

Guide to wild flower seeds for the cultivation process

The following seeds are a guide to the types of species expected in Hampshire as they are native varieties that are suitable across most soil types. Mixes and proportions may vary and will be assessed for suitability as part of the cultivation application process.

Standard meadow mixture - contains species which are typical of traditional meadows, the majority of which are perennial and take time to establish.

Grasses

Latin name	Common name
<i>Agrostis capillaris</i>	Common Bent
<i>Cynosurus cristatus</i>	Crested Dogstail
<i>Festuca rubra</i>	Red Fescue
<i>Poa pratensis</i>	Smooth-stalked Meadow-grass

Standard cornfield mixture - contains annual flowers best used to produce a more immediate colourful display in urban areas in one growing season. The mix can be used in combination with a meadow mixture which should flourish the following year.
