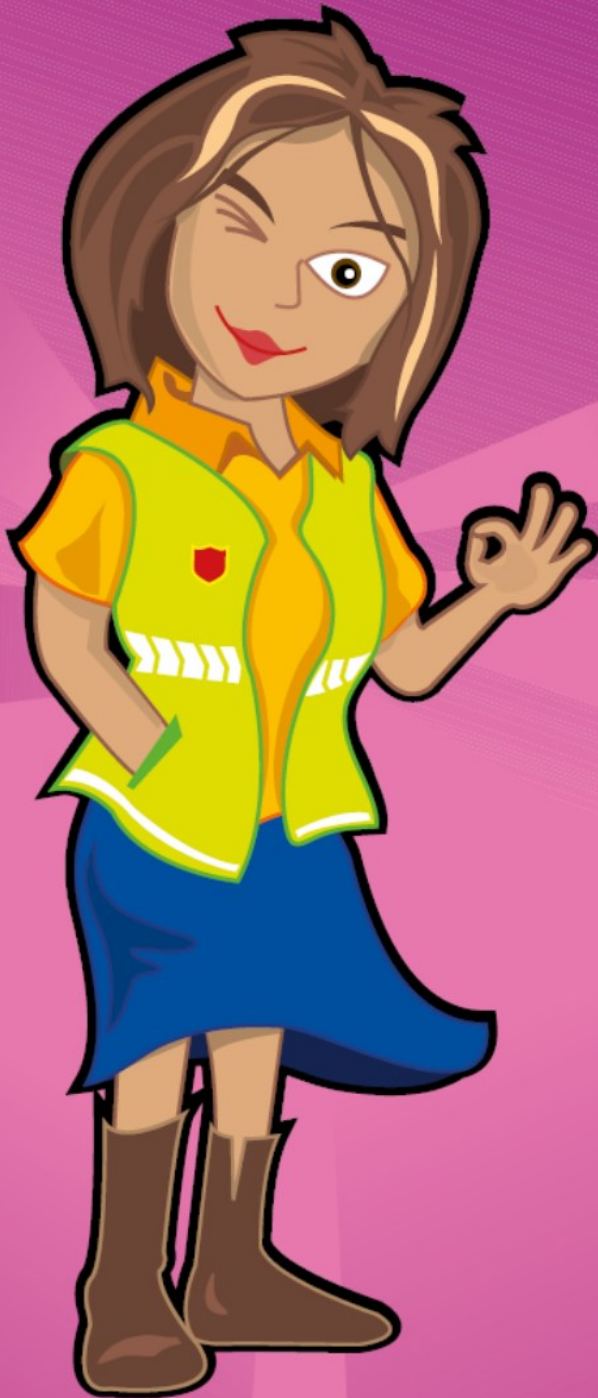

## Speak up

### Telling people about road safety

#### First things first!

As an official JRSO, your first mission is to introduce yourself in your school assembly!

You can also put the **All about me** poster (page MJ 6) on a school notice board to make sure everyone knows you're a JRSO.

When you've done that, you can start planning talks in assemblies, class or small groups to get the rest of your school involved and help them learn. One talk a month would be a good target to aim for.

So how do you do it? Here are our top tips:

- Decide on a **time** with your school guide or teacher.
- Choose a **topic** to talk about – use your **year planner** (page MJ 11 and 12) for ideas for each month, get advice from your school guide or road safety officer, or visit road safety websites ( ).
- Think of ways to get your **audience** involved and to keep their attention. You could ask questions, get others to help you, or make up songs and plays.
- Use assemblies to talk about new **competitions** or announce competition winners and give out certificates and prizes too.
- Remember practice makes perfect, so **practice** what you'll say in front of your friends and family.
- Speak **loudly, clearly and slowly** during your talk, but most of all remember to have fun!
- Ask friends to help you plan and present the assembly if you want or need support
- Recruit some extra JRSO deputies to help you in your role



## Win, win, win!

### Running competitions

Holding exciting competitions will get everyone in your school interested in road safety. You can find examples of activities, such as quizzes and word searches, to base your competitions around in the **Activities** section, or on the road safety websites on [page SSS 20](#).

#### Follow these steps:



Pick a **topic**. Look at your **year planner** on [page MJ 11 and 12](#) for help or search websites for more information and inspiration on road safety ([page SSS 20](#)).



Choose with your school guide the best **time** to run competitions.



Think about **who** the competition is for – is it just for your class, a couple of year groups or the whole school?



Now decide what **type** of competition you want to run - see our competition ideas on the next page.



**Tell everyone** about the competition and when and where they need to hand their entries in. Put up posters, tell people in class or assembly, or use your school website if you have one.



You can make a **collection box** ([page MJ 4](#)) for people to post their entries in and put it in a place where everyone can see it. Make sure you tell everyone to write their **name and class** on the entries so you know who the winner is.



Next, ask an adult to be a **judge** and pick the winners of the competition. This could be your school guide, another teacher or your head teacher. If the competition is for the whole school, they could choose winners from each year group.

Your school guide may help you find some prizes to give the winners.

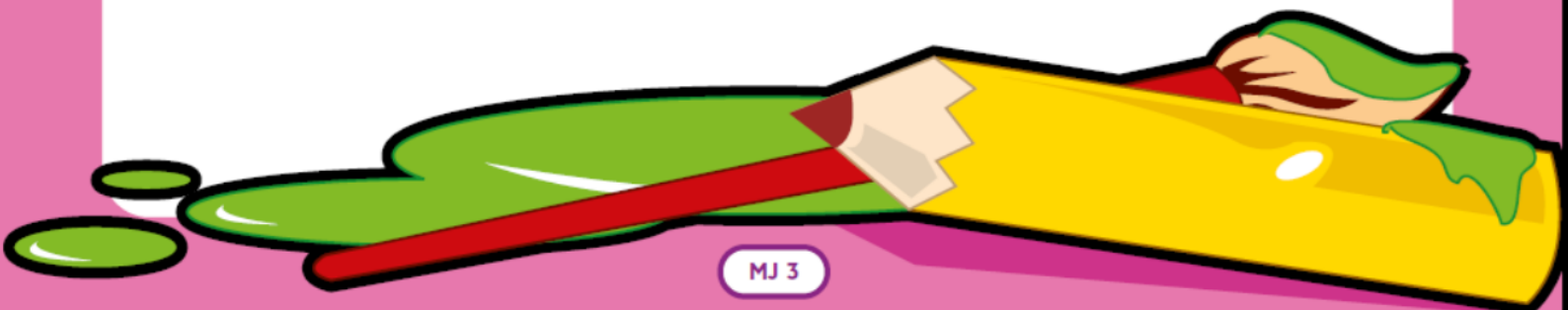


Why not **announce the winners** in class or assembly? They could come to the front to collect their certificate or prize. Winning entries could be displayed on a notice board or wall for everyone to see.

## Competition ideas

There are endless possibilities for the type of road safety competitions you could run. Here are just a few ideas:

- Use one of the **activities** provided in the blue section.
- Write a **song, poem or rap** – you could ask people to record or perform it.
- Create a **word search, crossword** or other puzzle.
- Write an **advice leaflet** to show your school and parents how to stay safe.
- Write a **story**.
- Make up and perform a road safety **play or advert** – you could even film it.
- Find a **picture** to remind you to be safe – either take a photo, print one from the web or cut it out of a magazine – just add a caption.
- Make a **poster** with a road safety message.
- Design visible clothing or other **products** to make you safer.
- Draw a **map** showing the safer routes to your school.
- Run a competition to create an animation – this could be linked to any road safety message.
- Run a competition to design a bookmark with a road safety message – they could be used in the school library.
- Design a road safety mascot for your school – a picture of the winning entry could be added to your school newsletter.

## It's a stick up!

### Putting up posters

Sticking up posters on your school notice boards or in a place everyone can see will remind them who you are and how to stay safe. This could include displaying them outside of the school building so adults can see them as well.

On the next page, you will find an **All about me** poster to fill in.

Write in your name and class details. Then either stick on a photo or draw a picture of yourself in the box. Now it's ready to put up around your school. You can also tell your school you're the new JRSO in assembly to make sure everyone knows.

There should also be some more posters in your pack for you to put around your school – take a look at [MJ 7](#).

Your school guide might be able to help you get different posters too if you want them.

Or you could make your own posters to let people know about your latest competitions or road safety messages. And you can run competitions for everyone to make road safety posters – see [page MJ 3](#) for ideas.

### Top tips!

- If you're making your own posters, use bright colours and clear writing so people will remember your road safety messages.
- Remember posters will look great if you put up new information every month.
- Check your year planner for topics ([page MJ 11](#)).

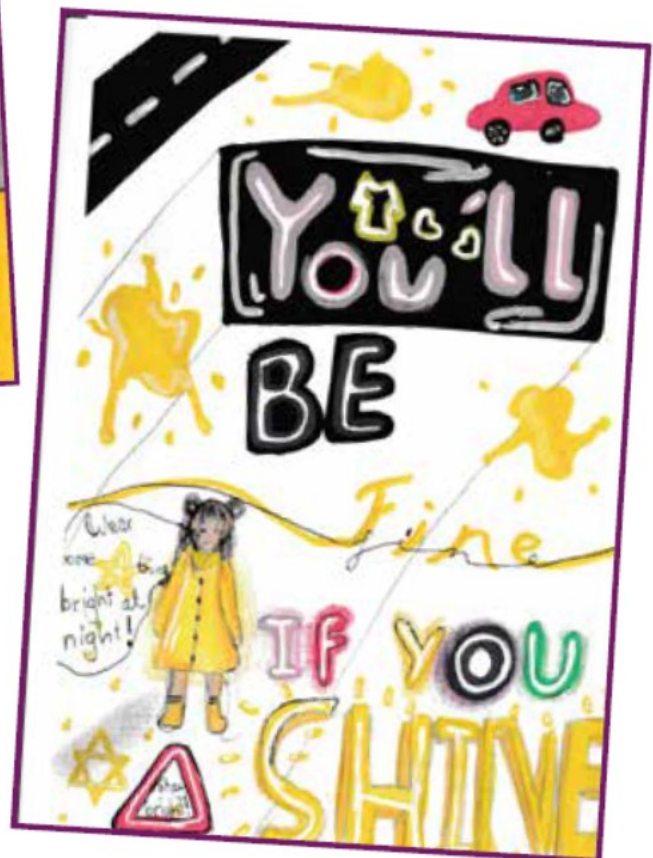

## Be inspired!



### More fun ideas from other JRSOs

This pack has lots of ideas for you to use – but don't just stop there. You can do better than that! Use your imagination to come up with your own ways to keep your school street safe. Here are some suggested activities for you as well as some ideas from other JRSOs in Hampshire.



### Zig-zag leaflet

JRSOs from Kimpton, Thruxton & Fyfield Primary School got some school pupils in Hi-Viz clothing and got them to lay down in a zig-zag formation on their playground. They took photos of them and used the images in their school newsletter to remind parents that they should park away from the zig-zag lines outside school to keep their pupils safe. The JRSOs said it was very well received and the parking outside school has improved.



### Be Bright Day

Plan a be bright be seen non-school uniform day where everyone in school comes dressed as brightly as possible. Lead an assembly highlighting the importance of being seen to traffic and how easily it is to be invisible to traffic.

## Journalists at the ready!

Why not watch the Tales of the Road adverts and ask your teacher if you can write a newspaper report on 'The boy who didn't stop, look and listen' when doing newspaper reports in English. An excellent way to raise awareness of the importance of using the Green Cross Code whilst learning about the features of report writing!

## Quiz it up!

Create a Kahoot interactive quiz which you can do with different classes. Westfields Junior School have done this to test the knowledge of their peers as well as educating them on key road safety messages. The benefit of an interactive quiz is that everyone can take part and all have a go at answering the questions with their own device.



## Measure me!

Various schools across Hampshire have their height chart displayed in the office foyer so parents can view it. Some schools have even had a line marked out on a wall with a sign saying how tall you need to be not to use a booster seat. This means parents can use the line as a guide and be reminded if their child should still be on a booster seat.

## Road Safety day

JRSOs at St. Peter's Primary School in Winchester planned a road safety day at their school and played games such as 'Capture the flag' and the 'traffic light' game with a road safety twist. The traffic light game meant children had to listen carefully to instructions and concentrate as you would when crossing the road. Instead of running around on green, they had to show actions for crossing the road safely.

## Mascot mayhem!

Many schools around Hampshire have road safety mascots at their school. Try running a competition in your school for your peers to design your school's road safety mascot; every time they see it, they'll think about road safety!



## Graph time!

Have you visited our website [www.hants.gov.uk/roadsafety](http://www.hants.gov.uk/roadsafety)? You can view many different graphs referring to casualty statistics in Hampshire and in your district. Why not ask your teacher if you can use them during your Data Handling unit in during Numeracy lessons?

## Road safety word cloud

JRSOs from Hook Junior School created a road safety display, using a word cloud. These can be downloaded from the internet and words related to road safety can be inputted online, however, this JRSO designed and created her own. A great way of reminding children of all the things they need to remember when being on or near the road.

## Teaching idea!

Why not ask your teacher if you can measure how tall everyone is in your class to see who should be using a booster seat? This could be part of a measuring lesson in Maths. You could then graph the results of how tall the children are in your class, year group or whole school.



## Stop! Animation

Ask your peers to create a road safety animation, using any free animation application. You can use Lego people, playmobil characters or even make your own using play doh, clay or plasticine. This can be linked to any road safety message; the Road Safety Team would love to receive them so we can share them on Twitter.

# Staying street safe

## Crossing safely

There are lots of safer places for you to cross the road, such as a:

- **Zebra crossing** (page SSS 3).
- **Pelican crossing** (page SSS 4).
- **Puffin crossing** (page SSS 5).
- **Toucan crossing** (page SSS 6).
- **Footbridge** (page SSS 7).
- **Subway** (page SSS 8).
- **Traffic island** (page SSS 9).

Always use the **Green Cross Code** (page SSS 2) whenever you're crossing the road and remember to keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.

You also need to know how to cross at **traffic lights** (page SSS 10) and **between parked cars** (page SSS 11) if you have to and with the help of school crossing patrols and police officers (page SSS 12).

# Staying street safe

## Green Cross Code

### Walking

When walking to school, to your friend's house or anywhere in between, use the pavement where there is one. It's important to follow simple rules before crossing any road. These rules are called the **Green Cross Code**.

- 1** First **find a safer place** to cross, then **stop**.
- 2** **Stand** on the pavement, but not too close to the edge of the kerb.
- 3** **Look and listen** in all directions for any traffic and **think** about what you are doing.
- 4** **Cross** when there is no traffic and there is **enough time** to get to the other side without running. If you are unsure don't cross.
- 5** **Keep looking and listening** for traffic as you cross the road.
- 6** **Walk** straight across the road. Do not run.



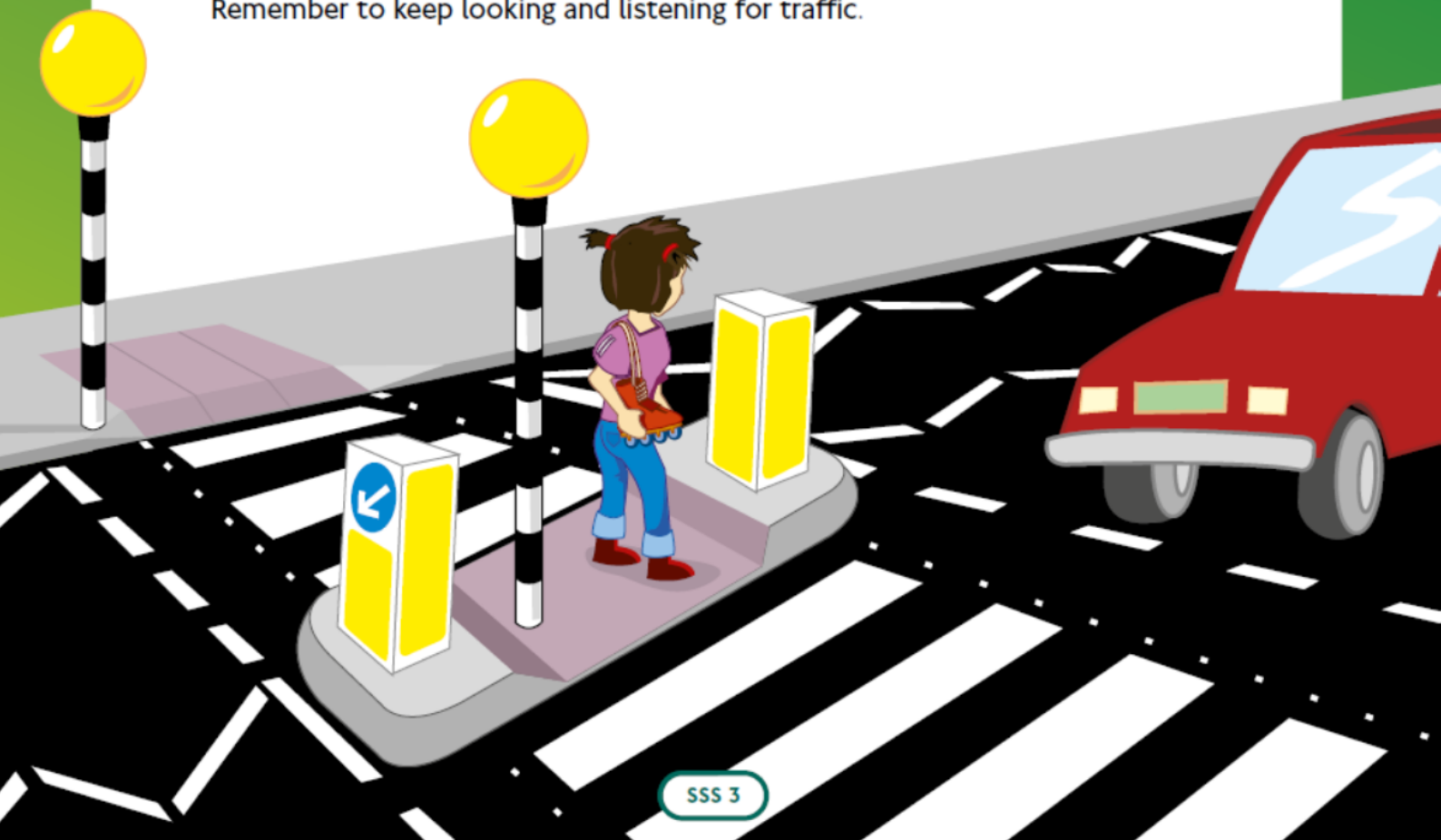
# Staying street safe

## Crossing at zebra crossings

- Zebra crossings have black and white stripes, just like a zebra.
- Traffic should stop if drivers see you waiting to cross.
- Wait on the pavement until all the traffic has stopped.
- When it is safe to do so, walk straight across the crossing.
- Make sure you keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.

**If the zebra crossing has a traffic island in the middle, you must treat this as two crossings.**

- First cross to the traffic island using the Green Cross Code from page SSS 2, then **stop**.
- Use the Green Cross Code again to cross the second part of the road. Remember to keep looking and listening for traffic.




# Staying street safe

## Crossing at pelican crossings

- Pelican crossings have a green  and red  man signal and a **WAIT** box.
- When you want to cross, push the button and wait for the green  man signal on the post on the opposite side of the road, before you cross.

**You must push the button to stop the traffic.**





- When the traffic has stopped and the green  man signal is showing, you can start to walk across the road.
- Keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.

Don't start to cross if the green man signal is not showing or it is flashing.



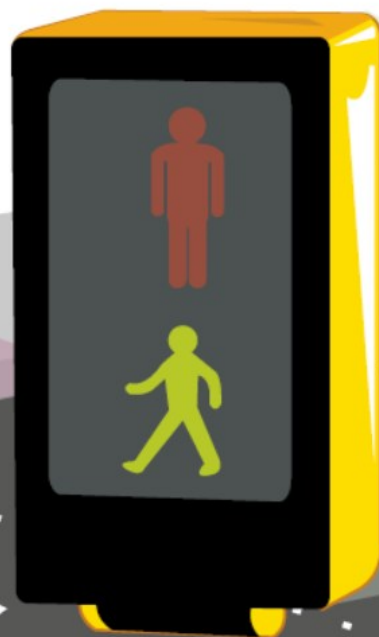
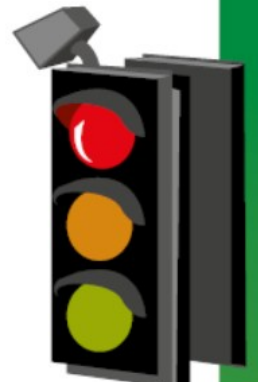
# Staying street safe

## Crossing at puffin crossings

- Puffin crossings are very similar to pelican crossings.
- They have the green  and red  man signals and a box with a button to press.
- The green  and red  man signals are on a post beside you, where you are waiting to cross. There is no signal over the road.

**You must keep looking at the signal post to see when it is safe to cross.**

- Only cross on the green  man signal and always check that the traffic has stopped.
- Keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.

# Staying street safe

## Crossing at toucan crossings

- Toucan crossings have space for pedestrians and cyclists to go across the road at the same time.
- As well as the green  man signal for pedestrians, there is a green cycle signal  for people on bikes.
- You must push the button, like at a pelican crossing to stop the traffic.
- Always check that all the traffic has stopped before crossing.
- Keep looking and listening for traffic as you cross.



Never cross the road if the red man signal or red cycle signal is showing.



# Staying street safe

## Using a footbridge

- Footbridges are designed so pedestrians can walk over the road on a bridge.
- Footbridges are usually over very wide or busy roads; if you see one, make sure you use it if you have to cross the road.
- **Never** throw anything from a footbridge as it is extremely dangerous and could cause a serious accident below.

Footbridges are one of the safer places to cross the road.

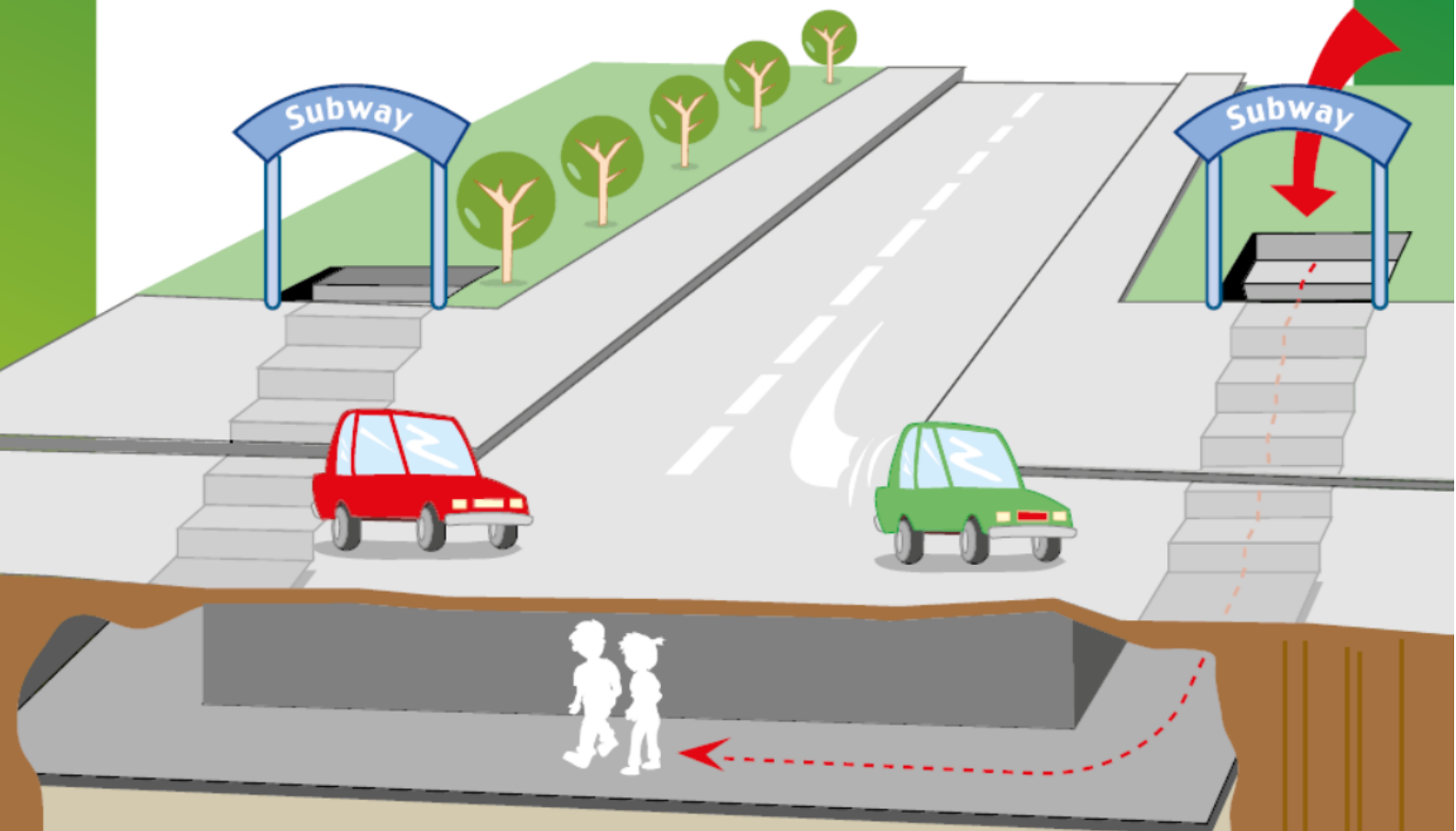


# Staying street safe

## Using a subway

- Subways are tunnels under the road you can walk through.
- There is no traffic in the tunnel, only pedestrians.
- If you have to use a subway, try to be with a friend or an adult that you know and trust.
- Sometimes subways can be dirty and dark and are not always the nicest place to cross the road.

**If you feel unsure about using a subway, you could find another safe place to cross and use the Green Cross Code instead.**



# Staying street safe

## Crossing at traffic islands

- Traffic islands usually have yellow and white bollards in the middle of the road.
- The bollards have a blue circle sign with a white arrow inside for drivers.
- Traffic does not stop for pedestrians at traffic islands.
- If you cross at a traffic island, you must treat the road as two roads.
- Follow the Green Cross Code from [page SSS 2](#) and **stop** when you reach the middle.
- Use the Green Cross Code again to make sure you get across the road safely.

**If in doubt, don't cross. Wait and use the Green Cross Code again.**



# Staying street safe

## Bus

Taking the bus is an easy way to get around town.

- To stay safe, make sure you wait at the bus stop and **keep back** from the edge of the kerb.
- When the bus arrives, **wait for people to get off** before you get on.
- Never distract the driver.
- If you need to cross the road after getting off the bus, **wait for it to move off** first, and then use the Green Cross Code from page SSS 1 to help you cross the road safely. If possible, walk to a safer crossing place (page SSS 2).



# Staying street safe

## Out and about

### Being seen

Drivers are more likely to see you if you're wearing **lighter** coloured clothing – especially when it's dark. You'll be seen even better at night if you wear **reflective** clothes, as they reflect car headlights.

### Weather warning

Ice, snow and even wet leaves on the ground not only make it more **slippery** when you're walking on the roads and pavements, but drivers will find it harder to control their car and **will take longer to stop**. If it's rainy, misty, or foggy, they may be less likely to see you too. So remember to be extra careful in bad weather!



# Staying street safe

## Out and about

### Helping parents and carers to be street safe

If you're driven to school, remind whoever drops you off not to park on either the zig-zag lines outside your school, or on a crossing. The lines are there to make it easier for people to cross the road safely. Your driver also needs to remember to stop for the School Crossing Patrol Officer.

Though it may take a bit longer, it is much safer to park in a quiet road nearby and walk the rest of the journey to school.

### Parking banner – free of charge

The Parking Banner Scheme is offered by the Hampshire Road Safety Team; all schools in the Hampshire County Council area can take part. The aim of the scheme is to produce a banner to be displayed outside your school which draws parent's attention to parking problems. The Road Safety Team print and post banners free of charge.

We suggest the JRSOs run a competition with the children to come up with a slogan for the banner, which could be across the whole school or in a particular year group. For more information or to submit a slogan for your banner, please email [jrso@hants.gov.uk](mailto:jrso@hants.gov.uk).

# Staying street safe

## Travelling abroad

We all love having fun in the sun! If you're lucky enough to go abroad, remember our top tips for staying street safe!

Unlike the UK, many countries drive on the right-hand side of the road. So make sure you know which direction the traffic will be coming from and don't forget to follow the Green Cross Code (page SSS 2) whenever you're crossing the road. Lots of road rules are different in other countries, so be extra careful. For example, don't expect drivers to stop for you at zebra crossings, as it's optional in some countries.

You might also find that there aren't pavements or street lights. You'll find advice on staying safe in these situations below.



## Walking in the countryside

Out nearer the countryside, you may find that the roads are narrower, with no pavements or streetlights.

If there's no pavement, you might find there's a grass verge or bank that you can walk on. If you have to walk on the road, make sure you stay as far away from the cars as possible. Don't walk in the same direction as vehicles are driving; face oncoming traffic so you can see vehicles coming towards you and can check they've seen you.

Speed limits are also different on rural roads so remember that, although the road may be quiet, cars may be travelling quickly, so you need to stay alert.

Make sure you're as visible as possible and, if you're somewhere without street lights, it's a good idea to carry a torch at night.

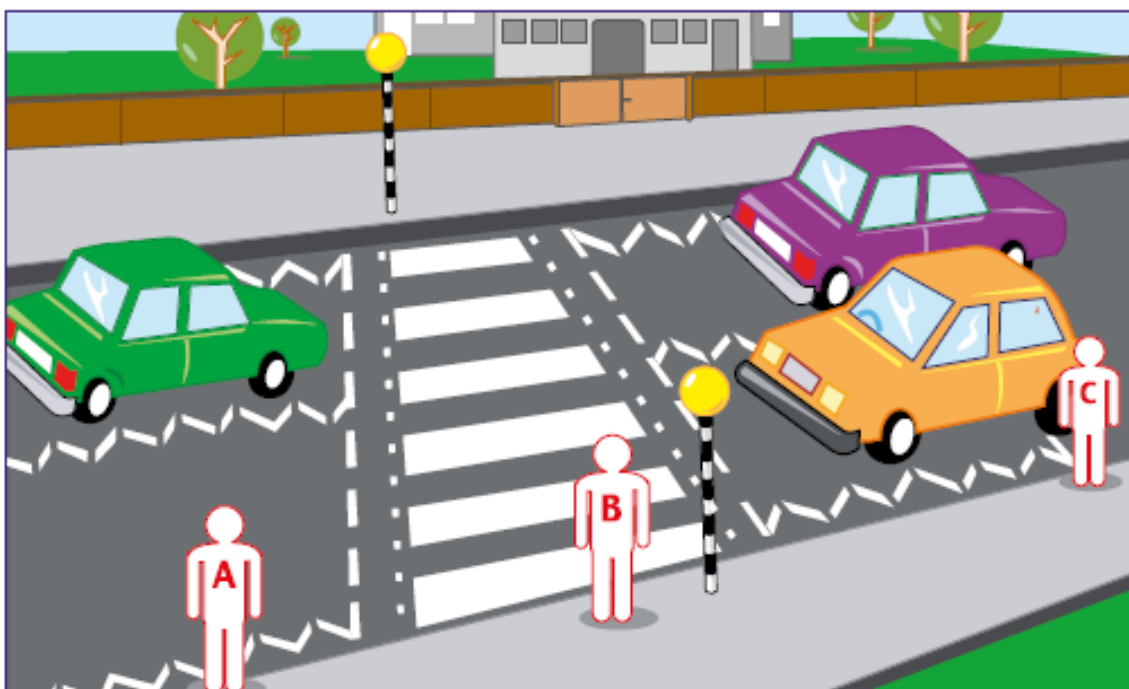

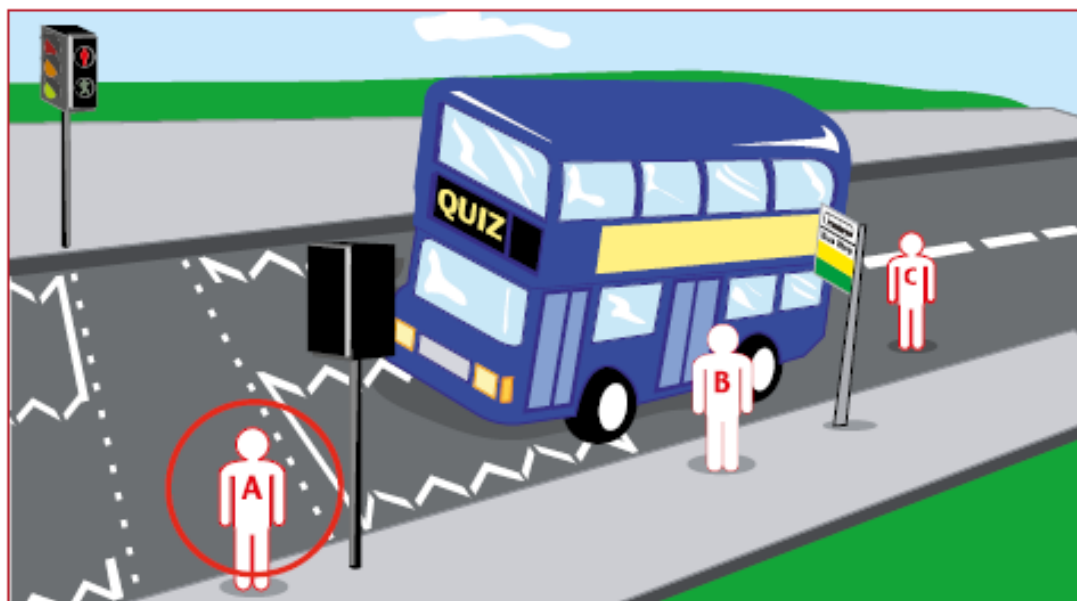

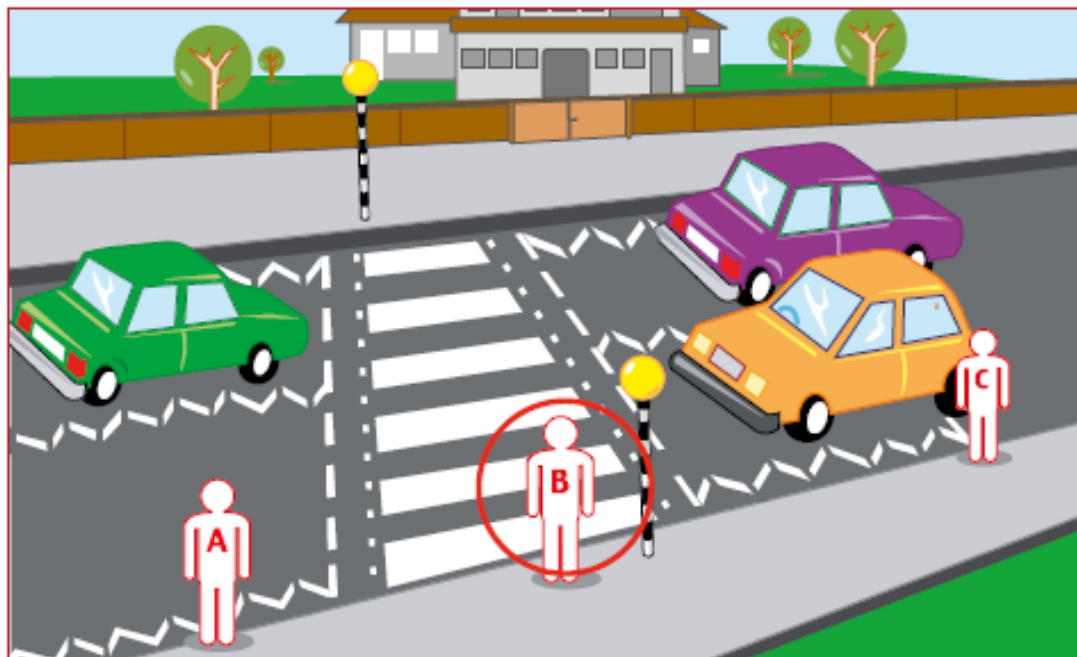
